










Truths From The Toolbox (So You Can Skip Learning The Hard Way)

I switched on the lights and shuddered a little. The inside of my garage looked like an improvised explosive device made of used tools and parts had detonated in the center of it. Full stop. Every other stupid project went on hold until I could get reorganized. Or at least slightly less disorganized. Soon, faithful old tools were being returned to their drawers. Benches and tool carts, groaning beneath the weight of spray oils and greasy parts, were unloaded. The roar of my 20-year-old ShopVac filled the silence, sucking up metal shavings, paint chips and broken fasteners, like a black hole of garage tidiness. Order was being restored and the process was meditative.

Clarity of mind accompanied this clarity of workspace and, from the fog, a series of truths emerged. I jotted them down on the back of a greasy auto-parts-store receipt and now I'm presenting them to you. These irrefutable truths from the toolbox

Accidentally smashing your thumb or a finger with a rubber mallet hurts just as much as smashing those digits with any other blunt-force tool. This is because you'll swing a rubber mallet like Sammy Sosa at a home run derby, secure in the knowledge that the mallet is soft, so there's nooooo way you'll damage whatever it is you're pounding on. You know, until you do.

Milk crates full of old factory shop manuals, assembly manuals, and parts manuals that he or she looks up everyone's stupid questions in.

Finally, the truest of truths. The more fond you are of a pair of pants or a special shirt, the more likely it is that you will destroy them during a quick trip out to the garage after dinner, "...just to make sure I locked everything up." Once there, it will be impossible to resist the siren song of that welding project (One more quick tack!) and subsequently burn a hole in that brand new T-shirt. Or the freshly painted water pump that needs just one more light coat—most of which you will spray over the right leg of your best wrinkle-free chinos.

I ran out of room on that greasy autoparts-store receipt and had to stop but my garage and mind were all clear for the next round of projects. I glanced back proudly at the clean benches, and spotless floor, and then switched off the lights
