Foremothers in the faith--

We all hold biological DNA in our cells, along with DNA from ancestors who lived thousands, and perhaps millions of years ago—for in our very beings we harbor bits and pieces of all those to whom we are related, whether they lived in Africa or crossed the Bering Strait or existed primarily in northern Europe. But we also hold spiritual DNA in ourselves, from our mothers and our biblical foremothers alike. Ruth, Naomi, Susannah, Judith, Bathsheba, Elizabeth, Anna and all the rest—they're in our family tree, all part of our spiritual DNA. Unlike invisible chromosomes, however, the record of Bible women and their contributions to our spiritual history are in full view on the pages of the Bible.

He is Risen! He is Risen Indeed!!

Amidst the fullness of Holy Week and the joys of Easter, Ashley and I have begun the process of house hunting in Perry. We've looked at houses from the almost the town square of Perry to Sumner and beyond. We've looked at small houses with big yards and we've looked at big houses will small yards. We've looked at houses that were constructed less than ten years ago and we've looked at houses built over a hundred years ago. We've viewed dozens of houses online, driven past tens of houses, and have toured several.

In our searching for just the right place at just the right cost, I've noticed something about the process for us. Nearly every house has something that we appreciate--whether it's room for the kids, good office space, a great kitchen, a good-sized yard, architectural charm, we find something that we like. On the flip side of that coin, every house has something that we would want to change. Maybe the walls in every room are bright purple or emerald green. Maybe the yard needs some major work or perhaps some fencing is needed for the dog. Or maybe... just maybe everything looks just fine, and yet we want to come in and change it anyway—just to make it ours.

Ownership of a house, a car, or anything else breeds excitement. When a person has ownership, generally they want to be involved with that which they own—they want to be able to make decisions, improve the value if possible, and bring out the full potential of that which is owned. As seriously as we take ownership of different "things" in life, so too I think we should take our faith just as seriously if not more so. Faith, like real estate, takes a great deal of attention and needs to be nourished. There is a variety of different ways to take care of our faith.

• **Going to Sunday Church** is like mowing the lawn. It's good general maintenance and is encouraged. At times, you may be able to take care of a few of the other yard issues of life while you're at it. Hear a good word that helps you pull a few weeds.

• **Bible Study** is the repainting and kitchen updating of our faith lives. While going to church is very important (as is any good general maintenance), stretching and growing one's faith happens most often in conversation with others—and Bible Study or other faith-based groups are a great place for that to take place.

• **Mission Work and Prayer** are the re-wiring and re-plumbing of our faith lives. Through regular prayer we encounter a stronger connection and reliance on God. And through mission work we encounter that which God has called us to.

There are many other ways to nourish one's faith, and this is just a different way of thinking about it. But whatever tool is helpful for you, I urge you to take the time and nourish your faith in fellowship with others. Take ownership of the greatest gift of hope and new life that can be given and receive the full potential of these blessings not just in death, but in life as well. God's peace to you.

Luther and Lutheranism Martin Luther (1483-1546)

Martin Luther was eight years old when Christopher Columbus set sail from Europe and landed in the Western Hemisphere. Luther was a young monk and priest when Michaelangelo was painting the Sistine Chapel in Rome. A few years later, he was a junior faculty member at a new university in smalltown Germany, intently studying the Scriptures, "captivated with an extraordinary ardor for understanding Paul in the Epistle to the Romans."

In these days Luther was tormented by the demand for righteousness before God. "I did not love, yes, I hated the righteous God who punishes sinners, and secretly, if not blasphemously, certainly murmuring greatly, I was angry with God." Then, in the midst of that struggle with God, the message of the Scriptures became clear, like a long-shut door opening wide. When he realized that a "merciful God justifies us by faith ... I felt that I was altogether born again and had entered paradise itself through open gates."

What Luther discovered is the freedom of Christians trusting God's mercy in Christ. As he later wrote, "Faith is God's work in us. It changes us and makes us to be born anew of God. This faith is a living, busy, active, mighty thing. It is impossible for it not to be doing good works incessantly. Faith is a living, daring confidence in God's grace, so sure and certain that believers would stake their lives on it a thousand times."

This discovery set Luther's life on a new course — both his own life and his public service as a preacher and teacher. When a church-endorsed sales team came to the Wittenberg area in October 1517, Luther was concerned that the promotion and sale of indulgences undermined the promise of God's unreserved mercy in Jesus and the faith that trusts that promise. His 95 Theses or Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences became the first of a life-long stream of books, sermons, letters, essays, even hymns in which he expressed his confidence in this life-giving promise from God, the Gospel, and its liberating implications for all of life in church and society. --elca.org
