In November the Vestry appointed a Director of Music/Organist Search Committee, which has been meeting regularly, reviewing the Job Description, and preparing to advertise the open position in a variety of places. Please keep the Search Committee in your prayers as they seek to find the right person to continue and expand our traditional Lutheran music program.

On Sunday, January 5, 2025, we will celebrate the Epiphany of Our Lord a day early. On Epiphany we celebrate the coming of the Wise Men (Magi) to worship Jesus, bringing with them gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. These gifts have a deep meaning. The gold points to Jesus' kingship. The frankincense points to Jesus' divinity as the Second Person of the Trinity. The myrrh points to Jesus' sacrificial death for us and the forgiveness of our sins. Epiphany is also the 12th and last day of the Twelve Days of Christmas.

May you be filled with the wonder of Mary, the obedience of Joseph, the joy of the angels, the eagerness of the shepherds, the determination of the magi, and the peace of the Christ child.

Christian Education

Our Sunday school students did a great job presenting the Christmas story to the congregation on December 15th! Many thanks to our adult helpers: Andrea Jaggers Brown (director of visitors from the east), Chilly Lyaro (director of angels and sheep), Al Dubeck (stage manager and sound technician), as well as Gavin Elison (angel whisperer—and soloist!)

At this writing we're looking forward to the Living Nativity presented by our confirmation students and the Senior High Youth Group at 5 p.m. on Christmas Eve.

Sunday school is now on a break until January 5th, when we will celebrate Epiphany. The season of Epiphany begins with the story of the magi bringing gifts to the baby Jesus. Augustus' tradition is to bring gifts for the needy children in our area on Epiphany and you don't have to be a Sunday school student to participate! Please bring diapers, wipes and other baby needs in the first couple of weeks of January and we will get them to St. James' Outreach House which serves nearly 200 families in our area. I will have a basket at the bottom of the stairs leading to my office for gifts from non-Sunday school students. Thank you for your generosity!

After Christmas many of us think about our resolutions for the new year. How about a resolution to attend church more often as a family? I know from personal experience that this can be a challenging endeavor. Children are often loud, wiggly, and contrary—but so are adults! Quiet or loud, wiggly or calm, contrary or complacent--everyone aged 9 minutes to 199 years has a place in worship at Augustus. Here's some tips for attending church with your children:

- We provide children's activity bags including a learning sheet related to the day's lessons. You can also make your own Sunday activity bag for younger children with small toys that are only for Sundays—this helps mark Sunday as a special day.
- Many parents like to sit either near the front of the sanctuary or on the balcony where children can see and hear everything.
- As children get older, it helps to follow the parts of the service with your child. Children learn liturgical behavior by copying you.

• If you do feel the need to leave the sanctuary, there is a comfy couch and books in the upper Muhlenberg center near a bathroom with a changing table. There is a speaker in that area so you will be able to hear the service, and you can re-enter when you and your child are ready.

One final note: I have to say thank you to Laurie Mueller for enriching our education programs with her musical and teaching talents for so many years.

We are all sorry to see her go but we wish her the best in her new position.

I hope you all have a very Merry Christmas and a wonderful new year!

Full-Time Stewards

God has created and designated us to be his stewards (Genesis 1:28-30). He has charged us with the care and management of his creation. Our responsibilities as his stewards are not in effect only at certain times of the day or days of the week or month. We are not stewards merely on Sundays or other special days. As stewards for Christ, we are to be devoted to full-time effort and commitment to serve the Lord with our lives and possessions. Stewardship involves our entire being, our entire time, and our entire resources. We are not passive managers but active and involved. We are to commit all that we are, all that we have, and all that we will be to God's glory. First Peter 4:10 reads, "Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others faithfully administering God's grace in its various forms."

Stewards act as partners with God. Paul tells us, "For we are God's fellow workers" (1 Corinthians 3:9). As our senior partner, God provides everything we need to make our work as "fellow workers" possible. To further his kingdom, we are called to exercise our intelligence and resourcefulness. We are God's instruments through which he works. In essence, we are God's hands, feet, and mouth.

Not only are we God's partners, we are his children. He gives us the privileges and the duties of children. God loves, protects, and provides for us. It is the privilege and the duty of the child to be with, talk to, trust in, love, and obey his father. God has been faithful to us; shall we not be faithful as good children and stewards to him who gives our lives direction, purpose, and hope? Our heavenly Father expects us to be faithful stewards of all that he entrusts to us. "Now it is required that those who have been given a trust must prove faithful" (1 Corinthians 4:2). In Romans 14:12 we read, "So then, each of us will give an account of himself

to God." We will be accountable for what we did with his gifts of time, talents, and treasures.



As stewards, we are shaped and transformed by the Holy Spirit. God energizes and equips us for our stewardship journey. God does all and provides all things to make our stewardship lifestyle possible. As we diligently and faithfully serve him, we will hear his words, "Well done, good and faithful servant!" (Matthew 25:23).

The account in Luke 17:11-19 of Jesus' healing of the ten lepers is very familiar to us. After getting official clearance from the priests who verified that they were indeed cured of the dreadful disease, nine of them went their joyful way, completely forgetting about Jesus who had answered their pleas. Thank him with your words of thanksgiving. Thank him with deeds of service to others. Thank him with giving your money. Thank him with your life, for he gave his for you.




The Golden Rule


