I was able to locate two of them, but did not find the other two. I was somewhat surprised that I did not identify the others.

Rockford provided two excellent layout tours. We first stopped at Jim McQueeny's layout featuring both standard and narrow gauge. The layout is impressive due to Jim's prolific work. Each time we visit this layout we are treated with extensive amount of new work.

Our second stop was at Dick Caudle's. I think this was the first time I have seen this layout. Dick's water front scenes are just incredible. I was so impressed with some of his ships I am now considering adding one of these scenes on my own layout. 
As of this writing, we are heading off to the joint regional convention in La Crosse. I am looking forward to some great clinics and seeing some new layouts.

AP Corner

Ken Hojnacki AP Chair



When I decided to pursue being a serious model railroader over 50 years ago and joined the NMRA, I was a teenager who thought building models would be a breeze. Those were still the days of cardstock freight car sides, paper buildings and using all sorts of household-found items as modeling material. Detail parts were crude and few in number and scratchbuilding was mainstream. I tried my hand at a coal tower for my American Flyer layout using quarter inch plywood and scrap pieces from my godfather's woodshop. Suffice it to say, it turned out exceedingly bad. There weren't a lot of plastic kits available, so I tackled a Varney Casey Jones 4-6-0 kit, then, after finding a Canadian Railway Models O&W boxcar kit at a Niagara Frontier Region convention, I tried my hand at some real construction. The car came out pretty well, including full brake rigging which was not part of the kit. It got a Third Place at an NFR convention contest.

Would it win a merit award today? I doubt it—there was no AP program back then so merit awards weren't something I strove for. Over the last few decades, the proliferation of plastic car and structure kits and greater demands on our time have made scratchbuilding seem not only difficult but tedious. Many of us have a hard time getting a layout built, let alone building cars and structures to populate it. And many of us think we don't have the skills to build from sticks of wood or styrene.

I started building a tool house for my then-Sn3 railroad with a merit award in mind. I carefully began cutting wood, pre-staining and painting, and carefully gluing it together. I think it went very well, but then, I burned out after the Madison National and it still waits to be finished. However, that attempt improved my skills at cutting and assembling a wood structure. Now I am trying to overcome my fear of working with styrene—a work still in progress—but I am learning how to apply some of the same techniques I use with wood to the styrene.

My point is, your first attempts at a craftsman kit or a scratchbuilding project may not be an award winner. But if you approach it as a learning experience and are not afraid to chuck a bad job out and start again, one day you will look back on your efforts and realize you have learned to become a better modeler. Do what I do-ask other SCWD members for advice on how to do things. Our three active MMRs, Bill Ehlert, Bob Wundrock and Al Potts, will be happy to provide suggestions. And bringing that model in for merit award judging is a great way to find out where you can improve your models in response to the judges' comments. Remember, you're not competing against anyone but your own skills. It doesn't have to be a big or complex model. A simple model will get you started so the lessons learned from the judges will help you when you are ready to create that model of your hometown depot or the house where you grew up.



Start small and simple, build your skills, get feedback. I still intend on finishing that tool house even though I am no longer in Sn3. I want to know what I did well and how I can do better. And as an added benefit, I might get some of the requirements for an AP award completed at the same time.





Lights! Action! Camera! Time for your 2020 NMRA Calendar photo entries!

You're proud of your model railroad. Why not share it by submitting a photo or two for the 2020 edition of the NMRA Model Railroad Calendar? The calendar is distributed to every U.S. member as a fundraising project. To have your layout photo considered for inclusion, just follow these easy steps:

1 . Take a horizontal (landscape) format photo of your layout.

2 . Submit your photo as a digital file, as a 35mm or medium format slide (100 ISO or slower), or as a 35mm or medium format color negative (200 ISO or slower). Digital files must be at least 300 pixels per inch and 8" x 12"(minimum size of 8.6 megapixels - larger is better). Accepted file types are tiff (preferred) or jpg (highest quality only).

3. Write a caption describing the action in your shot, the scale, the builder, and the photographer. Include that information on a separate piece of paper, or as a text or .doc file on your submission CD or DVD.

4 . Please limit your entries to no more than your four best scenes.

5 . Be sure to include your address, phone number, and email with your submissions. By submitting images for the NMRA Calendar, you are giving permission to the editors to alter them as needed (cropping, smoke and lighting effects, etc.). Be sure to indicate specifically if you do NOT give permission to alter your images.




