Municipal Government Act RSA 2000 Chapter M-26 Section 256 Borrowing Bylaw

Municipal Borrowing Bylaw

BEING A BYLAW OF THE SUMMER VILLAGE OF SOUTH VIEW, IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA, FOR THE PURPOSE SPECIFIED IN SECTION 256 OF THE MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT ACT BYLAW NO. 258-2025

WHEREAS the Council of the Summer Village of South View (hereinafter called the "Corporation") in the Province of Alberta, considers it necessary to borrow certain sums of money for the purpose of an operating Line of Credit for interim financing in the event of a local emergency or to cover unforeseen urgent operating expenditures not included in the operating budget over the period from the date of this Bylaw through to December 31, 2026.

NOW THEREFORE pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Government Act, it is hereby enacted by the Council of the Corporation as a Bylaw that:

- 1. The Corporation is hereby authorized to borrow from ATB Financial, ("ATB") up to the principal sum of \$150,000.00 repayable upon demand at a rate of interest per annum from time to time established by ATB, not to exceed 10%, and such interest will be calculated daily and due and payable monthly on the last day of each and every month.
- 2. The borrowing is a line of credit repayable on demand and the Corporation is required to pay accrued interest monthly.
- 3. The Chief Elected Official and the Chief Administrative Officer are authorized for and on behalf of the Corporation:
- (a) to apply to ATB for the aforesaid loan to the Corporation and to arrange with ATB the amount, terms and conditions of the loan and security or securities to be given to ATB;
- (b) as security for any money borrowed from ATB
 - (i) to execute promissory notes and other negotiable instruments or evidences of debt for such loans and renewals of all such promissory notes and other negotiable instruments or evidences of debts;
 - (ii) to give or furnish to ATB all such securities and promises as ATB may require to secure repayment of such loans and interest thereon; and
 - (iii) to execute all security agreements, hypothecations, debentures, charges, pledges, conveyances, assignments and transfers to and in favour of ATB of all or any property, real or personal, moveable or immovable, now or hereafter owned by the Corporation or in which the Corporation may have any interest, and any other documents or contracts necessary to give or to furnish to ATB the security or securities required by it.

- 4. The source or sources of money to be used to repay the principal and interest owing under the borrowing from ATB are: Taxes, Reserves, Grants
- 5. The amount to be borrowed and the term of the loan will not exceed any restrictions set forth in the Municipal Government Act.
- 6. In the event that the Municipal Government Act permits extension of the term of the loan and in the event the Council of the Corporation decides to extend the loan and ATB is prepared to extend the loan, any renewal or extension, bill, debenture, promissory note, or other obligation executed by the officers designated in paragraph 3 hereof and delivered to ATB will be valid and conclusive proof as against the Corporation of the decision of the Council to extend the loan in accordance with the terms of such renewal or extension, bill, debenture, promissory note, or other obligation, and ATB will not be bound to inquire into the authority of such officers to execute and deliver any such renewal, extension document or security.
- 7. This Bylaw comes into force on the final passing thereof.

WE HEREBY CERTIFY that the foregoing Bylaw was duly passed by the Council of the Corporation therein mentioned at a duly and regularly constituted meeting thereof held on the 18th day of November 2025 at which a quorum was present, as entered in the minutes of the said Council, and that the Bylaw has come into force and is still in full force and effect.

FCSS 2026-2028 Grant Agreement Highlights

Incorporation of the Accountability Framework

You will see numerous changes based on the new Accountability Framework.

- The definitions make multiple references and provide various linkages.
- The Services listed in Schedule A now outline the preventive purpose of funding, including the definition of prevention.
- Schedule A also lists the provincial prevention priorities and strategies.
- Schedule C refers to the key performance measures (KPMs).
- The Appendix to Schedule C provides a checklist for KPM-related items that are to be reported.

Mirroring of Regulatory Provisions

For ease of reference, important provisions of the FCSS Regulation now appear within the agreement itself. These include the following.

