The Tribulation – Part 1

Many of us today are facing difficulties in our lives and we look at those difficulties as tribulation. There may be a time of sickness; there may be a time of disaster of one kind or another that comes into our lives, and it may be financial; it may even concern death. Maybe one of our loved ones has gone on. No matter how much tribulation we suffer in this present time, there's coming a time which no man has seen before, and in II Timothy 3:1, it says, *This know also, that in the last days perilous times shall come*.

And then in Jeremiah 30:7: Alas! for that day is great, so that none is like it: it is even the time of Jacob's trouble; but he shall be saved out of it.

And then we read in Matthew 24:38, it says, For as in the days that were before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day that Noe entered into the ark.

There are many characteristics of Noah's day that can be seen in our day – immorality, demon possession, widespread corruption and violence, universal rebellion against God and His will, universal rebellion against parents, false professions of faith in God. People professing themselves to be wise, they become fools, according to Romans 1:22.

In Genesis 6:5, it says, And GOD saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and that every imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually.

And then in Genesis 6:12, it says, *And God looked upon the earth, and, behold, it was corrupt; for all flesh had corrupted his way upon the earth.* Well, we may be going through

some tribulations personally in our lives, but there's coming a time on this whole Earth that there's going to be a tribulation such as has not been seen, not even in the days of Noah. It's going to be worse.

I want to start a series of lessons about the tribulation. We're going to discuss the first part of the tribulation and then we're going to look at the great tribulation. Once again, Jeremiah 30:7 says, *Alas! for that day is great, so that none is like it: it is even the time of Jacob's trouble; but he shall be saved out of it.*

Then, speaking of the great tribulation, the last three and a half years of what we call and what the Bible refers to as the tribulation or as that time of Jacob's trouble or that time that no man has seen before, that trouble. And that trouble is coming upon this Earth.

Before the tribulation, let's look at some events that have taken place. We see that first of all the death of Christ has taken place. In I Corinthians 15:3, it says, For I delivered unto you first of all that which I also received, how that Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures.

In II Corinthians 5:21, it says, For he hath made him [that's Christ] to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him. It's all through Jesus Christ that any of us are seen as righteous before God.

In Romans 5:8, it says, But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us.

And in I Peter 3:18, it says, For Christ also hath once suffered for sins, the just for the

unjust, that he might bring us to God, being put to death in the flesh, but quickened by the Spirit.

So we see first of all, before the tribulation can start, Christ must have died, and then we see that Christ went to the lower parts of the Earth. This was something that had to take place.

In Ephesians 4:8-10, it says, ⁸Wherefore he saith, When he ascended up on high, he led captivity captive, and gave gifts unto men. ⁹Now that he ascended, what is it but that he also descended first into the lower parts of the earth? ¹⁰He that descended is the same also that ascended up far above all heavens, that he might fill all things.

Christ is there right now. He is there as our advocate. The advocate for those who have really never trusted Him as Savior, He's the advocate in the sense that, when they do, when a person does receive Him as Savior, He is their advocate. He says, "Đon't lay anything to their charge. I have saved them because they have trusted Me as Savior." He's talking to God the Father.

And for those of us who are saved and those who get saved from that point on Jesus is our advocate. When we do something that we shouldn't do, He says, "Father, forgive them."

John Calvin said of Ephesians 4:9 concerning Christ's death or descent into the lower parts of the Earth, "It was when Christ was raised from our lowest condition on Earth and received into Heavenly glory." You see, there are some people who believe that He did not go into the Earth as the Bible says, but it's simply a metaphor or something that speaks of something else other than going into the earth.

Albert Barnes said of Ephesians 4:9: "Christ's descent into the lower parts of the earth meant this," and he's saying that it meant to the lowest state of humiliation.

Adam Clark said of Ephesians 4:9: "The meaning of the apostle appears to be this: The person who ascended is the Messiah and His ascension plainly intimates His descension, that is, His incarnation, humiliation, death, and resurrection."

Folks, these men that I've mentioned are great scholars. They have studied the Bible and they're gone now, but they studied the Bible. I do not hold myself out to be as great a scholar. I simply hold myself out as believing the Bible. You see, these people can say what they want, but the Bible is still the best commentary on itself. The Bible says this about Christ's descent into the lower parts of the Earth: "Now that he ascended, what is it but that he also descended first into the lower parts of the earth, Ephesians 4:9.

