

Seven Myths You May Mistakenly Believe About Long-Term Care

$Myth\, \#7\hbox{: Long-term care policies only cover nursing homes.}$



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Creating Beautiful, Healthy Smiles

What's Blooming At Edison And Ford Winter Estates?

If you are a gardener and step foot in any dependable nursery, you may find several different plants with the word "jasmine" in the name. Unfortunately, the name does not always give these jasmines the notoriety they deserve. True jasmines, as far




as botanical names are concerned, are in the genus Jasminum, and are part of the olive family, which is native to tropical and temperate regions of Europe and Asia. Other plants with jasmine in their common name include: confederate jasmine, pinwheel jasmine, crape jasmine, night blooming jasmine, and tree jasmine. These are just a few that thrive in our Southwest Florida climate.

Sticking your nose into some jasmines might not be what you were expecting or the fragrance you were looking forward to. Scientifically, the fragrance responsible for this

essence has been isolated as the chemical compound called 2-acetyl-1-pyrroline. This compound is present in many other plant tissues besides jasmine flowers, and interestingly one of those is pandan grass. Both pandan and jasmine sambac flowers Pinwheel jasmine are used in teas, desserts, and other culinary specialties. Jasmine rice; however, is really just a special variety of rice and doesn't contain the essential compound.

There are many species of jasmine that grow in Florida, and others are happier in C r a p ecooler climates, such as Georgia and South Carolina.

The gardens at Edison and Ford Winter Estates have many different species growing on the property, some jasmine varieties are growing in the Moonlight Garden and the Fragrance Garden. When visiting the gardens, these are some of the species that you can look for: Jasminum multiflorum or downey jasmine, Jasminum volubile or stiff wax jasmine, Jasminum nitidum or angel Tree jasmine wing jasmine, Jasminum



sambac or Arabian jasmine, Jasminum officinale or common jasmine, Jasminum azoricum or azore jasmine, and Jasminum humile or Italian jasmine.

The caveat here is that many other plants have "jasmine" in the common name, but they are not true jasmine plants. Let's take a look at some of those plants that do well in Southwest Florida. The first on my list includes the night blooming jasmine, and as the name implies, the fragrance and blooming occurs during the evening hours. Most plants that have the characteristic nighttime fragrance attract nighttime pollinators, such as moths. The Cestrum nocturnum (night blooming jasmine) can become a very large shrub, and for some, the flower's aroma can be quite overpowering. Just beware that this plant can have pest problems, so you might want to skip this one if you like your plants to look perfect.

Another non-jasmine plant is the crape jasmine and pinwheel jasmine - both are Tabernaemontana diveracata. Pinwheel jasmine has a large star-shaped flower, and the crape jasmine has double white flowers, similar to gardenias. The leaves or foliage could fool you into thinking it is a gardenia. The leaves are thick, waxy, and deep green when happy. These are ample shrubs that love our warm climate conditions. The flowers can be subtly fragrant during nighttime hours. This shrub is easy to grow and get up to 5 feet wide and tall. It has white milky sap and was one of the 17,000 different plants that Thomas Edison researched as a possible rubber source. It is in the Apocyanacea or Dogbane family (called this because it was used as dog

poison). Other more familiar ornamental plants included in the Dogbane family are periwinkle, frangipani and desert rose.

Another non-jasmine plant is actually more of a vine, and probably called confederate jasmine because it can be seen thriving in the South. I have seen it growing in Thomasville, Ga., up a two-story staircase, looking as though it wasn't afraid to keep going. This vine has twining branches that circle everything it can get its leaves around. Trachelospermum jasminoides is all worth the trouble when you see it blooming, which lasts for more than two months. Plus, the aroma is so sweet you just "got to have it." The last time this vine should be trimmed is August or September since it blooms on the new growth. Some patient gardeners enjoy growing confederate jasmine as an espalier in different shapes and patterns along a wire. The best way to see many of these blooming plants is to tour the gardens at Edison Ford.

The Garden Shoppe has plenty of fun plants with "jasmine" in the name. April is a perfect time to get outside and plant some flowers! The next Garden Talk is on April 11 and will focus on growing bulbs in Florida – they aren't jasmines, but they can be just as pretty! I hope to see you there!

difference?" I am fortunate to have more than 102 community volunteers who regularly



What is the month of April known for? April 1 is April Fool's Day. It is National Poetry Month and National Peanut Butter and Jelly Day on April 4. It is Autism Awareness Month and Couples Appreciation Month. It is also Brussels Sprouts and Cabbage Month. I love to make cabbage soup so give this one a try.

Cabbage Soup

4½ cups water

1½ cups tomato puree

- 3 packets or cubes of beef bouillon
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 3 cups shredded cabbage
- 3 medium apples, cored and diced

½ cup onion flakes or ½ onion, chopped

1 tablespoon caraway seeds

Artificial sweetener to equal two teaspoons sugar Salt and pepper to taste

Combine water, tomato puree, bouillon and lemon juice in

a saucepan. Stir well and bring to a boil. Add the remaining ingredients. Cover and simmer for 20 minutes. Makes six servings. You can also add 6 to 8 meatballs to the soup.

Lee County Yard Waste Regulations

- Do not place out for pickup more than 24 hours early.
- Yard waste must be containerized (50 pounds or less), or securely tied into bundles not heavier than 50 pounds and no longer than 6 feet in length.
- Up to 50 pounds of unbundled palm fronds may be placed at the curb. Any excess palm fronds must be tied into bundles, each weighing 50 pounds or less.
- When using plastic bags, make sure that the contents can be easily identified by the refuse truck driver (leave a twig or small branch sticking out).
- Call 239-337-0800 for a cost estimate for large-scale yard waste disposal projects when containerizing or bundling is difficult.

Kids Tag Art Winners Recognized At Annual Event

Lee County Tax Collector **Honors Students, Teachers**


A perfect piece of art: happy children, proud parents, grateful teachers. The fifth annual Kids Tag Art (KTA) recognition event was held Tuesday, Feb. 25 at the School District of Lee County headquarters. Fifth graders from around the county were recognized as "Award of Distinction" winners for their license plate designs and art teachers received much-needed funding.

Over 300 people, including teachers and families, attended the event, where two students from each of the 49 participating Lee County public elementary schools were recognized for their artwork. In all, 3,600 children submitted license plate designs.

Eagle Ridge Property Owners; Association has prevailed in the 2015 lawsuit filed against ERPOA by the three Eagle Ridge condominium associations and their members. ERPOA prevailed in the trial court in 2018, the condos and their members appealed the court's ruling. ERPOA prevailed in the appellate court in 2019.

ERPOA replaced a storm water drainpipe running from the parking lot of the Eagle Ridge Condominiums to the lake behind the buildings. This project was overseen by Jim Lutsch, was completed in September, and cost approximately \$24,000.

The Utilities Inc. [UTI] wastewater facility at Aeries Way and Twin Eagle was the subject of and administrative hearing related to a variance request filed by UTI. The variance was granted, subject to detailed requirements for erecting a nine foot high wall and installing landscaping and trees to obscure the interior of the facility as much as reasonably possible. Hewitt McCloskey, Jr., spent a substantial amount of time handling this matter. Thank you, Hewitt.

The FPL new buried service line along Aeries Way Drive and Twin Eagle Lane has not yet been finished due to the refusal of the homeowner at 7050 Twin Eagle Lane to grant an easement to FPL for the placement of the switch cabinets needed for the new system. The previous owner of the property had agreed to the easement but sold the property before executing the easement. The successor owner has hired counsel. Hopefully, an agreement will be reached, and the new service lines will become operational. The system is not operational
