Clydesdales, Formal Ball to Highlight French Lick Sesquicentennial

Events from Sept. 28 through Oct. 7 will also mirror festivities from the town's 1957 centennial

This fall a Southern Indiana Community will take the next step in its rebirth as it looks back to celebrate 150 years of history. The town of French Lick - home to Hoosier hospitality, basketball legend Larry Bird and the newly restored French Lick Resort Casino - will mark its sesquicentennial with a series of events throughout the Springs Valley area. Special events during the celebration will include The French Lick Sesquicentennial Ball on Saturday, September 29, and an appearance by the Anheuser-Busch Clydesdale Team on Friday, October 5.

"We welcome everyone who's ever lived in French Lick to come back for this celebration, but our town has been a tourist destination throughout most of its history,

so we've planned a diverse schedule of events to entertain our visitors as well," said French Lick Sesquicentennial Chairwoman Judi Jones Kimmel.

The famous Anheuser-Busch Clydesdale Team will come to French Lick on October 5. This team of magnificent animals first became a symbol of the Budweiser brand in 1933, and ever since the horses have delighted audiences with their impressive displays. Guests can view the Clydesdales from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m.

"The preparation process is as much a show as the horses themselves," said Donna Winger of Orange County Beverage, the sponsor of the visit. "The hitching process is a show in itself."

The celebration's marquee event will take place Satur-

day, September 29, in the magnificent Windsor Ballroom at the newly restored French Lick Resort Casino. The French Lick Sesquicentennial Ball is a black-tie event that will benefit the Orange County Community Foundation. The evening will feature the coronation of the Sesquicentennial Queen with special honors being given to attending members of the 1957 Centennial Queen's court. Save your hands

Here's a test to see how fast you can untie your shoes. You can use both hands, but you can't use your thumbs. Not so easy, is it? And, yet, do you realize that 25% of all disabling injuries involve hands and fingers?

COMMON CAUSES OF HAND INJURIES

What are some of the common causes of injuries to hand and fingers, most of which usually are preventable? They include struck by hammers, pinched between objects being moved, cut by sharp objects, pierced by splinter and slivers, burned by hot objects or chemicals, and caught in moving machinery.

GLOVES-A PRIME MEANS OF PROTECTION

As long as your skin remains unbroken, it can keep germs out. Once

it's opened by a scrape or cut, however, germs can get in and infection can result unless you get proper treatment. And, no matter how rugged you think your hands may be, they aren't tough enough to stop splinters, slivers, or to resist punctures. That's why gloves are important. They're like an extra layer of skin. The nail that rips your glove would have injured you if your hand had been bare. Wear gloves whenever you are handling rough or sharp material. Use rubber gloves when working with chemicals, solvents, or other material that can irritate your skin. Wear gloves that fit properly. Also, remember that gloves shouldn't be worn when there is a possibility they can get caught in moving machinery.



GUARDS ARE HAND SAVERS

Guards on power saws and other equipment sometimes seem like a nuisance, always getting in the way. But they're on the equipment to protect you against injury. By removing guards or otherwise making them ineffective, you increase your chances of getting hurt. Tie one hand behind your back for a day and you'll appreciate what the consequences of working without a guard can be.

OTHER DANGERS

Many hand injuries occur even when you are wearing gloves or using guards. Be alert to these dangers, too. Such injuries can result from the unexpected shifting of material, getting hands caught in pinch points, grabbing moving parts of the machinery, or holding work in the hands that should be held in a vise or securely clamped.