- The responsibilities of the municipality (s. 2.2 of Schedule A).
- The service requirements of the municipality (s.2.3 of Schedule A).
- The service restrictions of the municipality (s.2.4 of Schedule A).
- The regulatory requirements for financial reporting (section 2 of Schedule C).
- The option to withhold funds if annual reports are not submitted within the required 120 days (Article 5(e), Schedule B, and Schedule C).

Technical Changes

Various changes are due to either cross-governmental changes, or requirements stemming from system programming.

- The "total cost of Services" can now be found in the definitions (Article 1)
- All participating municipalities are listed in Article 2(g).
 - Lead municipalities are also participating municipalities, as a result the provisions are now also in single municipality agreements.
- In Article 4(c) there is a new requirement for the parties to notify each other about changes in representative.
- References to the *Freedom of Information and Privacy Act* have been changed to the *Access to Information Act* (Alberta) (Article 8(b)).
- The policy approach regarding amendments for surplus has been added as Article 11(b).
- Provisions clearly allowing for electronic signing have been added as Article 16.

THIS AGREEMENT is effective January 1, 2026.

BETWEEN:

HIS MAJESTY THE KING IN RIGHT OF ALBERTA

as represented by the Minister of Assisted Living and Social Services (the "Minister")

SUMMER VILLAGE OF SOUTH VIEW

created pursuant to the laws of Alberta (the "Municipality")

WHEREAS the Municipality has applied for a grant to be used for the purposes of FCSS Services;

WHEREAS the Minister agrees to provide Funding for said purpose under the Provincial Program and subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement;

WHEREAS the FCSS Act and the Grants Regulation authorizes such a grant being made;

WHEREAS the Municipality is prepared to perform and enter into certain undertakings relative to the payment of the grant;

NOW THEREFORE the parties agree as follows:

1. DEFINITIONS:

- (a) "Agreement" means this document and the attached Schedule A, Schedule B, Schedule C, and Appendix 1 to Schedule C, and including any amendments made in writing by the parties;
- (b) "Effective Date" means the date first noted above;
- (c) "FCSS Act" means the Family and Community Support Services Act (Alberta), as amended from time to time;
- (d) "FCSS Framework" means the FCSS Accountability Framework, as amended by the Minister from time to time, a copy of which can be found at https://open.alberta.ca/publications/family-and-community-support-services-accountability-framework.
- (e) "FCSS Program Policies" means the collective policies, as implemented and amended from time to time, by the Minister relating to the Provincial Program and any funding provided pursuant to that program;



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- (f) "FCSS Regulation" means the Family and Community Support Services Regulation (Alberta), as amended from time to time;
- (g) "FCSS Services" means the activities to be performed by the Municipality as described in Schedule A for the purposes of establishing, administering and operating a local family and community support services program as set out in the FCSS Act, FCSS Regulation, the FCSS Framework, and the FCSS Program Policies;
- (h) "FCSS Services' total cost" means \$13,755.00 and is comprised of the Funding provided by the Minister under this Agreement and the Municipality's Contribution as set out in Clause 6 of this Agreement;
- (i) "Funding" means the grant monies to be contributed by the Minister pursuant to this Agreement and any interest earned thereon;
- (j) "Grants Regulation" means the Ministerial Grants Regulation A.R. 215/2022, as amended from time to time;
- (k) "Municipality's Contribution" is the Municipality's financial contribution towards the FCSS Services as set out in Clause 6 of this Agreement;
- (l) "Provincial Program" means the Provincial Family and Community Support Services Program administered by the Minister and delivered in accordance with the FCSS Act, FCSS Regulation, and FCSS Framework;
- (m) "Provincial Prevention Priorities" means key social issues affecting Albertans as listed in the FCSS Framework and identified in Schedule A;
- (n) "Provincial Prevention Strategies" means strategies, as listed in the FCSS Framework and identified in Schedule A, that guide the development and delivery of preventative services to meet the needs of a local community;
- (o) "Surplus" means the amount by which payments made by the Minister exceed the Municipality's expenditures to perform the FCSS Services, as determined by the Minister, in consultation with the Municipality;
- (p) "Term" means the period from January 1, 2026 to December 31, 2028.

2. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE MUNICIPALITY:

- (a) The Municipality shall perform the FCSS Services as described in Schedule A and in accordance with the FCSS Act, FCSS Regulation, FCSS Program Policies, and the FCSS Framework.
- (b) The Municipality shall perform FCSS Services in alignment with the FCSS Framework.
- (c) The Municipality may transfer to another municipality all or part of the Funding received pursuant to this Agreement as described in the FCSS Program Policies.



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- (d) The Municipality shall comply with all applicable laws in its performance of the FCSS Services.
- (e) The Municipality shall not make any public announcement or issue any press release regarding the entering into this Agreement or the Minister's provision of the Funding, except in consultation with and upon receiving the approval of the Minister as to the contents of the announcement or press release, such approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.
- (f) The Municipality warrants that it has entered into an agreement with other municipalities to jointly establish, administer, and operate the FCSS Services and that the Municipality has the authority to enter into this Agreement on the behalf of the other municipalities.
- (g) The Municipality warrants that the Funding will be allocated among itself and the other municipalities as follows:

3. TERM:

This Agreement shall be effective for the Term.

4. REPRESENTATIVES:

- (a) The Minister designates the Executive Director of Civil Society and Community Initiatives to be the Minister's representative to maintain a continuing liaison with the Municipality in matters relating to this Agreement.
- (b) The Municipality designates the **CAO** to be the Municipality's representative to maintain a continuing liaison with the Minister in matters relating to this Agreement.
- (c) In the event there is a change in either party's representative, notice should be provided to the other party pursuant to Clause 15.

5. FUNDING:

(a) The Minister will provide Funding to the Municipality in the amount of no more than \$11,004.00, subject to:



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- the appropriation of funds by the Legislature sufficient to provide the Funding under this Agreement, the sufficiency of which shall be determined in the sole discretion of the Minister; and
- ii. early termination of this Agreement,

and that there will be no additional funding from the Minister in the case of cost overruns.

- (b) The maximum Funding set out in Clause 5(a) will be allocated as follows:
 - i. \$3,668.00 for the first year of the Term (2026-01-01 to 2026-12-31)
 - ii. \$3,668.00 for the second year of the Term (2027-01-01 to 2027-12-31)
 - iii. \$3,668.00 for the third year of the Term (2028-01-01 to 2028-12-31)
- (c) The Municipality shall immediately notify the Minister of any overpayment of the Funding and shall repay the amount of any overpayment, unless directed otherwise in writing by the Minister. Any amount of overpayment not repaid to the Minister shall be considered a debt due to the Minister. The Minister may in the Minister's sole discretion cease to make payments under this Agreement or any other agreement made between the Municipality and the Minister if an overpayment is not repaid forthwith.
- (d) The Funding shall be released to the Municipality in accordance with Schedule B.
- (e) Notwithstanding Schedule B, the Minister may withhold any Funding during the Term of this Agreement:
 - i. upon failure of the Municipality to provide any reports required by this Agreement or any Schedule to this Agreement; or
 - ii. upon the Municipality's non-compliance with any term or condition of this Agreement.
- (f) Notwithstanding Clause 5(a), (b), and (d) of this Agreement, the total amount of Funding or any scheduled payment of Funding during the Term may be adjusted (including an increase or decrease) in the sole discretion of the Minister.
- (g) If the total amount of Funding or any scheduled payment of Funding is to be adjusted pursuant to Clause 5(f):
 - i. the Minister shall provide the Municipality sixty (60) days' written notice of any proposed adjustment;
 - ii. upon receipt of the Minister's notice to adjust Funding or adjust a scheduled payment of Funding, the Municipality shall have thirty (30) days to either accept the adjustment or terminate this Agreement, which decision shall be communicated to the Minister in writing pursuant to Clause 15;



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- iii. if the Municipality chooses to accept the adjustment, the Municipality and the Minister may mutually agree to amend the Services under this Agreement and shall amend the Agreement accordingly;
- iv. if the Municipality chooses to terminate this Agreement, termination shall be effective thirty (30) days after the date of the notice of termination by the Municipality.

