A moratorium on stupid?

I really hate quoting avowed Leftist Tom Hanks, but his character in 'Forrest Gump' was spot on when he said, "Stupid is as stupid does" because the statement actually describes America's roller coaster ride down the ideological rabbit hole of moronic behavior.

First, there was DHS Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas' who stated to a Senate committee that "the (southern) border was not open" and the second came from the lips of the mistress of newspeak prestidigitation White House spokeswoman Jen Psaki. She responded to a question about the Biden Administration's decision not to require a Coronavirus vaccine or obtain negative Covid-19 tests from illegal immigrants at our southern border with: (the refugees) "are not intending to stay here for a lengthy period of time."
