# Another Great Summer at Horseshoe!

## Summer camp week 1

This camp week started like any other. When the Week 1 scouts arrived, we unpacked, took a tour of the camp, and then walked down to the pool for swim tests. That night the troops competed in marching before dinner, with our troop taking the first trophy of the week.

On Monday the campers started to go to merit badges and the camp had its first camp-wide game, the scavenger hunt. This year's theme was a spinoff of the "Avengers" called the "Scavengers".

Tuesday night was the inter-troop archery meet where each troop sent their best archers to compete and gain the right to call themselves the best archers in the Loop of the Octoraro Bend. Also on Tuesday night, which was troop night, our troop had the Annual Troop 78 auction in which all the scouts brought an item and some money and had a bidding war for food, scout patches, and camping gear, etc.

Wednesday was a fun-filled day including the inter-troop track meet and the Winter Olympics in summer.

Thursday was the weekly outpost where all the troops cook their own meals and certain merit badges stayed overnight outside of the troop campsites. On Thursday night our troop had a campfire that included multiple songs, cheers, and a chant from each patrol.

Friday the camp hosted a swim meet in the morning. During lunch on Friday the camp staff presented the daily game by "protesting" the way the camp was being run. The scouts were asked to split up into patrols in an attempt to round up the rebellious staff, it was a Staff Hunt.

On Saturday, the camp invited the scout's parents to come down and visit the camp. Although all the scouts were happy to see their parents, a staff member, Brennan Kohl, was feeling down (Poor Brennan Feeling Down: PBFDF). In an attempt to cheer him up the Campcraft staff created a Paul Bunyan themed event called Paul Bunyan Field Day (PBFDF). All troops competed in multiple scout skill events such as the heaving bar, giant clove hitch, two-man saw, and many others. Troop 78 kept our 30+ year win streak alive, coming in first place again.

Saturday night the camp had a ceremonial campfire where scouts got patches for all the things they accomplished throughout the week. The Silver Buckle Award, for best exemplifying the Scout Oath and Law during the troop's week in camp, went to Nathan Motel.

By the end of the week our troop won marching five times, the Scavengers hunt, the staff hunt, the track meet, the obstacle course, Paul Bunyan Field Day and the Clean Camp Award. On Sunday the Week 1 scouts said good-bye to camp and we had our final fall-in of another great week at Horseshoe.



## Summer Camp Week 2

As many scouts stayed for Week 1, some did leave and a few new scouts arrived for Week 2. Those who just arrived had to take the swim test, but when all that was done, it was the official start of the week! Sunday also marked the first day of marching, for the second week of course. Even though we lost once in marching to Troop 50 and a heatwave on Monday, it did not conquer the spirits of anybody throughout the whole week, and we did win marching 5 times.

Like many of the days, it was very similar in camp: food then merit badges, some more food, and more merit badges, and then some marching and even more food. Something that was different depending on the day, was the fun games. On Monday night, the scouts had to find items that upgraded each time. Unfortunately, many of the items were almost impossible to obtain but fortunately our efforts were enough as the troop placed in first among all other troops at camp. Similar games and competitions continued through the week like inter-troop shoots, swim and track meets, and the most loved Turtle Derby!

At the end of the week, the camp's Aquatic Director, Christian Miller and his staff thought for whatever reason it was a good idea to be the first department in camp to be on Mars. (Crazy idea Christian...). So the Water Carnival had a Martian theme. Troop 78 placed first overall which was a bit of a surprise!

At the Saturday Night Campfire, the staff congratulated the scouts on their achievements throughout the week. Chris St. Clair received the Silver Buckle. This award is given to the Scout who best exemplifies the Scout Oath and Law during the week in camp.

The year of 2018 Summer Camp was an absolute success and the troop is looking forward to Summer Camp in 2019 and many years to come.

**August 4 - August 11, 2018**

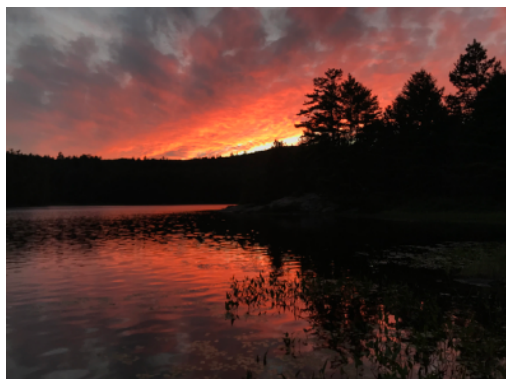

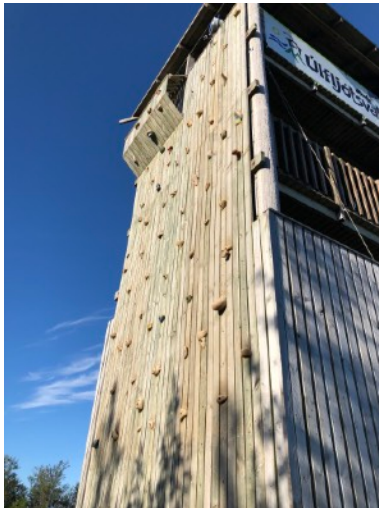
# Ulfljotsvatn: the Northern-most Scout Camp in the World