6. THE MUNICIPALITY'S CONTRIBUTION

- (a) In accordance with section 3 of the FCSS Act and section 5(b) of the FCSS Regulation, the Municipality shall provide a financial contribution of no less than twenty percent (20%) of the FCSS Services' total cost. The Municipality shall also demonstrate a financial contribution of at least twenty percent (20%) towards the FCSS Services' annual costs.
- (b) In accordance with Clause 6(a), the Municipality's Contribution for the Term is allocated as follows:
 - i. \$917.00 for the first year of the Term (2026-01-01 to 2026-12-31)
 - ii. \$917.00 for the second year of the Term (2027-01-01 to 2027-12-31)
 - iii. \$917.00 for the third year of the Term (2028-01-01 to 2028-12-31)
- (c) In the event the total amount of Funding is increased or decreased either during the Term or by any amendment to this Agreement, the Municipality's Contribution may change accordingly, and the Municipality must provide written notice the Minister of any changes to the Municipality's Contribution pursuant to Clause 15.

7. USE OF GRANT FUNDING:

- (a) The Municipality covenants and agrees that it is and will be, in relation to the Funding, bound by the provisions of this Agreement, the FCSS Act, FCSS Regulation, and the Grants Regulation.
- (b) The Municipality agrees that the Funding shall be used only for the purposes described in Schedule A and the expenditures and costs associated with the purposes as further described in the FCSS Regulation and FCSS Program Policies, and the Municipality shall not use the Funding for any other purpose without the prior written consent of the Minister.
- (c) The Minister reserves the right to disallow and recover from the Municipality the amount of any expenditure of the Funding that is contrary to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

8. PUBLICATION, DISSEMINATION AND RELEASE OF INFORMATION:

(a) The Municipality has the requisite authority to collect and disclose all information contained in any reports and other records submitted to the Minister under this Agreement.



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- (b) The Municipality acknowledges that this Agreement, including the name of the Municipality, and the terms and conditions of the Grant under this Agreement, may be subject to disclosure pursuant to the Access to Information Act (Alberta) ("ATIA Act"), as amended from time to time. The Municipality further acknowledges that the ATIA Act applies to information obtained, related, generated, collected or provided to the Minister under this Agreement, including all reports and other records submitted to the Minister by the Municipality, and that any information in the custody or under the control of the Minister may be disclosed.
- (c) Subject to any applicable laws, the Municipality shall allow the Minister access to or provide copies to the Minister of any data or information acquired, collected or produced under this Agreement.

9. FCSS SERVICES REPORTING REQUIREMENTS:

- (a) The Municipality shall provide the Minister with a detailed annual report as described in Schedule C within one hundred twenty (120) days after the end of each year of the Term.
- (b) The Minister may at any time during the Term of this Agreement request any additional information or ad hoc reports required, in the sole discretion of the Minister, to inform the Minister about the FCSS Services and the Municipality shall comply forthwith.
- (c) The Minister shall have the right and ability to use, publish, or distribute reporting as the Minister determines appropriate, subject to any applicable laws.
- (d) In the event the total amount of Funding is increased either during the Term or by any amendment to this Agreement, any reporting, financial or otherwise may change accordingly.

10. ACCOUNTING:

The Municipality shall:

- (a) deposit and maintain the Funding in a separate bank account used only for the Funding or in the same bank account as other monies provided that the Funding is kept separate from other monies in the books of account, such that the Funding can be accounted for;
- (b) maintain adequate financial records relating to the Funding. It shall keep proper books, accounts and records of the cost of the materials, services or resources funded under this Agreement, in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, and have them available at all times during the Term of this Agreement and for a period of six (6) years after the termination or expiry of this Agreement; and
- (c) during the Term and for six (6) years after the termination or expiry of this Agreement, produce on demand to any representative of the Minister or the Auditor General of Alberta any of the financial records referred to in Clause 10(b) and shall permit such representative to examine and audit these books, accounts and records and take copies and extracts of them.