And it says in Matthew 12:40: For as Jonas... and that's Jonah... was three days and three nights in the whale's belly; so shall the Son of man be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth.

It not only means that He was buried after His death; it simply means this: He went into the lower parts of the Earth. Psalm 16:10 says this about that: For thou wilt not leave my soul in hell... This is Jesus. For thou wilt not leave my soul in hell; neither wilt thou suffer thine Holy One to see corruption.

In Acts 2:14 it says there: But Peter, standing up with the eleven, lifted up his voice, and said unto them, Ye men of Judaea, and all ye that dwell at Jerusalem, be this known unto you, and hearken to my words. He preached a great message that day, and verse 22 goes on

and says this: Ye men of Israel, hear these words; Jesus of Nazareth, a man approved of God among you by miracles and wonders and signs, which God did by him in the midst of you, as ye yourselves also know.

And in verse 24: Whom God hath raised up, having loosed the pains of death: because it was not possible that he should be holden of it.

Now, there are many places in the Scriptures that talk about His flesh not seeing corruption. We know that He was buried and He rose on that third day. In Acts 2:29-31, it says: ²⁹Men and brethren, let me freely speak unto you of the patriarch David, that he is both dead and buried, and his sepulchre is with us unto this day. ³⁰Therefore being a prophet, and knowing that God had sworn with an oath to him, that of the fruit of his loins, according to the flesh, he would raise up Christ to sit on his throne... The fruit of David's loins, of course, is Christ, and it says there, according to the flesh that Jesus would be raised up, that God would raise up Christ to sit on His throne.

³¹He seeing this before spake of the resurrection of Christ... This is David speaking. He saw the resurrection of Christ... that his soul was not left in hell, neither his flesh did see corruption. Jesus Christ went into the lower parts of the Earth, and, folks, we know that as Hell.

And I Peter 3:18-19: ¹⁸For Christ also hath once suffered for sins, the just for the unjust, that he might bring us to God, being put to death in the flesh, but quickened by the Spirit: ¹⁹By which also he went and preached unto the spirits in prison.

And Revelation 1:18: *I am he that liveth, and was dead; and, behold, I am alive for evermore, Amen; and have the keys of...* What?... *hell and of death.*

Jesus Christ, He died. Jesus Christ, He went to the lower parts of the Earth. He preached to those people in Hell. You say what did He preach to them? I believe He preached and He said, "I tried to tell you. You heard the prophets and they tried to tell you. You needed to get saved. You needed to trust Me. You needed to trust Me, Jesus. I'm Jesus."

And when Jesus left that place, He took those people who were in what we know as Abraham's bosom with Him. Those people who had been saved, those people who had trusted Him, the patriarchs, those people who knew Him, He took them with Him and I believe those people in that compartment of Hell where they will be tormented day and night forever and ever. There is no day. There is no night. It's always night. They saw Jesus Christ take those other people and leave that place called Hell.

Well, Jesus died. He was buried, and we also see that He rose from the grave, the resurrection of Christ. This has to take place before the tribulation starts. In I Corinthians 15:4, it says: *And that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day according to the scriptures.*

Romans 1:4 says: And declared to be the Son of God with power, according to the spirit of holiness, by the resurrection from the dead.

Now there are some who teach we will be raised not with a real body but with a spiritual body. Well, how was Christ raised? The Bible says in I John 3:2: *Beloved, now are we the sons of God, and it doth not yet appear what we shall be: but we know that, when he shall appear, we shall be like him; for we shall see him as he is.*

How did Jesus rise from the dead? He didn't rise spiritually. He rose bodily.

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First Corinthians 15:20 says, *But now is Christ risen from the dead, and become the firstfruits of them that slept.*

Luke 24:39: Behold my hands and my feet, [Jesus said,] that it is I myself: handle me, and see; for a spirit hath not flesh and bones, as ye see me have.

We're not going to rise spiritually when the breath of this body leaves. We're going to rise bodily when Jesus comes for us and takes us up and says, "Come up hither," and we go to be with the Lord forever.
