"Richmond Rosies" is Women's History Month presentation

Join four Grosse Pointe women's organizations for a viewing of "The Richmond Rosies," a film about women who worked in the shipyards during World War 2. This presentation is in honor of Women's History Month.

Between 1941 and 1945, 747 Victory and Liberty ships were built in Richmond, CA, and women made up nearly 60% of the workforce. Young women, who had never worked outside the home before, now had to take the place of men who went overseas to fight the war. These women were called Rosies, short for "Rosie the Riveter."

Five still active "Rosies tell their stories about what it was like to travel across the country on their own as young women, and enter the shipyards as pipe welders, draftswomen, and electricians. These women not only helped win WW II, but secured their own financial independence, changing the course of history for women throughout the United States and the World.



Dine Around Town (DAT) is SIGP's biggest fundraiser of the Year and it's that time of Year again ladies!

Back in 2007, Lee Meyer, SIGP's longest standing member created a fundraiser named, Dine Around Town. Each year members are asked to contact their favorite restaurants and ask for donations of gift cards/certificates in various denominations. These gift cards are then bundled into 5 to 6 different prize packages ranging from \$650 worth of gift cards for 1st place, to \$150 worth of gift cards for 6th place, depending on the total dollar amount of gift cards collected. Once the raffle tickets have been printed, members are asked to sell the raffle tickets to family and friends. The tickets are \$5 each or a book of 5 tickets for \$20. The club also sells tickets at events and stores in the Grosse Pointe area. In the past, SIGP has raised over \$6,000 from the sales of these raffle tickets for our Dine Around Town Raffle. The money collected from the Raffle funds our Ruby, Live Your Dream and Virginia Wagner Awards.

SUPER INTELLIGENT WOMEN MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Hidden Figures is a 2016 film, which tells the true story of several African-American women who have made a significant contribution to our country by using their minds. Margot Lee Shetterly, the author of *Hidden Figures: The Story of the African-American Women Who Helped Win the Space Race*, tells the true stories of Dorothy Johnson Vaughan, Mary Winston Jackson and Katherine Coleman Goble Johnson. All four of these women used their gift of intelligence in significant ways to change life in America for the better.

In 2010, **Margot Lee Shetterly** (born 1969) decided to tell the story of the brilliant African-American women who worked at National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics (NACA) and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA). Her father worked at NASA so she grew up hearing the stories of many scientists. In 2013, Shetterly founded The Human Computer Project, an organization whose mission is to archive the work of all of the women who worked as computers and mathematicians in the early days of NACA and NASA. Her decision to preserve these gifted women's contributions to the US Space Program has given all of us the opportunity to both be aware of their stories, and be inspired by their assertiveness. *Hidden Figures*, her first book, reached number one on *The New York Times* Non-Fiction Best Sellers list. Recently Fox films produced Shetterly's 2016 non-fiction book, which has been nominated for Best Picture by the Academy Awards.

Dorothy Johnson Vaughan (September 20, 1910 – November 10, 2008) was an African American mathematician who worked for NACA, and NASA, at Langley Research Center in Hampton, Virginia. In 1949, she became acting supervisor of the West Area Computers (African-American women mathematicians). She was the first African-American woman to supervise a staff at the NACA. When IBM computers were ordered to replace the "West Area Computers" Dorothy taught herself as well as her staff FORTRAN, the computer machine language. She used her brilliant mind to keep up with the technology of the times, and create professional jobs for her entire department.

Mary Winston Jackson (April 9, 1921 – February 11, 2005) was an African American mathematician and aerospace engineer at the NACA and NASA at Langley Research Center in Hampton, Virginia. She started as a computer at the segregated West Area Computing division. She used her brilliant mind in order to be admitted into University of Virginia's segregated advanced engineering classes. In 1958, she became NASA's first black female engineer.

Katherine Coleman Goble Johnson (born August 26, 1918) is an African American physicist and mathematician who made contributions to the United States' aeronautics and space programs with the early application of digital electronic computers at NASA. Known for accuracy in computerized celestial navigation, she conducted technical work at NASA that spanned decades. During this time, she calculated the trajectories, launch windows, and emergency back-up return paths for many flights from Project Mercury, including the early NASA missions of John Glenn and Alan Shepard, and the 1969 Apollo 11 flight to the Moon, through the Space Shuttle program. She used her brilliant mind to create calculations, which proved critical to the success of these missions. Johnson also did calculations for plans for a mission to Mars. In 2015, Johnson received the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

All four of these women would qualify for the Soroptimist Ruby Award. The Ruby Award honors women who, through their professional or personal efforts, are making extraordinary differences in the lives of women or girls. Their work has had a significant impact, and also inspires and encourages other women. Margot Lee Shetterly, Dorothy Johnson Vaughan, Mary Winston Jackson, and Katherine Coleman Goble Johnson all used their brilliant minds to improve the lives of women and girls. But just as importantly, they developed their intelligence and professional careers in the areas of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics). They were determined and achieved their goals through their brilliance. Reading the book, or watching the movie Hidden Figures is important for all of us. All four of these women deserve to remembered as Famous Heroines instead of Hidden Figures.
