## CONTROL BIDDING

Control Bidding is an important tool we can use to investigate the possibilities of playing Slam, at relatively low levels.


## When can we make a control bid?

RULES: We will only make control bids when all three of the below conditions are met.

## 1. We are committed to game.

2. We have established a fit. 3. We want to explore Slam.

What is a control bid? When all of the above conditions are met, any new suit will show $1^{\text {st }}$ round control in the suit bid. $1^{\text {st }}$ round control means that the $1^{\text {st }}$ time the suit in question is led, we can win the trick. $1^{\text {st }}$ round control can mean one of two things;

1. The Ace in the suit we're bidding
2. A Void in the suit we're bidding


## Yes we can and should make a control bid

## RULES:

1. When we decide to make a control bid, but have more than one control, we always bid the control that is at the lowest available level.
2. Bidding the trump suit will never show control in that suit. In fact, returning to the trump suit shows no controls below that bid.

The bid of 3 Spades, with the hand to the left, follows the rules. We have 3 controls to show, but we always have to start with the lowest available control. If we decided to bid 4 Diamonds, we would in fact be denying a control in the Spade suit. The bid of 4 Hearts would deny the ability to show a control.

After our 3 Spade control bid, our partner bids 4 Clubs.

This is another control bid.
Partner is showing $1^{\text {st }}$ round control in the Club suit.

Whenever we start a control bidding sequence, any other, non-trump suit, bid will show a control in that suit.
(and the desire to play slam)
If partner didn't have a control or, lacked the desire to continue to explore slam, they would have returned to the trump suit.
(4 Hearts)

The cool thing about control bidding at low levels, is that it frequently gives us the best of all worlds.

We could bid 4NT with this hand, but we still have room below 4NT to make a control bid. Why not use it?

After 4 Diamonds our partner bids 4 Spades. What could this be showing?

## RULE:

The $2^{\text {nd }}$ control bid in a suit will show $2^{\text {nd }}$ round control of that suit.

So the 4 Spade bid by partner is showing $2^{\text {nd }}$ round control in the Spade suit. $2^{\text {nd }}$ Round Control Is either a protected King or a singleton

So, here's what we know so far;

- Partner has $1^{\text {st }}$ round control in Clubs
- Partner has $2^{\text {nd }}$ round control in Spades

What else do we need to discover? How do we get the information we need?


It looks like all we need to know now is whether partner has $2^{\text {nd }}$ round control of Diamonds.

We get that information by giving partner the chance to show this control.
We actually have two ways to do this;

1. We can go through Keycard

- Bid 4NT $1^{\text {st }}$ then 5 NT to ask for Kings

2. We can simply continue our control bidding sequence

We continue by showing $2^{\text {nd }}$ round control in Clubs and this allows partner to show $2^{\text {nd }}$ round control in Diamonds ©

Before we get to our final contract, let's look at this problem from the other side of the table.

Our partner has opened 2 Clubs, we've responded the obligatory 2 Diamonds and now partner bids 2 Hearts.

## Remember, we can not begin to control bid

 until we've established a fitWe bid 3 Hearts with this hand because we actually have a lot of extra values, and we know we have a good Heart fit. If we bid 4 Hearts, we would be showing a very weak hand, that just has enough for game opposite partner's strength

Partner next bids 3 Spades. What is that bid?

Let's see....
Are we in a game forcing auction? YES Have we established a fit? YES

This must be a control bid!! Now we also know that partner has interest in playing Slam.
(She would have simply bid 4 Hearts with no Slam interest)


Now that partner has made their control bid, we can assess our hand. The question we should always ask is; Do we think we have a chance to play slam?

Our partner has 22+ points and, by making a control bid, shows an interest in exploring slam. Our hand is outstanding because of our fit and our shape. We want to cooperate with our partner in the pursuit of slam. We do this by showing a control of our own.

We have a $1^{\text {st }}$ round control on this hand, and it's in Clubs. Remember, a void is just as good (usually better) than an Ace of a suit. We show this to partner by bidding 4 Clubs. We are communicating our interest in slam as well.

Our partner has shown another control in
Diamonds, so what now?
Both of partner's control bids look really good with our hand. They have shown $1^{\text {st }}$ round control of two suits that we have $2^{\text {nd }}$ round control in ©

Here we can continue our description by bidding 4 Spades!

## RULE:

The $2^{\text {nd }}$ control bid in a suit will show $2^{\text {nd }}$ round control of that suit.

Our partner already showed $1^{\text {st }}$ round control of Spades, so our 4 Spade bid should be showing $2^{\text {nd }}$ round control at this point. Notice we also have $2^{\text {nd }}$ round control of Diamonds, but Spades is the lowest available bid


Now we simply complete the description of our hand. The only thing left to tell partner is our $2^{\text {nd }}$ round control of the Diamond Suit.

We do this by bidding 5 Diamonds.
Tip: Don't rush these situations. We could have bid 6 Hearts a long time ago, but why not use the room to investigate even greater possibilities.

Now back to our final bid....

The final bid was 7 Hearts!!

After North's 5 Diamond bid, the South hand has enough to give this Grand Slam a shot.

Looks like our control bidding got us to a terrific Grand Slam!!


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
