Tulsa Trail Riders

I found this on the Tulsa Trail Riders web site (www.tulsatrailriders.org). It is interesting. See page 8, regarding a similar private riding area in Montana.

ATTENTION - ORV ENTHUSIASTS

The Tulsa Trail Riders, a non-profit corporation, is applying for a Federal Recreation Trails Fund Grant to purchase a 1,740 acre tract of land. The land is located northwest of McAlester, OK. near Scipio, OK. The tract is 11 miles from the nearest exit on the Indian Nations Turnpike. The land is heavily wooded, has an elevation change of 300' from the lowest point to the highest point and has a healthy dose of rocky terrain. If the purchase is successful, a system of ORV trails will be developed on this land.

This year will be the second time the Tulsa Trail Riders have made application for this grant. Last year's application was rejected by the Trails Grant Board for various reasons. We have addressed last year's concerns in this year's application, but are concerned that the "rules" may be changing faster than we can respond. During the planning meetings in connection for this grant someone proposed a:

COUNTRY CLUB FOR MOTORCYCLES/ATVs

The land described above is part of a 5,000 acre parcel for sale. The price is \$1,000,000.00. One million is a huge sum of money, but that amount is equal to 1,000 members at \$1,000 each, 500 members at \$2,000 each, 200 members at \$5,000 each, etc.

The land is roughly equidistant from Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Ft. Smith, Sherman/Denison and within a reasonable distance of Dallas/Ft. Worth.


At this point this is only an idea with a little planning as to the actual mechanics of ownership and legal structure. The Tulsa Trail Riders are attempting to survey the level of interest in such a project to determine whether to proceed with any planning. There will probably be a minimum of \$1,000 investment for membership. If you would be interested in belonging to an



exclusive "Country Club" for motorcycles/atvs, please respond to our survey.




Even with his tools, Shawn was having



If you are not familiar with WUDI, it stands for WUDsracer Invitational. It comes from this Internet thing called a newsgroup. This particular newsgroup is called REC.MOTORCYCLES.DIRT (RMD). If you haven't checked out newsgroups on the Internet, do it. The people that subscribe to this newsgroup run the spectrum from folks that are thinking about getting their first dirt bike to riders with decades of experience.

Anyhow, Jim Cook of Smackover Motorsports organized this ride. About a year ago they had another ride. That one was at White Rock, AR.

He had lots of fun, sliding 50 to 75 feet down a gravel road, throwing off his fanny pack, watch and bite valve for his camelback. He also split his helmet and chest protector. He ripped the knees out of his pants. But only broke the rear fender on the bike.

Bike Week

Bike Week on Speedvision: The episode of Bike week that was on about two weeks ago was great. They focused on trail riders. They met with riders during a workday at the Locust Stake ATV area in the Chattahoochee National Forest near Clarksville, Georgia. The Locust Stake ATV area has 17 miles of trail and it is the only public riding area in a two-state area.

The episode included interviews with the National Forest and American Motorcyclist Association personnel. Bill Elliot, Wilderness Technician, for the Forest Service, said, "Everybody has a right to the National Forest. It's not any one particular group. Whether it's a wilderness group or an ATV group, they don't have sole ownership. It's everybody's forest."

Dave Despain, the host of Bike week, said, "Billions of acres of public land has been closed to the off-road rider in the last 30 years, making the recreational trail rider an endangered species. Locust Stake is open today because these guys are willing to work for it."

Off-road riding is the target of powerful opponents. Ed Mooreland, Vice President of Government Relations for the AMA, said "Every time they want to close something down, they simply file a lawsuit against the National Forest Service or the Bureau of Land Management, asserting they are not managing correctly, asking for an Environmental Impact Statement, and in effect causing a moratorium on access to that land until the Environmental Impact Statement is completed. They have the money to fight this in court. If you are talking tens of thousands of dollars, you are talking a drop in the bucket to an organization like the Sierra Club, but to a local riding club, that could put them under."

The most recent threat to public riding was the recent roadless initiative at the end of the Clinton administration, where Clinton used his power to circumvent Congress to declare an area the size of Wyoming off limits to mechanized vehicles. The Bush administration has put this on hold seeking more input from state and local governments.



Then the show presented the Bull Run Guest Ranch in Cascade, MT, a "Motorcycle Dude Ranch." It consists of 17,000 acres with guided tours or self-guided tours with maps. The area has numbered trails with 100 series numbers being ranch roads to 300 series for the single track. Cabins and meals are also available. Shawn Hall is so ate up about this place, he is checking to see if it is RV friendly and wants to make it a stop on his vacation in June. So we may have more on this in the July or August issue!

The environmentalists use disturbing wildlife as one of the reasons for closing public land to off-road riding. As anybody who has ridden motorcycles or ATVs off-road for sometime knows, you see wildlife all the time. In fact, the show pointed this out by showing shots of big horn sheep.

The producer of the show pointed out that "Bull Run represents the future of off-road riding, with public riding areas getting harder and harder to find. The best thing you can do is join a local club. Or, if there isn't a local club, form one."

I have the show on tape, if we want to show it during a OM-TRA meeting.

According to Shawn, about 10 folks braved the weather to get to the meeting. But I don't know what was discussed.



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




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
