FEATURED ARTICLES McLeod Clan: A Proud Tradition of Independence

CLAN MCLEOD

The Clann Mhic Leoid (Gaelic) is a Scottish Highland clan associated with the Isle of Skye. The branch of our ancestors is of the MacLeods of Harris and Dunvegan (the castle of MacLeod and the only castle still held by the original clan). This branch is known in Gaelic as Siol Tormoid or the "seed of Tormod." Leod died in 1280, succeeded by his son Malcolm, then his oldest son, Iain Ciar—the cruelest of all clan leaders—in 1343. Iain Ciar died of wounds in an ambush in 1392. Clan wars raged until the 17th century—with the MacLeod's winning most battles—until a shaky peace was arranged. One Norman MacLeod of MacLeod led the clan during his life (1812-1895), but died without a male successor. A period of complicated clan leadership ensued, but meanwhile new colonies were already being populated in North America.

During the mid-1700's, population pressures and economic dislocations in Scotland proved to be an incentive to risk going west. Such an inclination matched the Scottish heritage of wandering, their ancient skills as drovers, shepherds, gardeners, hunters, ministers, and miners, with an emphasis on formal education, all cloaked in a rich tradition of romance and myth. These hearty Scots found a new home in America. Among these adventurers were MacLeod's setting out to make a stake in the new world.

NORMAN MCLEOD

The influx of Scottish migration to North Carolina and other colonies and the common usage of traditional names passed on through generations make tracking an individual through history challenging. Although there are a number of possible scenarios, this one is most probable for our family lineage.

Norman was born 1769 in Scotland. His father was

Duncan McLeod, who migrated from Scotland to America about 1774 with Norman and his brother, Alexander and sister, Catherine. They apparently entered the port in Wilmington and settled first around Fayetteville, North Carolina. Norman met and married Katherine McMillan, also born in Edinburgh, Scotland to her parents, Archie McMillan, a merchant and landowner, and his wife Margaret Murphey.

Norman and Katherine had 11 boys, among them another Norman and Murdock. Norman, the senior, acquired several parcels of land and a few household slaves in North Carolina (Cumberland and Richmond Counties) and in Georgia (Montgomery, Irwin and Telfair Counties). Records indicate he sold much of the land and moved with his family to the area of Telfair known as China Hill and settled there. It was common practice after the Revolution and War of 1812 to reward service with bounty lands and Norman acquired the rights to some in lottery drawings. His exact service is unclear as of this writing.

Norman was known to be active in Telfair as a constable, possible bounty hunter of run-away slaves, trading in real estate, and often serving on grand juries and criminal juries. By 1850, Norman had sold many of his land holdings and moved to Decatur County, which included parts of the modern counties of Thomas, Brooks, Colquitt, Grady, and Worth. He was 80 years old by this time and he bequeathed his holdings to his wife and children, including Murdock the elder. Norman died in 1853 in Thomas County and was believed to be buried there in the Boston City Cemetery. Katherine died in 1850 and is also believed to be buried in the Boston City Cemetery.

MURDOCK MURPHEY MCLEOD, SR. AND ELIZABETH "ELIZA" ANN WILSON

Murdock M. McLeod was born to Norman McLeod and Katherine McMillan in Telfair County in 1813. The greater family McLeod had moved from Telfair County to Thomas County about 1830. Murdock first married Elizabeth Phillips on March 27, 1834. But Elizabeth died soon after without children and in December 1837 Murdock married Eliza Ann Wilson (born on April 26, 1820 in Effingham County and daughter of Jeremiah Wilson and Elizabeth Lucas.) They had seven children, including another Norman and Murdock Murphy McLeod, Jr. (1852). Murdock McLeod served as 2nd Lieutenant in the Georgia Militia's 752d District in Thomas County, having been commissioned on March 3, 1836. Murdock and Eliza moved into Lowndes County into the Morven District, where Eliza's family lived. In 1858, the militia districts were reorganized and their home was redistricted into Brooks County.

