Everyone is a Winner at Summer Games



The 8th Annual Camp Bloomfield Summer Games took place on June 29 at Camp Bloomfield. The event kicked off the 2003 camp season at Camp Bloomfield, the largest residential camp for children who are blind or visually impaired in the USA. At the Summer Games, 75 kids who are blind or visually impaired ages 5-12 teamed with 75 sighted buddies and competed in Olympic-style events – track and field, archery, and aquatics, and awards were presented to all participants.

“Kids who are blind or visually impaired met new friends and became reacquainted with friends made at past events, and kids who are

sighted gained a better understanding of vision loss. We are proud to present this annual event where everyone is a winner. Proceeds from the event assist the Foundation in providing camp and recreational opportunities to 1,000 youth each year,” said President Bob Ralls.

Special guests joined the hundreds of community spectators in attendance.

Laurie McDermott, a comedienne, told jokes and introduced the camp counselors by their funny nicknames. Jenesagrace Samson, 13-years-old and the daughter of a former camper, sang the National Anthem. SUPERVISION, “the blind wonder of hip-hop,” entertained during lunch and quickly developed a large fan club. Members of The Really Spontaneous Theatre Group, Jim Meskimen and Tait Ruppert, kept everyone laughing throughout the day with their witty play-by-play commentary. The USC Marching Band led the Parade of Champions, and Malibu City Councilman Andy Stern concluded the event.

Once the events were over, the medals were distributed, and the campers began to unwind, the topic of discussion was how many days until next year’s event. Thank you to all campers, buddies, volunteers, speakers, entertainers, sponsors, Board of Directors, donors, attendees, and staff for making the event such a big success!

The Future of Camp Bloomfield

In 1958, Camp Bloomfield opened to serve the recreation needs of young adults who were blind. Currently, Camp Bloomfield serves more than 1,000 participants each year, and is located on 40 acres near the Pacific Ocean in Malibu.

The camping program provides activities to enhance skills in independence, to provide adventure, challenge and risk-taking in a safe environment, to develop leadership, to allow parents and other family members to become partners in growth and development, and to experience friendship, fellowship and fun.

Four years ago, the Board of Directors of the Foundation for the Junior Blind met with staff and other experts to develop a Strategic Plan. A major component of that plan emphasized the future of Camp Bloomfield. We proposed priorities, such as, adding new camping sessions with a focus on diversity, career development, sports, independent living skills, and access to technology. The goal is to establish Camp Bloomfield as the leading camp resource for blind youth in the United States.

A subcommittee of the Board, headed by Harold Davidson, Dan Dworsky, Robert Held, and Sandy Weiss, has already volunteered many hours. The legal team at Latham and Watkins has been an invaluable asset, and an architecture design firm, Levin & Associates, has been chosen. Prior to construction, we are making steady progress through the variety of relevant governmental agencies. A tentative start date for renovation is January 2005, with construction taking one-to-two years.

The camp project is a cornerstone of the Strategic Plan to expand the Foundation's development. While establishing a long-term endowment growth plan, major gift fund raising and planned giving must provide a growing percentage of private support. We look forward to the continued participation of our Foundation's extended family in all of our efforts. See how far we have come...Imagine how far we can go!

Nadia Remembers

Norman Kaplan along with his wife, Nadia, and a group of volunteers started the Foundation for the Junior Blind in 1953 to provide recreational programs for children who were blind.

At the international symposium that took place in Beverly Hills in February 2003, Nadia Kaplan was the recipient of the "Norman Kaplan Lifetime Achievement Award." As part of our year-long 50th anniversary celebration, we have invited Nadia to share some memories.

It was a great day when the Foundation moved from its old storefront on Santa Monica Boulevard, that was home for the first years of its

existence. The new facilities were on Wilshire Boulevard, a finer-looking building, but still not adequate to accommodate the hundreds of children that poured into the place for Friday night dances and Saturday recreational classes. On Saturdays, I was assigned to a small room for my Space Travelers, an active group of 6 and 7-year-olds. Norm eventually made arrangements with a church a few blocks away to use their gym, since he saw how constricting our area was. So, with my volunteer assistants, 20 to 25 children, books, craft supplies, sports equipment, records and a record player, we all trudged down Wilshire Boulevard each Saturday morning to the church. The year was 1961.
