The Reverend's Ruminations - March 2025

As I hurriedly write this month's "rumination" ahead of my departure for a short vacation in warmer climes, the winds are blowing what little snow we've recently received, and the temperatures are preparing to plummet once again back to the subzero highs from which we've seemingly just escaped. We're still far from "normal" precipitation amounts this winter, but I guess every little bit should help our soil moisture in the long run.

No matter your opinion of this year's winter wonderland iteration, we always seem to find ourselves looking longingly toward the next (better?) season around the bend. I hate to break it to you, but spring is probably still a ways off; so perhaps it's appropriate that we will soon enter the forty solemn days known in the church as **Lent**. Lent will begin on Sunday, March 9th and continue until the joyous resurrection celebration of Easter (forty days not counting Sundays).

Around this time each year, I make mention of the fact that many Christians choose to give up the comfort of a favorite food, drink, or habit in order to gain a better understanding of our Savior's suffering and temptation in the wilderness. Have you done so, whether long ago or in recent years? It can be a challenging, yet worthwhile endeavor to confront such temptations in your own life; but don't beat yourself up if you happen to slip a bit. The point is to realize how pervasive temptation can be in our lives, and try to overcome at least one during Lent.

A few years ago, I shared snippets from an interesting article about the importance of the Lenten season by Rev. Sarah Phillips on <u>crosswalk.com</u>, and I thought they would be a good reminder again this year:

"...Unlike the childlike joy associated with the season of Advent, with its eager anticipation of the precious baby Jesus, Lent is an intensely penitential time as we examine our sinful natures and return to the God we have, through our own rebelliousness, hurt time and again. Lent is also an opportunity to contemplate what our Lord really did for us on the Cross – and it wasn't pretty. But ultimately, the purpose of Lent does not stop at sadness and despair – it points us to the hope of the Resurrection and the day when every tear will be dried" (Revelation 21:3).

So how do we "do" Lent? One of the most important aspects of Lent is <u>confession</u> – although not in the foreboding sense that you may be picturing from some old movie. As Rev. Phillips says, "... [the forty days of Lent] are set aside to really examine areas of recurring sin in our lives that prevent us from being conformed to God's Will... The goal is to honestly examine your life in light of God's Word and to make a commitment to change in any areas you have not submitted to the Lord." None of us have yet managed to fully live up to Christ's example, so just be honest as you examine your Christian walk, and then look for ways to make improvements – incremental as they may be.

A good way to start your own examination of conscience is by praying the words of Psalm 139:23-24: "Search me, O God, and know my heart; test me and know my thoughts. See if there is any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting." After opening yourself to God with these words, then hold up your life to the Ten Commandments. Confess to God, to me as your pastor, or to an accountability partner (as suggested in James 5:16) the ways you may have sinned against God. But don't stop there, or you may really feel stuck! Thank God for the forgiveness offered through Christ's sacrifice, and then ask God for the grace to change. You may be pleasantly surprised where and when God chooses to respond in your life.

My prayer is that you will approach Lent with a renewed sense of purpose this year, and find yourself connecting more deeply to our Savior's temptation and sacrifice in the coming weeks. **Throughout the season I invite you to pause at church each Wednesday at 5:30 pm for our 30-minute Lenten services, where we will sing, pray, and share in some additional thoughts on the gospel lessons leading us toward Easter.** Also available again this year is a professionally-published daily Lenten devotional from the United Church of Christ. Those of you familiar with their Advent devotional will enjoy the variety of images offered by a broad spectrum of contributing writers. I hope that you will find it to be a helpful guide as you journey with Jesus toward the cross – and his glorious resurrection on Easter morn (celebrated this year on April 20th). See you along the Lenten journey!

Do you have questions about the Christian faith? Who doesn't? Apologetics may sound like a foreign word, but it's quite literally defense of the faith—and it can be fascinating! I think you'll really enjoy what you uncover with **Does Christianity Still Make Sense?**

Years after Bobby Conway became a Christian, this question haunted him. Even though by then, he was the pastor of a thriving church, it seemed as if his entire belief structure was being dismantled. Had he been duped? Perhaps you can relate to how Bobby felt. Maybe you find yourself questioning in the same way.

In this video series, Bobby discusses with his son, Dawson, four key challenges to the faith:

The Council met in Heritage Hall at 5:45 PM. Moderator Kay Campe called the meeting to order and led in prayer. We celebrated family by sharing about ourselves.

Motion to approve the minutes from the meeting on 1/15/25, was M/S/C. (Amanda Forstrom/Larry Lasch)

Treasurer's Report Catherine Johnson reported that we are in good shape financially at the beginning of the year only due to several members giving their year's entire pledge already. A motion was M/S/C to move \$20,000 from the checking account capital fund to the Edward Jones reserve account. (Larry Lasch/Sue Kruse) A motion to receive the treasurer's report was M/S/C. Pastor's Report: Pastor Cory is on vacation this week. We read his report.

BOARD REPORTS:

Christian Education: No representative.

Hospitality: Terri Luetgers reported that they will be having the Pie/Ice Cream/BBQ social on June 14th during Interlaken Heritage Days. Also looking at when to serve coffee.

Facilities: Larry Lasch reported that one furnace is installed. They will be working on replacing filters and replacing the tile in the coffee room. 

MISSION MINUTE:

The Blessing Box for March is for the Minnesota Food Drive. Our donations help Heaven's Table Food Shelf. The funds are partially matched. There will be receptacles by the front and back doors for any food donations.



GMCC's Minnesota FoodShare began its work in 1982 as a campaign advanced by congregations to restock food shelves in the 7-county Twin Cities Metropolitan Area. The effort was so successful, and the need so evident, March Campaign became a statewide initiative just one year later and is now in its 44th year.

Minnesota FoodShare March Campaign, the largest grassroots food and fund drive in the state, brings together organizations, businesses, faith communities, and individuals to help stock and support the capacity of nearly 300 food shelves.

To date, GMCC's Minnesota FoodShare has distributed over \$18.5 million dollars via the FoodFund. 100% of the donations designated to Minnesota FoodShare during the March Campaign go into the FoodFund and are distributed to participating food shelves.

Creamy Dill Pickle Soup (Zupa Ogórkowa)

This is a traditional Polish soup that Sydney Hainy cooked for the 2024 Glows Parade Soup Supper fundraiser.

Ingredients:

30 g (2 tablespoons) unsalted butter

1 medium onion, finely chopped

1 medium carrot, diced small

2 celery stalks, diced small

250 g (½ lb.) pickled gherkins, diced small (optional: grate)

100 ml (½ cup) pickle juice

450 g (1 lb.) potatoes, peeled and cut into 1-inch cubes

1.25 liters (5 cups) vegetable stock

200 ml (1 cup) sour cream

30 g (½ cup) fresh dill, chopped

Salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste



Instructions:

- 1. In a large pot or Dutch oven, melt the butter over medium heat and add the onion, carrot and celery stalks. Cook for 5-6 minutes until the veggies soften slightly.
- 2. Stir in the pickled gherkins, pickle juice, potatoes and vegetable stock. Bring to a boil, then lower the heat and simmer for 20 minutes or until the potatoes are fork-tender.
- 3. Mix a ladle of soup in the sour cream to temper it, then whisk this mixture in the soup. Stir in the fresh dill and season to taste.
- 4. Serve with extra fresh dill, sliced dill pickles and rye bread (or your favorite crusty bread).