The Civil War had erupted and records indicate Murdock McLeod possibly enlisted as a private for the duration of the war with Company F, 44th Regiment of Georgia Infantry on May 13th, 1862. But Murdock was already about 50 years old, and by December was furloughed by the Confederate medical director in Richmond, Virginia, diagnosed with an oblique inguinal hernia. As he was only fit for light duty, he was assigned as a hospital guard at Huguenot Springs, Virginia until detailed for limited government works in Augusta, Georgia in June 1864 to finish out the war.

Back at home, Murdock was elected Brooks County surveyor in 1868, but did not qualify. The reason is believed to be that he had not signed the Oath of Allegiance to the Union after the War of Northern Aggression. There are some unconfirmed reports that he did surveying in rural areas inhabited by Creek Indians in Alabama and Florida. They continued to farm a large land holding near Dixie, Georgia until his death about 1890. Eliza had passed away on June 27, 1903.

Murdock Murphy McLeod, the second, was commonly known as "Cap," his wife as "Maggie," and both their roots were in the area of South Georgia known as Dixie and Dry Lake Community in Brooks and Thomas Counties. He was born in Thomas County on March 15, 1851 and married Margaret Celeste Carroll (daughter of Curtis Carroll and Martha Lively) on September 15, 1875. Together they had eight children, including Jeptha Malachi McLeod on August 1, 1885.

Before he was married, the War Between the States erupted first in South Carolina, then all across the country. On Jefferson Davis' orders, recruiters fanned out across the state signing all able bodied men to defend the southland and carry the fight to threatened Virginia. The younger Murdock was only 10 years old and the south needed to keep younger men, the infirmed, and women in the fields to support the war effort with cotton and corn.

Murdock McLeod remained a quiet and unassuming farmer and faithful and active member of Evergreen Church until he died on September 17, 1939 at the home of his son, Jeptha Malachi McLeod. Maggie was an original charter member of Evergreen. She preceded Cap in death on August 19, 1929 and both are buried in the Evergreen Cemetery. During their life together, they had ten children, including Jeptha Malachi McLeod.

Jeptha married Mary Florence Corley, daughter of Isaiah Corley and Maggie Johnson, on November 1, 1914 as the country was entering World War I. When his draft notice arrived at his Rural Free Delivery box in Thomas County, he surely rode his wagon to report to the draft board. He was listed as medium height, slight build, blue eyes, black hair, and missing both legs below the knees. Jeptha had worked at the Thomasville train yards as a train inspector when a train backed over his legs and would have crippled him, but he was indomitable and could not ever be held down nor lose his sense of humor. The civil case found the train at fault and Jeptha was fashioned with artificial legs, replaced as he wore them out about every ten years. When his legs were new the hinges always squeaked when he walked, so he always kept an oil can nearby. He was always ready to go hunting, fishing, spin Irishmen jokes, split a pile of wood, fashion wooden toys for the grandkids, or just sit and smoke his pipe and philosophise while looking over the Sears and Roebuck catalog or waiting for the "rolling store" to barrel up in a



cloud of dust. He remained steadfast (Hold Fast) though retired from the railroad through disability, never losing his personal courage, sparkling wit, and happy disposition.

Jeptha was an inspiration to everyone who met him until he died of cancer on November 25, 1957 after a long year of suffering. Florence died on Christmas Day in 1970. They are both buried at Evergreen. Donald

McLeod was one of their six children.

DONALD MCLEOD

Donald McLeod was born on November 5, 1922 in Boston, Thomas County, Georgia. He attended school in Dixie, Brooks County, Georgia and was a member of Evergreen Baptist Church, Boston, Georgia. He married *

Lillian Minerva O'Neal, daughter of John Homer O'Neal and Essie Green O'Neal, on January 28, 1942 in Norfolk, Virginia. Donald served aboard the heavy cruiser USS Wichita during World War II. He was discharged from the U.S. Navy after attaining the rank of Electricians Mate First Class. He then worked as an electrician in Tallahassee, Florida until 1953 when he was accepted into civil service at the Naval Air Station, Jacksonville, Florida. He retired from the civil service job at the Naval Air Station, Jacksonville having advanced from electrician to Deputy Chief Operations and Maintenance shop. He and Lillian then sold their home in Orange Park, Florida and traveled for more than a decade. They lived in an airstream travel trailer, motor homes and finally a 40 foot fifth wheel travel trailer. They finally settled in Madison, Florida where they lived until their deaths. Donald passed away on February 9th, 2003 after complications from heart by-pass surgery. Lillian passed away September 13th, 2007. Three children resulted from this union.

