

STRANGER DANGER

Recent events which have occurred in the Black Mountain Precinct and those which have been seen on television raise an important question, how do we protect our kids from stranger danger? It may seem like we have heard a lot of incidents where people are approaching kids, acting suspicious, etc. This can happen in any community. However, there are some things that we can do, steps we can take, to reduce the risk to our children and our community.

If you or someone you know is ever involved in an incident like this, there are several ways that you can help your community and police like educating our kids, reporting it to police, remaining calm and providing details.

The first step in reducing your risk of becoming a victim of a crime, is to be prepared. We as parents can help prepare our children for situations that may arise with strangers, by having a conversation ahead of time. We don't want our children to be considered rude if they ignore all strangers, but maybe you can set boundaries. For instance, they can talk to strangers when they are out with you (parents), but not when they are alone. A common idea is to talk to your children about never going anywhere with strangers or you can have a code word for someone who may come to pick them up, in your place. You can have additional discussions about what they should do if they are ever approached by a stranger. Talking to your children about "stranger danger" will allow them to have the tools to get through these instances if they should occur.

Even though you have prepared, it is important that anytime you see suspicious activity of any kind, (but especially involving our children) that we call police immediately at 9-1-1 or on the non-emergency line at 602-262-6151. It may not seem like much at the time, but the information you provide to police could help solve a crime. We as a community are all safer when we work together to disseminate information.

Once you call police, you will be asked for details regarding what you have seen. You will be asked for location, time the incident occurred, and a description of the subject and/or vehicle involved. If you can remain calm in this instance, it will allow you to recall more details about what you have

seen. This is important, because the more details you can provide to police, the easier it will be for police to make contact and identify the subject involved. This increases the likelihood of resolving the situation quickly. This information is so important the first few minutes of your call, because as police are driving into the area, they may see the subject who you have described. Police can be more successful with your help!

Being able to provide information about what you have seen is important, but it is even more important that you don't compromise your safety. So, gather the information that you can, safely.

So, even though it is unlikely that you or your children may find themselves involved in stranger danger, it is important to remember the steps listed above; be prepared by having a conversation before it happens, call police, remain calm and provide as many details as you can.





NEW HANDS-FREE CELL PHONE LAW

(This is the actual language of the law.)

- OFFICERS MAY ONLY ISSUE A WARNING FOR A VIOLATION OF THIS SECTION. Civil Citations issued under the new ARS 28-914 cannot be issued until January 2021.
- 2. The new statute provides that a person operating a motor vehicle is prohibited from the following:
 - Physically holding or supporting a cell phone with any part of their body
 - Writing, sending or reading texts, instant messages, e-mails or internet data on a cell phone
- The statute is NOT violated under the following circumstances:
 - The vehicle is parked or stopped
 - Driver is using voice-based communications to write, send, or read a text
 - Driver is using a phone or other device in hands-free mode for navigation, GPS use or obtaining motor vehicle information
 - Driver is operating a device through an interface with the motor vehicle that allows hands-free communication except to actiate or deactivate a function
 - A cell phone is used to report illegal activity or summon emergency help



Reporting your PNP hours (Logs)

Although many of you have been catching up your 2018 logs since my last reminder, our numbers are still down from what we normally have. Please double check you have all your hours entered. Don't worry that they are late, they still count. Please try to have this done in the next couple weeks. Thanks!

On Line Reporting for PNP at volunteer@phoenix.gov

Mileage Reimbursement (2019 rate has increased to \$.58 per mile)

PNP members who have a NBW Grant in their neighborhood that has funds for PNP patrol fuel reimbursement, please record miles and reimbursement documents online. The log sheet has been updated for this. PNP members recording their time for fuel reimbursement this way must enter the beginning and ending odometer readings and license plate number of the vehicle used on their logs.

When you are ready to do a reimbursement simply email Brian.kornegay@phoenix.gov the PNP members name and the time frame you are requesting to reimburse and he will email back a report. This report will be signed as becomes your "receipt" for the grant quarterly report. The report double checks the math and calculates the reimbursement total.

If this methods work well it will likely be the required method for the grants awarded in July 2018.

