Roser's Reflection . . .

Dear Friends,

Our Online Book Club has been reading the book Thank, Praise, Serve, and Obey: Recover the Joys of Piety by Pastor William Weedon. On pages 88 and 89, Pastor Weedon writes the following: "Sadly, many Lutherans today have never experienced this private Absolution, which their ancestors in the faith treasured as such a great gift. This is such a shame! In fact, the Lutheran Confessions flat out assert that it would be wicked for the private Absolution to be taken out of the Church. Yes, we have been wicked. And the result is that we have left many Christians all alone to struggle with the sin in their lives, rather than bathing them in the comfort of personalized forgiveness addressed to them in their tangible struggles." 
Most Lutherans have at times heard the phrase "that's too Catholic." It has most commonly been spoken when pastors have tried to return their congregations to more traditional Lutheran practices which had been previously eliminated. During the middle of the Twentieth Century, many Lutheran leaders in the US tried to "scrub" their congregations of those practices which were distinctive to Lutheran, Anglican, and Roman Catholic parishes. This was a part of an ongoing struggle among many Lutherans to distinguish themselves from Roman Catholics in order to declare "we're Americans while those Catholics are immigrants." I'm sure that it sounded really convincing being spoken by someone with a German or Norwegian accent! Lutheran seminaries and pastors in the latter part of the Twentieth Century (when I attended seminary) tried to undo the damage that these changes had caused by reinstating the practices which had been previously deemed "too Catholic."

One of the congregations that I served in Pennsylvania lamented that their pastor in the 1950's convinced them to remove the beautiful life-sized crucifix from Germany that had hung for 6 or 7 decades in their chancel. This beautiful piece of church art was replaced by a plain wooden cross suspended from the ceiling by two cables. No one knows where the crucifix ended up. As heart-breaking as this was it pales in comparison to the loss of individual confession and forgiveness!! In my ministry, I have worked to rekindle this practice in my congregations. Because this is a saccred rite performed in secrecy, parishioners who do not come for confession have no idea that it is happening. I cringe to tell you that it has been very common over the years for me to hear people's confessions who were confessing sins that they had been carrying as a burden for twenty and thirty years. Sometimes over those many years they would feel forgiven and then the doubts would creep in. In those cases, tears filled my eyes as I showed them what is taught in John 20 and announced accordingly that the word of forgiveness that I pronounce upon them is from God Himself and nothing can undo it. I have never been more confident of anything in my life than the forgiveness won by Christ upon the Cross!


It has been beautiful for me to see the relief play upon their faces as they received God's word of forgiveness - unburdening their hearts and minds forever. It has also been nauseating for me to witness this knowing that they should have been unburdened decades ago if the Lutheran churches would have been doing their job. I have read about editions of the Small Catechism that were printed in the Twentieth Century in America that moved right from Holy Baptism to the Sacrament of the Altar - completely eliminating Individual Confession and Forgiveness. How Luther would have assailed them for robbing the people of such a miraculous gift from God!

We do well to apologize to the people of God for our gross negligence, and to do everything possible to educate our members on this great treasure. As Pastor Weedon notes, Lutherans have retained the practice of Individual Confession (private confession) for the sake of the Absolution (word of forgiveness). If you are carrying burdens that you yearn to be free of, please read John 20:19-23 and give me a call. We often try to hide our sins, deny our sins, and even justify our sins - but these are not the ways to handle sins. The God-ordained thing to do with sins is to drag them into the light where they lose their power over us and we can hear that declaration from the pastor that they have been drowned to death in Christ's shed-blood and washed away. Hear what the Holy Spirit spoke through King David of old, "As distant as the east is from the west, so far has he removed our rebellious acts from us." (Psalm 103:12). If you are able to believe this - fantastic; if you're not, give me a call.