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The Tolmies (featured in the book, Four Sons of Skye)


Over the last few years I have supplied short, nonscholarly articles intended to familiarize members of Clan MacLeod Society USA with the septs of MacLeod. My purpose has been to increase the general understanding (by supplying what is known, and what seems plausible of what is believed) among members of the clan society, as to who is in our family. I also wished to emphasize that our septs are as much a part of Clan MacLeod as those who bear the MacLeod surname.

Today, my purpose is slightly different. At the MacLeod World Gathering 2013 at Auckland, New Zealand, Rosalie and I happened to sit at the opening wine and cheese reception with Kevin Tolmie, Vice President of the Clan MacLeod Society of Scotland and Carol McKay, nee Tolmie, of New Zealand. Kevin and Carol gave me clearly to understand that Tolmie is not a sept, but that Tolmies are MacLeods. My new acquaintances/kinspersons provided a double revelation: 1) I never had encountered a real Tolmie, and 2) I never had encountered a sept.

"Tolmie" is listed as a sept of MacLeod in many of our references; however, Kevin and Carol were able to describe how the name of a branch of MacLeod happened to be changed. To this end, Carol provided me with a copy of a recent publication, *Four Sons of Skye: The history of a Tolmie family from Skye*; James G. McKay, Author; 2011; Toltech Print, Christchurch, New Zealand. Carol provided the volume in order to increase my understanding, but also in the hope that I might provide a brief review for publication in MacLeod circles. I should mention to our international MacLeod community that I shall conform to US standards of



grammar, spelling, and punctuation, though I personally prefer the standards of the rest of the Englishspeaking world.

It is always difficult to know what to say first in a book review. In this case, I think I should first recognize the author's clear purpose in writing. The "Four Sons of Skye," to whom the author refers, are great-great-great-uncles of the author and early (not counting the

Maori people) settlers in the Otago/Dunedin region of South Island, New Zealand. The volume, then, is an homage to forebears, but it is also a history of specific interest to Tolmies, and of general interest to all MacLeods. It is, additionally, a history of a very Scottish region of New Zealand, something to which few outside of New Zealand have been exposed. (Full disclosure: My spouse Rosalie and I love New Zealand. The recent MacLeod World Gathering in Auckland was our third, and probably last, trip to New Zealand.)

In brief outline, we must start the story in the mid-14th Century with Torquil Og MacLeod, 5th Chief of Lewis. The first son of Torquil Og and Margaret MacNicol was Roderick Ruaridhri Mor MacLeod, who became 5th Chief of Lewis. Second son Neil MacLeod was given MacLeod lands in Gairloch. He is known as 1st of Gairloch. Though MacLeod lands never encompassed all of Gairloch by any means (Gairloch having been pretty much identical with present-day Ross and Cromarty), but were extensive. Neil Og MacLeod, 2nd of Gairloch (we are now in the early 15th Century) enjoyed the favor of James 1st of Scotland, who granted him even more lands in Gairloch beyond those Neil Og had inherited. (A very old pattern in Scotland is that the king granted lands to those he favored, but it was up to whomever received the grant to drive off or otherwise dispose of the previous owners or occupants, usually aided by a "fire and sword" authorization accompanying the grant.) A key element in understanding MacLeod problems in Gairloch is that the MacKenzies and MacLeods of Gairloch were, at least briefly, united by the marriage of the inoffensive Allan MacLeod, 4th of Gairloch, to a MacKenzie. Allan's brothers attempted to forestall what they perceived as MacKenzie land ambitions in Gairloch by killing Allan and his two sons by the MacKenzie wife. The MacKenzies, armed with the not uncommon "fire and sword" commission granted by King James IV, promptly obtained revenge by killing Allan's brothers. A further intervention of King James IV awarded most of the MacLeod lands in Gairloch to the MacKenzies. Roderick (known among his contemporaries in Gairloch as Roderick MacLeod the Venomous), Allan MacLeod's son by a second wife, was as treacherous as his two uncles. In an attempt to secure the island of Raasay and the remaining MacLeod lands of Gairloch for his own heirs, he invited all the legitimate heirs (fellow MacLeods) to a banquet and murdered them all. Remember that the MacLeods and MacKenzies of Gairloch were sufficiently intermarried that they were really one family. Many of those murdered by Roderick were MacKenzie nephews and relatives. MacKenzie reprisal resulted in the effective loss of the rest of the MacLeod lands in Gairloch.

