





We will have a Voter's Assembly meeting after church services on October 11th. The Budget needs to be approved (copy attached), along with some transfers of members into Immanuel. Also, Elections for four offices, with the Treasurer position being the only one without a candidate. Please prayerfully consider taking on this role, and contact Marsha Kenton or Carol Frase.

The Budget for 2021 is slightly lower than 2020. The changes will be discussed at the meeting, but please continue to send in your gifts and pledges. Our membership and attendance fluctuate, but our expenses continue. You can bring your gifts to church on Sunday, drop them off at the office or mail them, or go online to https://www.ilcpreston.org/ and click on the Donate button at the top to give via PayPal or credit card.

Another reminder: Pastor David successfully applied for a grant in October of 2019 toward his student loans for seminary. It is a requirement of this District grant that the congregation commit to contribute some funds in advance of his applying for the grant. Last year, the Council approved \$1,500. Earlier this year, we setup a Special Funds designation (Pastor's Grant Fund) for collecting gifts toward a contribution this year. That fund is current at \$1,339.12. It would be great if we can reach \$1,500 or more again this year. Please consider a gift prior to September 15th, so we can work on the Application early this year.

Also, if you want to donate stocks or other legacy gifts to Immanuel, remember that we can receive stock through the LCMS Foundation. Carol has that information at the office if needed.

It's something I need to be reminded of regularly. Especially during times that are not routine or are unexpected, or when it becomes apparent that so little is in our control.

My hope is not in my circumstances. Your hope is not in your circumstances. Our hope is not in our circumstances. Our hope is secure.

The work has been completed.

Our hope is secure and complete because of the work of Christ.

Our hope is secure, yet our circumstances are always changing. For parents, the stages their children are in are always changing. So often our careers change regardless of what we had hoped for. This pandemic we are living in quickly changed circumstances for everyone.

God Has Seen Others Go through This Before

Noah's story is a great example of this. His circumstances changed in a big way when God let him know a flood was coming and he was to build an ark. It was not routine for Noah to build a giant boat. Before God told him, Noah did not expect the whole earth to flood. Noah had no control over the floodwaters or what those around him were doing.

In the account of Noah, the Bible says over and over again the rain prevailed, the waters prevailed ... the circumstances became less routine, perhaps more unexpected, and while the floodwaters prevailed, there was very little Noah had control over.

Similarly, 2020 has been a year of constantly changing circumstances that for many are anything but routine. We may be in circumstances that sound like Noah's—"the floodwaters prevailed." Regardless of the year, circumstances change. Spouses die. Accidents happen. Divorce divides. Politics create chasms between people. Schools are closed. Jobs are lost. Churches shut their doors indefinitely. Children are harmed. The floodwaters prevail.

When the floodwaters recede, the topography of life looks different than before the flood. Yet regardless of topography or circumstances, our hope is secure because it is founded in Christ.

Where to Find Answers

We have a lot of questions. We have problems with no discernable answer. We have questions about our circumstances and what our lives are going to look like. We do not have the answers to it all, but we do have the answer to where our hope is found.

The answer lies outside of ourselves. The hope in our circumstances does not come from figuring out how to make our lives better. The answer is Jesus. It sounds like a cliche Sunday School answer, but it's become the Sunday School answer because it's what Scripture points us to over and over again:

But we have this treasure in jars of clay, to show that the surpassing power belongs to God and not to us. We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be manifested in our bodies. For we who live are always being given over to death for Jesus' sake, so that the life of Jesus also may be manifested in our mortal flesh. So death is at work in us, but life in you. (2 Corinthians 4:7–12)

And again,

So we do not lose heart. Though our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. For this light momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to the things that are seen but to the things that are unseen. For the things that are seen are transient, but the things that are unseen are eternal. (2 Corinthians 4:16–18)

The waters prevailed. But God remembered Noah. Moses was afraid he would stumble over his words.

God assured him He would be there.

Lazarus died, but Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life.

The Samaritan woman went to the well alone and had no husband. But Jesus gave her living water.

Circumstances change, yet our hope in Christ remains steady and firm.

CELEBRATING THE FESTIVAL OF REFORMATION DAY

On October 31, 1517, an Augustinian monk crossed a leaf-strewn courtyard to stand before the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Saxony. There he posted a series of ninety-five statements, or theses, for debate among the theologians of the Church. Little did the poor monk know that he had just set in motion a series of events that would rock the Church in Europe to its core. The monk, of course, was Martin Luther, an Augustinian Eremite. Printers soon grabbed up his theses and had them translated into German and many other languages of Europe. Soon everyone knew who Martin Luther was and joined in the debate.

The Roman curia, at the time quite hopelessly corrupt, had no interest in debate. They wanted the monk and his concerns to be silent and go away. He was interfering with the money that indulgences were intended to raise in Germany, money that funded finally the construction of the greatest Church Christendom had ever seen to honor the graves of Saints Peter and Paul in the city of Rome. But the monk wouldn't go away or be silent.

He was judged a heretic by Church officials and excommunicated by the pope. Luther was then summoned for trial before the secular authority, Emperor Charles V, at the Diet of Worms in 1521. Luther's study of the Scriptures had utterly convinced him that he was not wrong to teach that salvation was by grace alone through faith in Christ alone, and he knew that this was, in fact, what the Church had anciently taught. He refused to recant his writings in the famous words: "I am bound by the Scriptures I have quoted and my conscience is captive to the Word of God. I cannot and will not retract anything. I cannot do otherwise, here I stand, may God help me, Amen."

Lord, keep us steadfast in Your Word;
Curb those who by deceit or sword
Would wrest the kingdom from Your Son
And bring to naught all He has done.
Lord Jesus Christ, Your power make known,
For You are Lord of lords alone;
Defend Your holy Church that we
May sing Your praise eternally.
O Comforter of priceless worth,
Send peace and unity on earth;
Support us in our final strife

And lead us out of death to life. (LSB 655)

The Lutheran movement grew and spread like wildfire. Nine years after the monk stood all alone at Worms, numerous princes and representatives of the free cities stood before the same emperor at Augsburg on June 25, 1530. They proclaimed their faith in the words of the Augsburg Confession. They indicated they would rather suffer martyrdom than lose the precious Gospel of the sinner's free justification, a doctrine which had brought such consolation to them and the people of their lands. A distinctly Lutheran Church was taking shape. The heritage received from the medieval catholic Church was purified in one territory after another according to the divine Word and in conformity with the saving Gospel.

The Nursery School opened September 9, 2020 for three and four year olds, then September 15th for two year olds. It has been a good transition, with staff and students following CDC guidelines for temperature taking,

wearing masks (age appropriate), lots of hand washing, even more cleaning, and social distancing. We instituted parking lot drop off and pick up, for screening and limiting people in our classrooms. We appreciate the trust that families have in our program by putting their children in our care.

Our classes are a little different this year, in that we have one combined three and four year old class and one two year old class. This is due to guidelines from the state with COVID restrictions, and also the decrease in registrations from our local community, certainly influenced by coronavirus concerns. Sarah Durham is teaching the threes and fours. Desi Casey-Motley is teaching the two year old class and assisting with the threes and fours when not teaching twos.

September brought the stories of creation and the flood. We are using new Concordia Publishing House material that is rich with the Word, and gives so much to do with the lessons in easy to understand concepts. We're so glad we've