PVSA Participants logging hours

In the past PNP members who also participate in the Presidential Service Award (PVSA) program had to do separate entries for PNP and PVSA. This was a duplication of effort. We have an updated combination log for PNP and PVSA. Detailed instructions went out to the PNP members who are also in PVSA.



WATER CONSERVATION

Water efficiency is the smart use of our water resources through water-saving technologies and simple steps we can all take around the house. Using water efficiently will help ensure reliable water supplies today and for future generations. Best of all, everyone can play their part in preserving our nation's water resources. With the simple steps and informational tools below, you'll find that it's easier than ever.

Save Outdoors:

Of the estimated 29 billion gallons of water used daily by households in the US, nearly 9 billion gallons, or 30 percent, is devoted to outdoor water use. In the hot summer months, or in dry climates, a household's outdoor water use can be as high as 70 percent.

In the yard—be beautiful and efficient:

- Create a water-smart landscape that is both beautiful and efficient to give your home the curb appeal you desire.
- Timing is everything! Knowing when and how much to water allows you to keep a healthy landscape.
- Upgrade to a WaterSense labeled controller if you have an inground irrigation system.
- Find a certified irrigation professional to install, maintain, or audit your irrigation system to ensure it is watering at peak efficiency.

- Sweep driveways, sidewalks, and steps rather than hosing off.

NEVER LEAVE KIDS IN HOT CARS!

Never leave your child in a parked car-not even for a

minute. According to Phoenix Children's Hospital, temperatures can reach between 131 and 172 degrees inside a parked car within 15 minutes. COUNCIL DISTRICT NEWS

District 3 Councilwoman Debra Stark

Councilwomen Stark gave an update of the budget. The highlights are the hiring of another neighborhood specialist and some park rangers. At yesterday's hearing, some people complained about the color of the Park Rangers uniforms looking like Maricopa County Sheriffs' Office and the City needs to change the uniforms. She felt that would be a major expense and she would rather spend the money on something else. Some library hours will be extended but not all Libraries will be seven days yet, but we get closer and closer every year as the revenue increases. There will be some additional personnel in the Police Department, with the new reporting system required by the FBI. The City is bringing in revenues and setting

aside money every year. In August is there is an election and one of the issues Prop 106 is the pension. Stay tuned for fact sheets on that. She thanked the group for inviting her and she appreciates everything that neighborhoods do looking out for our city and she is so proud to represent District 3.

District 1 Council Aide Shereen

Shereen from District 1 Councilwoman Thelda Williams office announced voting for proposed designs for Deem Hills Park continues on-line until May 15th. Go to the City of Phoenix website under the Parks Department.



Black Mountain Precinct Updates by Lt. Bryan Knueppel

Lt. Knueppel explained Commander Tom Van Dorn is taking a much-needed a break for a few hours. CAO Tom Owsley and CAO Tony Cuciti couldn't be here tonight because they have taken someone into custody and are at the North Command Station.



After a conversation with investigators about the sexual assault on Cave Creek

Rd., there is no further information or new updates. They continue to take calls for service, people calling in about the sketch that was put out into the media a few weeks ago. Those calls have tapered off. A lot of people were identified, and that information has been passed on to investigators for follow up.

There was a great turn out for the Law Enforcement Torch Run. He thanked all the volunteers, participates and support staff. He believes over \$10,000 was raised for the Special Olympics.

Update on the large homeless encampment located north of the 101, south of Pinnacle Peak, west of Scottsdale Rd, and east of Desert Ridge area. Because of very rough terrain, bicycles and 4-wheel drive side by side vehicles were used to reach the heavily camouflaged camp. There was a lot of blight, human waste, needles and drug paraphernalia. These people didn't have permission to be living on premise. City services like Phoenix CARES or other services like the VA were offered to them but were refused. There has been lots of property crimes in the general area, people holding signs along roads, petty theft, and shop lifting around the local businesses. Seven of the nine arrested had previous felony convicts, one was a sexual offender.

He talked about Channel 12's article on The Phoenix Top Five Areas for Calls of Service and Arrests and number one on the list was the Walmart at N. 19th Ave. and W. Bell Rd. The article reported that over a three-year period there were over 11,000 calls for service to this Walmart location. We are well aware of the trends and hotspots of our 186 square-mile area of Black Mountain Precinct. We have increased marked presence and are using NET Squads on bicycles in the area.