All this is to explain how a MacLeod became the progenitor of the Tolmies. By year 1610, the MacLeod resistance in Gairloch was continuing. The nearest heir of Allan MacLeod, 4th of Gairloch, was a prisoner of the MacKenzies. John Tolmach MacLeod, still at liberty, was the next most legitimate claimant to the ancient land rights of MacLeod in Gairloch. If he were to be captured or put to death, the land conflict would be settled in favor of the MacKenzies. The MacKenzies again appealed to the king (a different king this time – James VI), who basically forgave the MacKenzies for any wrongs they might have committed, and basically named the remaining MacLeod combatants as outlaws. John Tolmach MacLeod, accurately perceiving the battle for MacLeod lands in Gairloch as lost, signaled that he was resigning from the conflict by dropping the MacLeod name and becoming known as "John Tolmach." This may have saved his life, and it preserved a whole line of MacLeods who now exist under the name that has become "Tolmie" or variants thereof. Ironically, MacLeods of Gairloch and their descendants, under the name of Tolmie, continued to intermarry with MacKenzies. In the final analysis, the conflict and treachery were not so much attributable to either clan as such, but to treacherous individuals. All this is said at greater length, more colorfully, and in greater and more fascinating detail by author James McKay.

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In addition to the saga of the Tolmie diaspora, I personally find McKay's volume interesting because of the family trees in Chapter 2 and Appendix B. I am one of the MacLeod descendants fortunate enough to have a purported family line back to the chiefs and to their many Norse Viking forebears. The family trees McKay provides name many familiar, to me, names - not only the MacLeod lines. but the family trees of Scots of other clans, whom Tolmies married. (There were very few marriages of Scots in New Zealand, in the early generations, who did not marry other Scots.) When I am asked, though an amateur, to give a talk on genealogy, I always remind the audience that, with a two to seven percent (arguably) probability per generation of a "non-paternal event," very few of us who purportedly see our ways back twenty or thirty generations are really who we think we are. It is an interesting hobby, though, and one learns a lot of geography and history pursuing it. (The "nonpaternal event" category is not restricted to infidelity, though it includes infidelity.)

At any rate, *Four Sons of Skye: The history of a Tolmie family from Skye* is not only a work of love by James G. McKay, but a delightful and informative volume. I recommend it.

MacLeod World Gathering in Auckland New Zealand 2013

We were extremely excited to make the long trip from Chicago to Auckland last November to attend the Clan MacLeod World Gathering. It had been nearly 23 years since our last visit where we traveled predominately on the South Island. This time we would explore and take in the sights around the city of Auckland and the North Island. We toured many of the attractions in the city of Auckland before heading to Rotorua, Taupo, and Waipu. The weather cooperated with temperatures in the F 70s and very little rain which helped make the scenery much more amazing.

The Botanical Gardens were spectacular with beautiful views and vast array of flowers and plants. We were also treated to both an indoor and outdoor display of art and sculpture. Rotorua was the place for geysers, hot mineral pools, and boiling mud pots. The Government Gardens near

Lake Rotorua were laid out in a Victorian manner, and the Tudor bathhouse, originally the spa, now a museum of art and history, was a place where you could learn about the Maori culture and artwork, including traditional Maori carving. At Lake Taupo, we took an early morning brunch cruise and visited many of the picturesque sites along the shores of the lake.

