President's Message

It's summertime! After several years of being shut down due to the pandemic, we are making strides to get back to business as usual in 2023. May is when we do our annual cleanup of the Historical Village grounds to get ready for our tour season. This work had not been done for several years so the grounds became overgrown. This year, we were very thankful to have help from kids who are members of the Strongsville Middle School Career Connections program, Cub Scout Pack 157, Rotary Club of Strongsville, Schonhut Landscaping, Key Bank, and others. Take a walk through the village when you get the opportunity, the grounds are really starting to come together!

For Memorial Day this year, we started a new tradition with a Historical Village open house from noon to 2:00 pm following the Memorial Day parade and ceremony at the Freedom Trail. This was a huge success with terrific support from volunteers so we could have all buildings and all floors of buildings open to guests for the first time in several years! We estimate at least several hundred visitors toured the village, and we burned through materials for 200 crafts that kids could make in a craft tent while visiting the village. Many guests shared that they had lived in the area a long time, and this was the first time they had ever visited the village. We also handed out a good number of membership forms and had a number of people express an interest in wanting to join our volunteer ranks. We're looking forward to making this an annual tradition!

Mark your calendar for our annual yard sale on June 22nd and 23rd. This year, we're adding a twist, we're going to have a "Collector's Corner" where we segregate the true vintage and antique items from the other donated items that are more yard sale worthy. The Strongsville Town Center project should be breaking ground this summer and is expected to take 12-18 months to complete. The Historical Society is in ongoing conversation with the city to understand how this project may impact our surroundings. One welcome change is that the entrance to the Freedom Trail will be shifted so it aligns with the East entrance to our Historical Village to make things feel more connected for people who are walking on the pedestrian paths that will be available throughout the 80 acres between the Ehrnfelt Recreation Center and our Historical Village.

One final item for your calendars, Harvest Festival is on Saturday, September 30th this year from 11:00 am to 5:00 pm. Michelle Piech and others have done a great job lining up exhibitors, demonstrators and vendors so there should be a lot for visitors to see and do during their visit.

Presenter Scott Maloney has had a keen interest in bicycles since he first pulled them out of the trash as a nine-year-old, took them apart, and put them back together to learn how they worked. He got a job as a bike mechanic when he was 12 years old and worked for several bike shops until he graduated from college and went to work in Corporate America. Fast forward 30 years where Scott and Vicki decided they wanted to own their own business and Scott's love of bicycles came full circle by buying Century Cycles, a four-location bike dealer-ship that has been serving the Northeast Ohio cycling community since 1992.

Strongsville Branch Library, Meeting Rooms A & B Lost Cemeteries of Cuyahoga County: Strongsville Edition Presented by William G. Krejci, author of Buried Beneath Cleveland: Lost Cemeteries of Cuyahoga County

The dead do not always rest in peace. Occasionally, they wind up in the backyard. As towns grew in Cuyahoga County during the late 1800s, many of its cemeteries were relocated to make room for urban sprawl. But not all of these graves made the journey.

Author William G. Krejci tracks down more than fifty displaced cemeteries throughout the Greater Cleveland area. Discover the Revolutionary War veterans, famous scientists and illustrious dignitaries found beneath gas stations and grocery stores in this eerie history of Cuyahoga County's forgotten dead.

The program being presented will share many of these incredible stories, but will also focus on those closer to Strongsville, including the long-forgotten Strongsville Baptist Church Burying Ground.

Presenter William G. Krejci was born in Cleveland, Ohio in 1975 and raised in the neighboring suburb of Avon Lake. With an interest in local history, he spends much of his time investigating urban legends and has served as the resident historian at Cleveland's famed Franklin Castle. He is the author of *Buried Beneath Cleveland: Lost Cemeteries of Cuyahoga County, Haunted Put-in-Bay, Ghosts and Legends of Northern Ohio, Lost Put-in-Bay, Lost Ghost Stories of Cleveland* (set for release in September 2023) and co-author of *Haunted Franklin Castle*. He is also the author of the *Jack Sullivan Mysteries* and has been a guest speaker at many historical societies, libraries, bookstores, public venues and civic groups. He's appeared as a guest on multiple paranormal-based television programs and has been featured on many local podcasts, television and radio programs. On weekends, he hosts ghost walks in Cleveland and in his free time, sings and plays guitar in an Irish band.