The only other update is BMPP and the Maricopa County Sheriff's office is working with the Anthem neighborhood Block Watch with a Law Enforcement Appreciation on June 8th on the east side of I-17 for coffee. There is a Breakfast and BBQ on Friday, May 10th, 5am to 7pm at Desert Horizon Precinct to support and thank Officer Steve Fluty for his years of service to our state and community. He was diagnosed level 4 glioblastoma on the right side of his brain.



PHOENIX NEIGHBORHOOD PATROL UPDATE:

Candice reported that the PNP Appreciation Luncheon honored all PNP volunteers who each logged over 50 hours over the past year and collectively donated over 28,000 hours and 12,000 miles patrolling with a value to the City \$683,776.00. Is a tremendous contribution these volunteers give to the City of Phoenix. There were also 18 PNP patrollers that qualified for and received the Presidential Volunteer Service Award because they logged over 250 hours in one calendar year. There is a Block Watch and PNP class scheduled at the Deer Valley Community Center for May 29th at 5-9pm and another May 11th with United Neighbors. CAO Report with CAO Tim Mitten, CAO Sgt. Rachel Warren and CAO Kelsey Commisso

Changing things up, CAO Sgt. Rachel Warren, CAO Tim Mitten and CAO Kelsey Commisso took questions and concerns from the group instead of the Break-Out period. Tim talked about Sqt. Scott Cain being promoted today with family and friends attending, Councilwoman Stark was there too. Lt. Cain will be working in the Mountain View Precinct 700 on third shift. Laura R asked about any updates on the attempted child abductions. There have not been any further updates. Tim gave more general information about encampments, trespassing state trust or private land, and the process to clean up encampments. There was a question concerning a disabled vehicle parked in the street for several days inside of a community with private streets. CAO Tim's reply was to contact the HOA property manager will take care of it. Summertime is coming up there will be an increase in thefts, burglaries because people are on vacations. CAO Tim encouraged everyone to contact the precinct for a vacation watch and get to know your primary neighbors on each side of you and across the street. Someone asked is there an area of town I shouldn't drive in? CAO Tim said each person should take personal precautions, keep aware of your surroundings, and know where you are day or night. CAO Kelsey reminded people not to leave purses and other valuables out in plain sight. Many people forget to hide the garage door opener which can be used to get into our home. Someone suggested blackening out the home address on the vehicle registration form kept in the glove compartment.



PRESENTATION:

HEALTHY GIVING COUNCIL with Pastor Jerome Parker

Candice introduced Pastor Jerome Parker. Pastor Jerome is a



community pastor at First Christian Church and part of the Healthy Giving Council. Pastor Jerome admits being a street feeder and street giver while working with a non-profit organization that served urban kids at summer camps. He thought by taking these kids down to the Human Services campus downtown Phoenix at 12th Ave and Madison area with sack lunches they could feed people. While handing out the lunches, trash was thrown on the ground, there were

no restrooms, and some complained about the type of food serviced. Pastor Jerome's wife explained that wasn't the best way due to some individuals are registered or unregistered sex offenders. You put them in jeopardy by having kids around them. Street feeding puts trash on the streets. After they eat or drink, they have to "go" somewhere, it goes into the street. These are byproducts of street feeding which Pastor Jerome was totally unaware of. Don't stop giving, don't stop being good hearted. Ask yourself "Is what I'm doing helping this situation?"

