Parker, Owendale; her seven sons Edward and William Severn, at home, Peter Severn, of Owendale, Nelson, Charles and Frank Sev-

ern, of Elkton, and George Severn, of Cass City; her two brothers, Telesfore St. John, of Seattle, Washington and Peter St. John, of Canada; 33 grandchild-ren and 14 great-grandchildren. Her husband and infant son pre-

ceeded her in death several years ago. Funeral services were conduct-