## Update Your Youth Protection Training (YPT)

**All Adult Leaders Need to Update Their Youth Protection Training**

**Deadline September 30, 2018 !!!**

The BSA has recently introduced newly updated youth protection training that is **required for all registered adults and volunteers by September 30th, 2018**. Anyone who took the old training prior to the February 2018 rollout is required to be recertified again.

The updated training includes three modules and a test that takes a little over an hour to complete. Once completed, this training will cover Chester County Council volunteers through the end of 2019.

To get started, it is highly recommended you use **Google Chrome browser**. Go to <http://my.scouting.org> and sign in using your Username and Password. Click on the 'Begins with Youth Protection' symbol or click on 'Menu' in upper left corner and select 'My Dashboard'.

I recommend you read the 'How to Guide for Taking Youth Protection Training' PDF for detailed instructions. There seems to be a delay between 'Add Plan' and the 'Launch Course' button appearing. Based on my experience with the new training you should plan on at least 90 minutes to complete the training. **Don't delay, take it today!**

# National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT)

## Why ??? I'll Tell You Why !

My first contact with NYLT began three years ago when I attended a weeklong course at Camp Mack in the PA Dutch Council. You may wonder why it matters to participate in any of the BSA leadership training programs. To be successful in leadership positions in your unit you need to understand that position. You should know your responsibilities in that position, and what your patrol or unit will expect from you. You should also understand unit structure. You can gain that knowledge by attending a BSA youth training program.

The Introduction to Leadership Skills for Troops (ILST) is the first level of youth leadership training in the BSA. This program covers basic information any young leader should know before serving in any youth leadership positions within his unit. The council or the troop provides this training.

The next level of youth leadership training is NYLT. Boy Scouts, who have earned first class rank, are at least 13 years old, and who completed ILST training can participate in this program. NYLT further explores the youth leadership role in the unit. It teaches what a leader needs to BE, should KNOW, and must DO. When you learn what the BE and KNOW are, you must remember to DO it in your troop.

The NYLT training takes place outdoors through challenging and action-packed activities. Each participant has an opportunity to lead his patrol as a patrol leader and practice newly acquired leadership skills such as conflict resolution and communication. At the end of the NYLT program, participants receive evaluations, which the scout can use to focus on improving specific leadership skills and traits.

The National Advanced Youth Leadership Experience (NAYLE) is the highest leadership training for youth. Philmont, Northern Tier, Florida Sea Base, and The Summit in West Virginia each offer a NAYLE program. The program incorporates high adventure activities specific to each base.

At the end of NYLT, the staff asked me whether I would come back on staff if asked. Obviously, I said yes. So now, that is where my yearly summer adventure starts. I have been on NYLT staff at PA Dutch Council for two years. With each season helping to train new youth leaders, I am also improving my own leadership skills.

This summer I had the privilege to attend a National Youth Leadership Academy in Washington, DC, where I met scouts from many different councils. The moment we arrived, Academy staff welcomed us with shenanigans, which continued throughout the week. We shared stories and tips on how to run an effective and exciting NYLT program at everyone's home council. We discussed, as a group, the problems we face when running NYLT programs at our home councils. Each evening we worked on presentations for the next day so that we could practice our presentation skills.

Each day we listened to experienced public speakers. We observed how they deliver their presentations and how they handle themselves in front of an audience. Among program guest speakers this year were Matthew Olsen, former Director of the National Counterterrorism Center, Congressman Pete Sessions, a member of the Congressional Scouting Caucus, and Captain Eileen D'Andrea, a naval civil engineer who attended the US Naval Academy.

The culminating point of our week were presentations participants of the program gave on the National Mall. After presentations, we toured the United States Capitol. It was a week filled with hard work, a lot of fun, and many memorable moments. As with each NYLT youth training program, I received my leadership evaluation.

I am writing about my summer experience in NYLT Academy to encourage scouts in our troop to consider participating in the NYLT program offered by the Chester County Council. If you are in the situation, where you cannot commit to two weekends of training in May, talk to me about the summer NYLT program offered by the PA Dutch Council. I would like to mention that the Academy program is only available for members of NYLT staff.

I had an incredible experience this summer because I attended an NYLT program three years ago. Most importantly three years back, you would have a difficult time convincing me to stand up and talk to a large audience.

Thanks to the training I received through NYLT program, I had enough confidence to deliver a presentation in front of the Lincoln Memorial.

For me, that was a huge accomplishment!