These people need an incentive to move past homelessness and get a housing voucher or get an I.D. so they can start the process to get a job and get on their feet. Pastor Jerome realized I'm part of the problem, not the solution. He wasn't helping; he was crippling them. What we can do instead of being a street feeder or street giver is partner with various agencies and organizations. Give in a way to help the agencies bottom line when you donate. Give in a way that helps people get closer to ending their homelessness. A way that doesn't cost the City of Phoenix millions of dollars cleaning up the trash and debris the homeless leave behind. Sgt. Warren stated that you are only prolonging that person to stay on the street and prevent them from getting services. When they don't have access to street giving, they are reaching out for services because they are hungry, because they need shelter. Invest your money to Healthy Giving or other charities that help people to transition into housing. So long as the homeless get what they want and need they will not ask for City Services, VA services, or any Non-Government agency or organization services. Pastor Jerome closed saying that every day of the year is a struggle for those experiencing homelessness, but generous people who want to help can give in a way that has meaning and impact beyond a meal. Healthy Giving takes into consideration the needs and long-term effects on the individual, the impact on the environment, and the community at large. Healthy Giving is about working together with groups rather than going it alone. WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

"Call if you can. Text if you can't." was the key message rolled out during a press conference on April 2nd as text to 9-1-1 service capability becomes available for the first time in the greater Phoenix region. If you are in imminent danger and unable to talk to a 9-1-1 operator, you now have the ability to text to 9-1-1. The service goes live following months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community.

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anyone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- Who did it? -Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- Who is calling? Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

From the Desk of Bill Montgomery-



SPRINGTIME SCAMMERS

As we have been enjoying the Spring season in the Valley of the Sun, scammers have been enjoying the season too; they are taking advantage of tax season to scare us into sending money that we don't owe the government or hoping to trick a new college graduate into falling for a job scam.

Here are a few things to watch out for:

Fake Caller ID

Scammers are clever and can use very convincing techniques to make us believe a phone call is legitimate. With available technology, a scammer can falsify a phone number and name on caller ID to make it appear to be a legitimate number or business. Do not give your personal information to the caller.

Asking for Payment via Gift Card

Beware of anyone asking for payment with a gift card, the most common being iTunes or Google Play, as it may likely be a scam. Scammers may also ask you to send money via wire transfer or send cash in the mail. Legitimate businesses do not need a gift card to accept payment.

Malware Links in Emails

If you receive emails or text messages with links from an unknown or untrusted source, *DO NOT CLICK ON THE LINK*. Any email that asks you to re-enter your name and password to reactivate an account should be treated with suspicion. If your bank or other service needs information from you, go to their website to find their contact information and reach out to them directly rather than click a link on an email. Scammers can mimic official logos to trick you.

Often, these links allow malware to be installed on your computer. The result: your bank accounts could be drained.

Someone is Giving or Returning Your Money

Be suspicious if someone tells you that they owe YOU money and just want your account information to complete the reimbursement. Don't fall for it. You will not find a deposit, but you might find your money is missing.

Fake Job Opportunities

College graduates should be aware of job scams. With online job sites being the most common place to search for a position, young adults need to be wary. Do research on a company before applying online. Some warning signs:

- A job posting requests personal information, but the job doesn't really exist.
- A "new hire" receives a check in the mail for thousands of dollars, told to deposit this check and then return a portion of the funds to pay for job costs. The victim discovers the check is a fake and is out the money sent to the scammers.

In general, when you receive a suspicious call, text or email, have a prepared response ready and take the time to check into it further. If you receive any calls demanding immediate payment, ask for their contact information and tell the caller you will call back. Once you hang up, look up the business' customer service number from a reliable source to verify whether a payment is actually owed. Always talk to a trusted friend or family member and take the time to research the call if you suspect it is not legitimate.

CRIME TIPS:

TECH SUPPORT CALLING YOU OUT OF THE BLUE? IT'S PROBABLY A SCAM!

Computer viruses are scary, and for years scammers have sought to exploit this fear by convincing people that their computers were infected. Now that scammers have adopted robocall technology to support their schemes, victimization by phone is on the rise. A favorite tactic of scammers is the "tech support" scam.

HOW IT WORKS:

You get an automated phone call with an ominous-sounding warning from a well-known tech company. It may be that your computer has been hacked and your personal or financial information is vulnerable, or that your computer has a virus. But simply return the call, or press 1 to be connected with tech support for help solving the issue. Once you are on the phone with "tech support," they will ask for remote access to your computer, and will proceed to show you all the problems on your system. But worry not! They can fix it all for a fee, and a monthly subscription for ongoing support.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

- Tech companies (Microsoft, Apple and the like) are not going to call you out of the blue to tell you there is a problem with your computer.
- All the problems they show you on your system are hype real files that look menacing but are just ordinary files.
- The "fix" is no fix at all, and the monthly subscription gets you absolutely nothing but a recurring charge.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

- · Hang up if you get an unsolicited call for tech support.
- Make sure to stay current on software updates and run anti-virus scans regularly.
- Never allow someone who calls you out of the blue to access your computer, or give them your usernames or passwords.
- Contact your credit card company and request a reversal of the payment if you've been victimized.
- If you have been targeted by this scam or have fallen victim, call the AARP Fraud Watch Network Helpline at 1-877-908-3360 for guidance and support.

