Trip to the National Museum of the U.S. Marine Corps



One of many of the static displays at the museum is this WWII SBD Dauntless dive-bomber over the Tarawa exhibit. It showcases the heroic actions of the commanding officer of Marine Scout Bombing Squadron (VMSB) 232 and his observer/gunner over Guadalcanal in August 1942.

On Saturday, November 15, 2025, Richmond Navy League is planning a trip to the National Museum of the U.S. Marine Corps in Triangle, VA.

The museum is laid out in chronological phases. The overview is the Legacy Walk that moves from our colonial beginnings, through each phase of conflict or international involvement, to our present day. To gain a higher trajectory, colonial Marines built firing platforms on the ship's masts and fired cannons from those vantage points. One exhibit shows those platforms.

The Legacy Walk progresses through WWI, the Banana Wars of the 1920's, WWII, Viet Nam, Desert Storm and into Afghanistan. One exhibit shows the horror

of hand-to-hand combat in WWI. Another displays a U.S. Navy Corpsman in WWII treating a fallen Marine. Overhead hangs a De Havilland DH-4 and a UH-1E Huey helicopter among several planes. On the ground level are artillery, trucks, and vehicles from each era.

The Medal of Honor Theater daily presents its signature film, "We the Marines," which tracks a Marine from boot camp at Parris Island through typical deployments to a final homecoming.

Those who want to taste the boot camp experience can visit the "Making Marines" exhibit. Adjacent to that exhibit is the "Every Marine Is A Rifleman" laser rifle range, where we can become "snipers" for \$5 for 10 shots.

Notable October Events in U.S. Naval History:

- October 12, 2000: **USS Cole** attacked in Yemen.
- October 13, 1775: The Continental Congress established the U.S. Navy.
- October 13, 1987: The United States Navy Memorial was established, honoring those who served, or are currently serving, in the Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard and the Merchant Marine.
- October 23-26, 1944: Battle of Leyte Gulf; the largest naval battle in U.S. history with over 200,000 Navy personnel involved.
- October 23, 1983: 220 Marines, 18 Sailors, and 3 Soldiers killed in attack on U.S. headquarters in Beirut
- October 27, 1922: Established by the Navy League of the U.S. to recognize and salute all of the military personnel who have served, both past and present, in the United States Navy. In the 1970's, the "birthday" of the Navy was redefined as October 13, 1775.

(The Image of God)

uses trials and tribulations (His chisel) to remove impurities, our hidden sins, ultimately leading to spiritual growth in God's likeness, and a closer relationship with Him.

Farewell USS *Normandy* (CG-60)



The **USS Normandy (CG-60)** was decommissioned on September 25, 2025, at Naval Station Norfolk, having served nearly 36 years with the United States Navy. **Normandy** was adopted by the Richmond Navy League Council in 1995. She was our third adopted ship. Council Board member Geroge Feitig served as the Liaison to **Normandy** for over 20 years; Roy Martin and William Seaton were also council liaisons.

Normandy was a Ticonderoga class guided missile cruiser. **Normandy** was laid down at Bath Iron Works, Bath, Maine, on April 7, 1987; launched on March 19, 1988, and commissioned on December 9, 1989. She is 567 feet long, has a beam of 55 feet, a displacement of 9,500 long tons, and a top speed in excess of 30 knots. Her crew included about 50 officers and 350 enlisted sailors. **Normandy** is named for the World War II Battle of Normandy which took place in France on and following, D-Day, June 6, 1944. She was armed with naval guns and anti-air, anti-surface, and anti-submarine missiles, plus other weapons. **Normandy** is equipped for surface-to-air, surface-to-surface, and anti-submarine warfare. The cruiser was the first U.S. warship since 1945 to go to war on her maiden cruise, and in 1998 was awarded the title "Most Tomahawks shot by a U.S. Navy Cruiser".

Normandy received the Navy Unit Commendation, the National Defense Service Medal and the Southwest Asia Service Medal (with two Bronze Stars) for her efforts in support of Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm. She was awarded her second Navy Unit Commendation Medal in June 1994,

for her extensive participation in events commemorating D-Day. **Normandy** was awarded her third Navy Unit Commendation and the Meritorious Unit Commendation for her actions during her time in the Adriatic in 1995. The cruiser won the Marjorie Sterrett Battleship Funds Award for the Atlantic Fleet in 1997.

Along with the 1998 title "Most Tomahawks shot by a US Navy Cruiser", **Normandy** holds three Battle "E" Awards for overall ship-wide excellence in performance.