Driving just a bit north, we headed to Waipu to visit the place where Norman McLeod brought his parishioners from Nova Scotia to New Zealand. Visiting the local museum gave us the opportunity to refresh the history that led to the long migration from Canada.

Next day, the 20th, we drove our rental car back to Auckland and to the start of the World Gathering at the Ellerslie Center. That evening, following registration, we Clan MacLeod Society USA

mingled with the other guests for a wine and cheese social. The next morning a large group of MacLeods gathered for the beginning of the event. A traditional Maori welcome started the World Gathering.

Although we don't know the language, or gestures, the warrior makes his intensions clear! An olive branch was picked up by ACMS President John Davidson Kelley, and our welcome was given. Next, we lined up for our entrance to the event center. We were led by the Clan MacLeod Pipe Band from Bendigo, Australia and followed by our New Zealand hosts and the rest of Clan MacLeod Societies. Banners waving, we carried the flags of our Chiefs and marched into the hall to the sound of the pipes.

Laurence McLeod, President of the New Zealand Society helped to officially open the gathering. We then received a personal and warm welcome from Dame Catherine Tizard, past Mayor of Auckland and retired Governor General of NZ. Honored guests included Chief Torquil Donald MacLeod of the Lewes and Chief John of the MacLeods of Raasay.


The day also included many workshops such as flax weaving and genealogy. After lunch, John Davidson Kelley presided over the ACMS meeting which allowed the introduction of attending society officers.

"LOCAL HERO"

Recommended by Jack Lewis



PG 111 mins., Comedy/ Drama/Romance, 1983 (USA). Written and directed by Bill Forsyth. DVD available to rent at Netflix or purchase at Amazon instant video and DVD purchase.

I first became familiar with this movie through its soundtrack, written and produced by guitarist Mark Knopfler of Dire Straits. In fact, I enjoyed the music of this feature for decades before seeing the film. *Local Hero* is a 1983 British

comedy-drama written and directed by Bill Forsyth and starring Peter Riegert, Denis Lawson, Peter Capaldi (now the current Doctor Who), and Burt Lancaster. *Local Hero* was filmed in several locations around Scotland, with Pennan filling in for the fictional village of Ferness, and beach scenes shot at Morar and Arisaig on the west coast.

Riegert plays an American oil company rep sent by his eccentric boss (an over-the-top Lancaster) to basically buy up an entire village on the west coast of Scotland in order to establish a new refinery. His plans are complicated by the shrewd but quirky locals and his growing ease with the slower pace of life in the highlands. He doesn't even notice the loss of his high tech wristwatch as he falls more and more in love with the village, the locals, the one phone box, the beach, the sea, the visiting Russians, the Northern Lights, and even his savvy host's wife. Unable to seal the deal, he reluctantly returns to the States after his boss arrives to take over negotiations-which take a quite unexpected turn. The film ends with Riegert's character at home and longing for Scotland. As Knopfler's melancholy "Local Hero Theme" plays, the phone in the village's one phone box rings and rings.

In his review in BBC Home, Almar Haflidason called *Local Hero* "a wry film that slowly slips under the skin to surprising effect," concluding, "Once over, the mood of the film hits home and a longing develops to visit once again the characters of this warm and deceptively slight comedy." I totally agree.

I find that each time I've been to Scotland, I've watched *Local Hero* about a week after my return, and felt the same way. In fact, at the ceilidh during the 2010 Parliament, the band played the *Local Hero* theme. I was practically in tears!

Mr. Macleod, a financial secretary who lives in Kelvindale, Glasgow, and whose stage name is Donnie Maroot, was afterwards congratulated on the phone by staff from the bar in Adelaide where the previous record of 549 was set by Australian comic Anthony Lehmann in 2005.