PROTECT YOUR SOCIAL MEDIA ACCOUNTS AND YOUR COMPUTER!

Facebook security compromises are in the news in recent weeks, and scammers are taking advantage of this in a variation of the "tech support scam" we have previously written about. And because Facebook's security issues are top of mind for many, calls from these scammers can sound more credible.

HOW IT WORKS:

You will receive an auto-dialed call (or robocall) claiming to be from Facebook, warning that your account has a security issue. The caller directs you to press 1 if you pick up the call or they will leave a phone number for you to call back, under threat that they will suspend your account. When you talk to a "representative," they will ask you for your login credentials or other personal information. They may go on to claim that you have a computer virus that they will fix for a fee, if you let them take control of your computer remotely.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

- · Facebook is not going to call to tell you of an account problem.
- Anytime someone contacts you and requests remote access to

your computer, it is a scam. The goal is to convince you of a problem you don't have to get you to pay for a repair you don't need, or to install software that gives the scammer access to social or financial accounts.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

- If you get an unsolicited call claiming to be from Facebook, do not press 1 to speak to a representative, and do not return the call.
- Don't rely on results of an online search for "Facebook customer service," as many authentic-looking pages are phony.
- If you have concerns about your Facebook account, log on and click "Settings" to review your privacy settings. If you think your account has been compromised, set a new password immediately.
- If you have been targeted by this scam or have fallen victim, call the AARP Fraud Watch Network Helpline at 1-877-908-3360 for guidance and support.





TEMPORARY I.D. CARD NOW AVAILABLE ONLINE

MVD continues to add web-based transactions to streamline service

Arizona motorists who've had their Driver License suspended may now order a temporary sixmonth I.D. card online at ServiceArizona.com. Until now, this service required an in-person visit to an Arizona Department of Transportation Motor Vehicle Division office.



"People often need a valid I.D. in order to buy items at the store, go to the bank, and apply for a job among other things," MVD Field Operations Administrator Mike Cryderman said. "When customers are faced with a suspended license, it makes having a temporary I.D. card vital."

He added, "Offering this service more conveniently through <u>ServiceArizona.com</u> speeds up the process for these customers. It also has the effect of reducing customer traffic at MVD offices so we can better serve our customers who need to make an office visit."

To get a temporary I.D. card, a customer must first have a suspended Arizona Driver License. The expiration date on the suspended license must be beyond the six months the temporary I.D. is valid. Also, the customer must already have an Arizona license photo that has been taken within the past 12 years on file with MVD in order for the temporary I.D. to be produced.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. *FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!*

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be 1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

Block Watches come in all sizes. They can be a few houses in a cul-de-sac to a whole square mile neighborhood. They help to develop a "sense of community" and strengthen and sustain neighborhoods by bringing residents/neighbors together with a common interest.

Every Block Watch starts with one person and their concern for the safety and well-being of themselves and their families. Their motivation may be to meet or get to know their neighbors to protect the children, to keep property values up by eliminating blight and graffiti, to stop speeding on the streets by installing speed humps to protect the children, to have peace of mind by discouraging barking dogs and loud parties, and to be safe from crimes like burglary, theft and assault.

We all want to live in a safe and secure environment. Our homes should be safe havens. By rights there should be several layers of protection from the national level to our own neighborhoods. National and state governments provide control of our borders; state and city governments provide police and fire protection, education, and other resources, community member groups provide Phoenix Neighborhood Patrollers and the posting of PNP signs on neighborhood streets; Block Watch provides neighbors watching out for neighbors; and we provide our own home security alarms, lighting and burglary prevention measures.
