### Health & Well-Being

Many factors contribute to health and the conditions that shape how long and how well people live. Safe housing, jobs that pay a living wage and well resourced schools are among the factors, often called the social determinants of health, that make up a healthy community.

On March 19th, the County Health Rankings & Roadmaps annual data was released for counties across the nation. The Kansas Health Institute served as our state team and has shared the 2025 data with our local Live Well Saline County group. This year, 104 of 105 counties in Kansas met the criteria to be included in the data.

For purposes of this report, health is defined as more than being free from disease and pain; health is the ability to thrive. Well-being covers both quality of life and ability of people and communities to contribute to the world. Population Health involves optimal physical, mental, spiritual and social wellbeing. Below are the results for our county:


Saline County is faring slightly worse than the average county in KS for Population Health and Wellbeing, and slightly better than the average county.



On March 4th and 7th, U.S. Customs and Border Protection implemented several Presidential Executive Orders implementing tariff updates from China, Hong Kong, Canada and Mexico. As such, the U.S. has imposed a 25% tariff on goods that do not satisfy USMCA rules of origin, and an additional 10% tariff on imports from China and Hong Kong. And so the question becomes, how will this impact consumers, and will it in turn impact charities like the Salina Food Bank.

Regardless of one's political affiliation, it is universally accepted that tariffs function as a tax on consumers, leading to increased prices for food and goods. Research from the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta (2025) suggests that the combined tariffs on imports from China, Mexico, and Canada could raise U.S. consumer prices on everyday goods by up to 2.6%. Economic analysts estimate that a 25% tariff on imports can cause an almost immediate 25% increase in related grocery prices if fully passed through. A study by American Progress Action (2025) found that tariffs imposed in 2018 and 2019 effectively increased annual food costs by about \$90 for the average household. However, this impact was felt most acutely by those struggling to afford food, contributing to a higher demand for food assistance programs and charitable food resources everywhere.

Overall, tariffs contribute to a chain reaction that may extend far beyond the original intent of trade policy. While tariffs are often justified to protect domestic industries, their unintended consequence of increasing food prices will likely worsen food insecurity, particularly among vulnerable populations. For organizations like the Salina Food Bank, tariffs will likely trigger rising demand for food assistance, higher costs for food procurement and a greater strain on charitable donations. Without interventions—such as targeted exemptions for essential food items or policy measures to support low-income consumers—tariffs may deepen America's sea of troubles.
