- Soroptimist comes from soror and optima, meaning sister and best. It is not a sorority.
- Members are part of clubs.

 Clubs are part of Districts. Districts are part of Regions. Regions are part of Federations.

 Federations are part of Soroptimist International.
- Soroptimist International of
 Grosse Pointe is part of
 District III. District
 III is part of SI of Midwestern Region (SIMWR),
 which is part of SI of the
 Americas (SIA). This is
 our Federation, which is a
 member of Soroptimist International (SI).
- Soroptimist pin, the international one with the woman raising her hands up, is worn over your heart.
- Soroptimist International headquarters is located in Cambridge, England.
- Soroptimist International of the Americas headquarters is located in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.
- Soroptimist International started in Oakland, California in 1921.
- The first SI project was to "save the redwoods" in California. They succeeded.
- The "tag line" for Soroptimist International is: "A

- Global Voice for Women". "Educate to Lead" is the tenyear theme of Soroptimist International.
- The "tag line" of Soroptimist
 International of the
 Americas is: "Improving
 the lives of women and
 girls through programs
 leading to social and
 economic empowerment".
- The current SIA focus is "Live Your Dream". It was "Making a Difference for Women".
- Soroptimist International is a non-governmental organization (NGO) consultant to the United Nations. This means Soroptimist UN representatives advocate for women and girls, and lobby governments to take action to make sure that women and girls access their human rights.
- SI Program Focus Reports are used for UN subcommittee meetings to suggest topics of women's concerns throughout the world.

The second part of her presentation was about SI's role at the United Nations.

- The United Nations hosts a
 Summit for Women annually
 in New York City. The
 purpose is to bring women
 into decision making to
 solve world problems including educating girls
 and women, solve global
 poverty, and promote gender equality.
 - 80 Soroptimists have credentials to attend this summit.
 - The United Nations has se-

lected 20 goals to strive for in the next 15 years.

- SI has chosen to focus on 5 of these goals:
 - UN Goal #1:No poverty
 - UN Goal #4:Quality
 Education
 - UN Goal #5:Gender Equality
 - UN Goal #8: Decent
 Work and
 - Economic Growth
 UN Goal #10:Reduced
 Inequalities
- SI is advocating creating gender equality and eliminating violence against women and girls.
- SI present briefings to UN subcommittees at UN meetings.
- SI is helping to solve world problems.
- SI current focus is "the December 10th President's Appeal 2015-2017 'Educate to Lead: Nepal'. It seeks to Educate, Empower and Enable women & girls in Nepal to overcome adversity, and develop leadership skills that will in turn benefit entire communities.
- Malala Yousafzai has stated "Education is only solution. Education first."

While our name is changing, the National Human Trafficking Hotline will still serve as the same confidential, multilingual hotline that provides survivors of human trafficking with vital support and a variety of options to get help and stay safe. We will also continue to be a source of actionable tips for law enforcement and expertise for the anti-trafficking community. We welcome our newest partner, the National Human Trafficking Training and Technical Assistance Center (NHTTAC) who will serve as the primary source of training and technical assistance from a public health perspective for the anti-trafficking field. Over the coming months, we will collaborate with NHTTAC to transition the hotline's training and technical assistance programming to NHTTAC. In the interim, please visit www.humantraffickinghotline.o rg and stay tuned for more details in January about the expanded

training and technical assistance offerings provided through NHTTAC.

For almost ten years, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services has made it possible for the National Human Trafficking Hotline to become a nerve center that unites local efforts into a national movement that helps survivors restore their freedom and works towards eradicating human trafficking. With your help, Hotline staff have answered more than 100,000 calls, identified more than 30,000 cases of human trafficking across the United States, and provided more than 8,000 tips to federal, state, and local law enforcement.

Eligibility Requirements:

A Ruby Award recipient should be a woman who:

- Has worked to improve the lives of women and girls.

- Would inspire and encourage other women.

The majority of the nominee's work should have occurred within the past two years. Previous award winners, Soroptimists and Soroptimist employees are not eligible for the award.

AWards— Seeking Virginia Wagner Applicants

APPLICATION ARE DUE January 15, 2017

The Midwestern Region's Virginia M. Wagner Educational Grant (VWA) honors the effort and scholarship of a woman who is attending a college or university to earn a bachelors, masters, or doctoral degree.

First established in 1972, the award was renamed in 2004 to honor Dr. Virginia M. Wagner (Midwestern Region Governor 1982-1984) to commemorate her interest in higher education for women.

The Virginia Wagner Educational Grant

Qualifications: applicant...

- is enrolled full time in a bachelor's, master's or doctorate degree program
- has overcome obstacles to get an education
- has given back to community in some way
- submits a current complete transcript
- has not won previous VWA

Deadline: JANUARY 15, 2017

The VWA is specific to states in the Midwestern Region: Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, Wisconsin and Kentucky. Women living in these states and attending a college or university in pursuit of a bachelors, Masters or Doctoral degree are eligible to apply.

The award process begins at the club level where SIGP is awarding \$3000 to the winner. The winner's application is then forwarded to District III for further judging. The finalist from each of the four Districts will receive a \$500 award and in turn those four applications will be judged at the Region level. One Region winner will be chosen and will receive a \$2500 award
