HEMPSTEAD, NY: Nassau County Bar Association gives Long Island Council of Churches \$20,000 grant for its Nassau County emergency food program.

The Long Island Council of Churches (LICC) received a \$20,000 grant from Nassau County Bar Association to support its emergency food program in Nassau County.

"We're most grateful to the WE CARE Advisory Board of the Nassau County Bar Association for its generous support. The grant helped us keep up with the increased number of hungry guests we're feeding, and to convert our small Hempstead satellite pantry into a full-fledged emergency food center. This allows us to feed more people and give them the food they need. We're feeding nearly 250 guests a month in Hempstead and giving them enough food for three days," said the Rev. Tom Goodhue, the LICC's Executive Director. "In October of 2015 the Freeport and Hempstead Food Centers fed a combined all-time high of 1,812, and the number of seniors continues to increase," Goodhue added.

"We're seeing both an increase in the number of seniors and an increase in the number of families who have to come for food more than once a month," said Freeport Emergency Food Center manager Wally Merna. He added that the Freeport Food Center fed 500 more in 2015 than in the previous year, including 161 more seniors.

The Long Island Council of Churches, the region's largest ecumenical and interfaith organization, is a faith-based, non-profit emergency food and social service agency. For 47 years the LICC has brought together hundreds of faith communities to respond rapidly to the emergency needs of the least fortunate. The agency collaborates with more than 50 public and private health and social service agencies to provide emergency food and essential social services to Long Islanders in crisis. In 2015 the LICC fed 22,180 hungry Long Islanders 199,620 meals and provided additional family support services to another 9,722. Total numbers served exceeded 31,900.

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