"The final chapter in **Normandy's** rich history comes to an end, said Commanding Officer Captain Diaz. *"Her spirit, what truly brings the ship to life, lives on inside each one of her Sailors. I'm proud to be part of her legacy, leading by example to all ships on the waterfront and showing them what right looks like".* 🇺🇸



U.S. Rear Admiral Derek Trinque, Director, Surface Warfare Division N96, Office of Naval Operations, delivered the keynote address, offering words of encouragement to the crew and reflecting on the ship's proud legacy. *"Normandy has launched in combat, trained with allies and partners, responded in crisis, and stood ready for the call – always. Today she comes to rest with pride, with dignity, with a record unmatched, and a legacy that will never be forgotten".*

Global Defense News 9/21/2025

The U.S. has deployed warships, F-35 stealth fighter jets, and Marines to the Caribbean near Venezuela. The buildup, framed as counter-narcotics, signals readiness for possible strikes. Naval power in the region has expanded significantly. At least three Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyers, **USS Jason Dunham**, **USS Gravelly**, and **USS Sampson**, are now operating off the Venezuelan coast. Each is equipped with more than 90 vertical launch cells capable of firing Tomahawk cruise missiles, surface-to-air interceptors, and anti-submarine weapons. These ships form the core of a high-readiness strike group with the ability to engage multiple targets simultaneously across air, land, and sea.

Since Labor Day weekend, the 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit has been drilling with the National Guard in southern Puerto Rico. The nearly 4,500 sailors and Marines of **USS Iwo Jima** Amphibious Ready Group recently deployed from Norfolk. The Norfolk-based destroyer **USS Gravelly** and the submarine **USS Newport News** are also in the region. In a statement to WHRO, Col. Chris Devine, senior Department of Defense spokesman, said "the Secretary of Defense directed the **Iwo Jima** Amphibious Ready Group/22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit and the Ticonderoga-class guided-missile cruiser **USS Lake Erie** to the U.S. Southern Command."

Portsmouth, VA (WAVY)

The crew of the Coast Guard Cutter **Spencer** returned to their homeport in Portsmouth, VA, Wednesday, September 17, which concluded an 83-day maritime border security patrol.

The patrol, which was taking place in both the Caribbean Sea and Windward Passage, helped to support Operation Vigilant Sentry while in the Coast Guard Southeast District area of responsibility.

While on patrol, the **Spencer's** crew worked with interagency and international partners to conduct maritime safety and security operations along America's maritime borders.

This included intercepting an overloaded boat approximately 40 miles

north of Cap-Haitien, Haiti, that was found to have 191 Haitians on board. These individuals were then returned to Haiti after medical screenings with food and water provided.

"Spencer's efforts over the last 83 days ensured the security of our nation's Southeastern border and maritime approaches," said Justin Strock, Commanding Officer of **Spencer**. "I am proud of this crew for their determination, dedication and teamwork throughout our patrol."

(Since the beginning of fiscal year 2025, on October 1, Coast Guard crews repatriated 603 aliens to Haiti, compared to 857 aliens to Haiti in Fiscal Year 2024). 🇺🇸

On This Day - October 21, 1797–The 44-gun 204-foot frigate, **USS Constitution**, one of the six original Frigates of the US Navy and the oldest commissioned warship still afloat in the world, was launched in Boston's harbor. It was never defeated in 42 battles. In 1997, 216 crew members set sail again to celebrate her 200th birthday. Although her construction is almost halted by a 1796 peace treaty with Algiers, the **Constitution** is launched (in the third attempt to get her in the water) and christened by visiting Capt. James Sever using a bottle of Madeira.

She was constructed from hard, heavy, straight-grained, and decay-resistant white oak. Unlike the rather short and gnarled live oak, white oak trees grow to 150' tall to provide long, clear planks. When "Old Ironsides" was being built, white oak was plentiful throughout the Union's 13 states. Today, at Naval Support Activity Crane, near Bloomington, Indiana the US Navy maintains "Constitution Grove," where a forest of white oaks are grown for the sole purpose of restoring and refitting the **USS Constitution**, the oldest commissioned vessel still sailing (the UK's HMS Victory is older but remains in drydock).

NAS Crane and Constitution Grove therein, protects the white oak trees and also the biological diversity an oak forest provides, including the wildlife that live there. Three Navy civilian foresters help maintain the wood and ensure that no tree removed from the ecosystem will have an adverse effect on the grove's biodiversity.

It was in the great naval battle where the **USS Constitution** captured the 38-gun British Frigate HMS Guerriere that she was given her nickname of, "Old Ironsides". A sailor on the Guerriere saw 18-pound British cannonballs bouncing right off the hull of the **Constitution**. He exclaimed, "Huzza, her sides are made of iron!" 🇺🇸

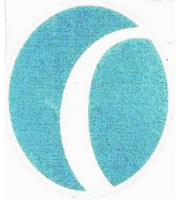
