Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I want to thank all our members and friends who have contributed so generously to the Brick Church Re-Pointing Appeal. We expect to begin this project in August. Our hope is to complete the work by early autumn.

As we continue to return to a more familiar pattern of ministry, our routine expenses have begun to return to their normal, pre-Covid-19 levels. Our ministry depends on the generous offerings of our members and friends. Offerings are received at the end of each service, through mailed in contributions, and through online giving. Please maintain regular financial support of our ministry along with your prayers and the offerings of your time and talent.

If the danger of Covid-19 continues to decrease, I will recommend to the Vestry at its August meeting that we return to our normal communion distribution practice at each of our services. That means a return to the Lutheran communion practice of distributing both the bread and the wine. I will also recommend that when the 8:00 AM service moves out of the Old Church in the fall, it return to its natural home, the Brick Church Chapel. Other possible changes must wait longer for consideration.



Although we will continue to live stream our later service for those who are unable to be with us in-person, I encourage everyone who is fully vaccinated to join us for in-person worship. The live stream and recorded service are a great gift to those who are sick and shut-in. They are not a substitute for the blessing of in-person worship. I look forward to seeing large numbers of familiar faces over the next months.

We are never alone during this stressful time. Jesus walks alongside us every step of the way.

Sharing God's Bounty

The Importance of Giving

t is not uncommon for church members to perceive in a negative way the encouragement from their church to give generously. The perception of some people is that the church is only interested in their money. Certainly, a generous giving congregation does provide the money needed by the church for its budget so the church should work hard to help people grow in their giving. However, Scripture indicates that giving is as much for the sake of the giver as it is to support the needs of the church. Pastors and church leaders understand that giving is an activity that God directs us to do. Jesus said, "Freely you have received, freely give" (Matthew 10:8). Paul wrote to the Church in Corinth about the collection for God's people, "On the first day of every week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with his income. . ." (1 Corinthians 16:2).



Giving blesses the both the giver and the recipient of the giving. The blessings to the recipients are obvious. Not as obvious but as important to understand is that giving enriches the life of the giver. Giving strengthens the relationship that we have with our Lord. Through our giving, we are reminded of God's ownership and how dependent we are on him. Giving demonstrates our faith and trust. We give as part of our worship. Giving allows us to be used by God in partnership with him.

In God's Word, we are told that those who give faithfully and generously will receive even more of God's blessings. In Proverbs 3:9 we read these encouraging words, "Honor the Lord with your wealth, with the firstfruits of all your crops; then your barns will be filled to overflowing..." God blesses all people, but he wants to bless us even more for our faithful giving. "One man give freely, yet gains even more; another withholds unduly, but comes to poverty" (Proverbs 11:24). Generosity is the path to blessing. By contrast, a stingy person doesn't make any friends and hurts himself in the long run. Through the prophet Malachi, we are told again how God will bless us for our faithful giving, "Bring the whole tithe in the storehouse that there may be food in my house. Test me in this, 'says the Lord almighty, 'and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have enough room for it" (Malachi 3:10).

In the future, we need to thank church leaders who encourage us to grow in our giving. Through our giving, we are expressing thanks to God for his goodness to us. We are also helping to extend God's kingdom through our church, providing for the needy, and enriching our own lives. As we grow spiritually and receive more of God's blessings, we will better understand and respond to the encouragement to increase our giving.

**Food Pantry donations are also accepted here at Augustus. Place your donations in the labeled basket in the Muhlenberg Center and we'll get them where they need to go.






Cemetery News

Personal Financial Stewardship

Are You Saving Enough for Retirement?

From the wisdom of Solomon, God shows us the wisdom of ants that save their provisions (Proverbs 6:6). With our anemic personal savings rate in this country of approximately 1.5 percent, we may be showing less wisdom than the ants. The Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that, in twenty years, there will be a \$45 billion retirement income shortfall. Four out of five Americans do not have enough retirement savings.

One of our top financial goals should be a comfortable retirement. To live comfortably during retirement, we can project that we will need about 80-90 of our pre-retirement income. This income will come from Social Security, pensions, and private savings. For most people Social Security benefits will provide approximately one-third of their retirement needs. If you subtract your expected social security benefits from our desired annual retirement income, the result will be the annual income gap that will have to be covered by your pension income or savings.

One of the greatest obstacles to a savings program for retirement is procrastination!



We fall into the trap of telling ourselves that retirement is a long way off, so we will start saving next month. The problem is that next month never comes. Procrastination is detrimental, because it eats up the time that money can be put to work for us.

As a general rule of thumb, if we start saving for retirement in our early 20's, we can set aside close to 10 percent of our incomes and have sufficient funds for retirement. As Solomon wrote, "... he who gathers money little by little makes it

grow" (Proverbs 13:11). However, if we wait till we are in our 40's, our saving rate will have to increase to 30 percent or more.

What Does God Look Like?

Invite everyone in your family to draw what they think God looks like. Stress that no one knows for sure, so there is no "right" answer. Have each person explain what he or she draws. Do some family members view God as happy and loving, while others have a more stern notion of God? Discuss where these notions may have originated.

Invite everyone to brainstorm more ideas about what God might look like. With these ideas in mind, read aloud these Bible verses about the images of God:

Numbers 11:10-13 describes God as mother;

Deuteronomy 4:24 describes God as fire;

Deuteronomy 32:11-12 and Exodus 19:4 desribe God as an eagle;

Psalm 18:13 describes God as thunder;

Psalm 91:4 describes God as a protective bird;

Jeremiah 17:13 describes God as water;

Luke 15:37 and John 10:27 describes God as a shepherd;

John 3:8 and Acts 2:2 describe God as wind;

John 8:12 and Isaiah 60:2 describe God as light;

John 15:1 describes Jesus as a vine and God as the grower.



Did any of the verses use images that were the same or similar to those chosen by your family members? Did anyone's ideas about God change after hearing these verses? Ask each family member to draw or create another image of God, choosing from the images above. Family members can draw pictures or they can create something that they think describes God, such as:

- a sand candle—to describe God as light;
- a felt or paper banner with tongues of fire glued on it—to describe the Holy Spirit;
- a wreath made of dried grape vines from your garden—to describe God as peace.

Note the related Bible reference with each creation. Point out that these images are not God, but that they serve to remind us of the greatness of God.

Ask each person to give thanks for one of God's images during a group prayer.

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Christian Parenting

The Age of the Believer

Children in the first through third grades are enthusiastic and eager, creative and curious. They're ready to learn. This zest for learning applies to their religion, too. This stage of life is sometimes called "the age of the believer." Church educators consider it to be one of the prime times for teaching students how to use the Bible, introducing them to church liturgies and rituals, and encouraging their participation in worship and other church functions.

As parents and caregivers, we can assist in this faith growth spurt by continuing to teach and reinforce their faith at home and by making every effort to see that they are able to attend Sunday school, worship, and other church activities. Positive experiences within their church family promote affirmative attitudes toward God and faith. They foster a sense of belonging to God and to the Christian community. This identity and these attitudes are important vehicles for the future growth of our children's faith.