REMEMBERING – RELIVING A FIGHT FOR INDEPENDENCE:

Blàr Allt a' Bhonnaich (Scottish Gaelic for Battle of Bannockburn) took place on 24 June 1314, a date that all Scots and Scots Enthusiasts will be talking about this year -2014 - and years to come.

The Scottish Referendum on 18 September 2014 is another date that all Scots and Scots Enthusiasts will be talking about this year and years to come.

2014 is going to be a time for remembering, reliving, and creating epic moments in Scottish History. We start by celebrating and remembering the Battle of Bannockburn which occurred 700 years ago this summer. If you read any number of history books – both Scottish-written or written by others on the subject - you will be sure to find various accounts of the battle: the strategy, tactics, and pivotal moments in the battle. Each account has its own 'interpretation' and possibly its own embellishment surrounding the facts of the battle. The perspective each one brings to each side of the table provides a reader with the opportunity to envision what occurred, and an opportunity to try to understand how, why, when, what occurred during that influential period in Scotland's History. Readers will go on to share their findings and engage in conversation with others who have read these accounts, and possibly had a different perspective on the events that occurred that day in 1314.

The one thing that will be certain is that both sides will take away something they didn't know before, or gain a better understanding of another view point. The reality is, none of us were there, and the few that were there wrote from their vantage point as well. Scholars and historians will debate and continue to write about all the finite details. Sometimes they will agree upon these points, and sometimes they will agree to disagree.

One thing we all can agree upon is that in that moment in time, a proud Scottish nation stood proudly together, and won their independence. Years would pass and Scottish history would continue to be shaped and reformed into a new reality for its inhabitants. More wars and many ACTS of legislation would be passed to constitute a new government, or a new union of sorts.

Let's jump 700 years forward to September 2014. 'This date is just a few months away, and yet the topic is still the same. The conversation and much debated topic regarding Scottish independence is stirring in the bushes and finding its way into conversations of both Scots and Scots Enthusiasts. We are at another pivotal time in relation to the native Scots either wanting or not wanting independence from British rule, and the lengths to which they will fight for it. I don't think this battle will be fought on the fields or marshy grounds by thousands of knights and nobles, freemen and tenants, town dwellers and traders equipped with spears, farm equipment, swords, shields, and the like. This battle will be more political and each side will use weapons of words and diplomacy to advance their cause, fought in government buildings, in the hallways, and in the media.

Do not be fooled: the moment and time will be as epic as the bloody siege that occurred 700 years ago, and will be a story that many historians, scholars, and politicians will talk about for the years and centuries to come. There are many perspectives to this battle, just as there were during any Scottish battle for independence in the past. Only native Scots living in Scotland will be able to cast their vote when September rolls around. The outcome is yet to be determined and written about. The battle plans and tactics have been carefully considered and laid out, and each side continues to pursue their agenda and hope for victory. Scotland's quest for independence will be fought for again, and history will be written yet again.

Judy Kay McClure Wisehart February 8, 1943 – October 30, 2013

Judy was born February 8, 1943 in Lynwood, California and passed away on Wednesday, October 30, 2013 in Louisville, Colorado. She is survived by her husband of 44 years, Rex Wisehart, her children Greg and Cristina Jones of Broomfield, Colorado and Kevin and Heather Wisehart of Massachusetts, and grandchildren Mackenzie, Kayleigh and Harrison.

In an organization like the Clan MacLeod Society, when a person like Judy has been in a leadership role for so many years it is inevitable that no one person knows the whole story of how many lives she touched. She was the recipient of the 2011 Clans Person of the Year Award, which always acknowledges many years of service in many capacities, and only hints at her tremendous legacy.

Some of us came to know Judy only recently as the tireless Coordinator of the CMS USA Denver AGM in 2007, a successful event she seemed to have personally cut and pressed and stitched together. She was a kiltmaker and teacher at logistically impossible workshops; a craftsperson and artist; a mentor, confidante and confessor to more than a few, and a person with significant administrative responsibilities as the CMS USA Southwest RVP. Her joy in the accomplishments by her children and grandchildren in the Scottish arts was extraordinary, infectious, and absolute.