11. SURPLUS DURING THE TERM AND ON EXPIRY OR TERMINATION:





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- (a) If the Minister determines there is a Surplus during any year of the Term or at any time following the expiry or termination of this Agreement, the Minister, in the Minister's sole discretion, may:
 - i. demand repayment of all or part of the Surplus by the Municipality to the Government of Alberta within ninety (90) days of the demand or the expiry or termination of this Agreement;
 - ii. adjust the total amount of Funding by withholding payment of any portion of Funding equal to the Surplus amount, or by setting-off the Surplus amount against any future scheduled payments of Funding in the Term;
 - iii. authorize the Municipality to retain the Surplus and redistribute the Surplus amount across the remaining year(s) of the Term; or
 - iv. apply the Surplus to any payment made by the Minister pursuant to a further grant agreement with the Municipality for the same or similar purpose.
- (b) The Municipality acknowledges that the parties may need to amend this Agreement or enter into a new agreement or amend an existing agreement if the Minister determines that there is a Surplus during the Term or at any time following the expiry or termination of this Agreement in accordance with Clause 11(a).

12. GENERAL PROVISIONS:

- (a) The parties agree that Schedule A, Schedule B, Schedule C and any appendices to these Schedules form part of the Agreement, but in the event of a conflict between a provision in a Schedule or any appendices and a provision in the body of the Agreement, the provision in the body of the Agreement shall govern.
- (b) The Municipality shall indemnify and hold harmless the Minister, the Minister's employees, contractors, agents or volunteers from any and all claims, demands, actions and costs whatsoever that may arise, directly or indirectly, out of any act or omission of the Municipality or its employees, contractors, agents or volunteers with respect to carrying out the purposes of this Agreement. Such indemnification shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- (c) The Minister shall not be liable for any personal or bodily injury or property damage that may be suffered or sustained by the Municipality, its employees, contractors, agents or volunteers in carrying out this Agreement.
- (d) The Municipality shall, at its own expense and without limiting its liabilities herein, insure its operations under a contract of general liability insurance, in accordance with Alberta's *Insurance Act*, in an amount not less than \$2,000,000.00 inclusive per occurrence, insuring against bodily injury, personal injury and property damage, including loss of use thereof.
- (e) This Agreement may be amended when such amendments are reduced to writing and signed by each of the parties hereto, but not otherwise.



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- (f) The Municipality is an independent entity and any persons engaged by the Municipality to provide goods and services in carrying out this Agreement are employees, agents, or contractors of the Municipality and not of the Minister.
- (g) The Municipality may not assign this Agreement or any part of it.
- (h) Despite any other provision of this Agreement, those clauses which by their nature continue after the conclusion or termination of this Agreement shall continue after such conclusion or termination, including: Clauses 7(c), 8, 9(b), 9(c), 10, 11, 12(b), 12(c) and 12(d).
- (i) This Agreement is binding upon the parties and their successors.
- (j) The parties agree that this Agreement will be governed and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the Province of Alberta and the parties irrevocably attorn to the exclusive jurisdiction of the courts in Alberta.
- (k) This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties concerning the subject matter of this Agreement and except as expressed in this Agreement, there are no other understandings or agreements, verbal or otherwise, that exist between the parties.
- (l) If any provision of this Agreement is determined to be invalid or unenforceable in whole or in part, such invalidity or unenforceability shall attach only to such provision and everything else in this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect, provided however that this Agreement is not materially altered.

13. BREACH OF AGREEMENT:

Where the Minister, in the Minister's sole discretion, determines that the Municipality has failed to fulfill any term or condition of this Agreement, the Minister may do any one or more of the following:

- (a) terminate this Agreement immediately;
- (b) withhold payment of all or any portion of the funding under subsequent grant agreements; and
- (c) demand repayment of all or any portion of the Funding and the Municipality shall repay forthwith, all or part of the Funding to the Government of Alberta.

14. TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT:

This Agreement may be terminated:

- (a) at any time by mutual written agreement of the parties; or
- (b) at any time by either party without cause or reason with ninety (90) days written notice to the other party. Upon the Municipality's receipt of a notice of termination from the Minister, the Municipality shall not make or commit any further expenditure of the Funding without the prior written consent of the Minister.



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15. NOTICES:

(a) All notices required or permitted to be given or submitted by one party to the other under this Agreement shall be deemed given or submitted to the other party if in writing and either personally delivered to the office of the addressee or sent by registered mail, postage prepaid, or sent by email to the address provided below:

- (b) The address of either party may be changed by notice in writing to the other party.
- (c) Notice personally served or sent by email shall be deemed received when actually delivered between 8:15 am to 4:30 pm in Alberta from Monday through Friday excluding holidays observed by the Minister (a "business day") or if not delivered on a business day on the next following business day, and
 - i. in the case of notice by email, when actually delivered as indicated by the email delivery receipt or other reasonable forms of confirmation of delivery; or
 - ii. in the case of notice sent by prepaid registered mail, on the fourth business day following mailing in any post office in Canada, except in the case of postal disruption, then any notice shall be given by email or personally served.

16. ELECTRONIC SIGNING

The Parties may execute this Agreement with the use of electronic signatures so long as:

- (a) the electronic signatures are verified by the use of an Alberta approved electronic signature platform
- (b) the electronic signatures are authenticated to confirm the identity of the signing party; and
- (c) the electronic signatures as applied are in adherence with Alberta's Electronic Transactions Act, SA 2001, c E-5.5.

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17. COUNTERPART:

This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, in which case (i) the counterparts together shall constitute one agreement, and (ii) communication of execution by emailed PDF shall constitute good delivery.

Term of Agreement: from January 1, 2026 to December 31, 2028

Description of FCSS Services

1. Purpose of Funding

Funding is intended to provide for the establishment, administration and operation of a family and community support services program in accordance with the FCSS Act, FCSS Regulation, FCSS Program Policies, and the FCSS Framework.

- Services must be of a preventive nature that enhances the social well-being of individuals and families through promotion or intervention strategies provided at the earliest opportunity.
- Under the FCSS Framework, prevention is defined as a proactive process that strengthens the protective factors of individuals, families, and communities to promote well-being, reduce vulnerabilities, enhance quality of life, and empowers them to meet the challenges of life.

2. Description of Grant Activities

- 2.1 For the purposes of this Agreement, the Municipality shall perform FCSS Services that meet the following minimum requirements:
 - comply with the requirements set out in the FCSS Act and FCSS Regulation, in particular the responsibilities set out in section 2 of the FCSS Regulation (described in more detail at 2.2 below);
 - comply with the requirements set out in the FCSS Act and FCSS Regulation, in particular the service requirements set out in section 2.1 of the FCSS Regulation (described in more detail at 2.3 below);
 - perform FCSS Services in accordance with the FCSS Framework, in particular the Provincial Prevention Priorities and Provincial Prevention Strategies (described in more detail at 2.4 below);
 - perform FCSS Services in accordance with the FCSS Program Policies (as defined in this Agreement);
 - ensure FCSS Services are of a preventive nature, aligning with the definition of prevention as found in the FCSS Framework.

2.2 Responsibilities of the Municipality

The responsibilities of the Municipality are as set out section 2 of the FCSS Regulation and include:



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- · promote and facilitate the development of stronger communities;
- promote public participation in planning, delivering and governing the program and services provided under the program;
- · promote and facilitate the involvement of volunteers;
- · promote efficient and effective use of resources; and,
- promote and facilitate co-operation and co-ordination with allied service agencies operating within the municipality.

2.3 Service requirements of the Municipality

- The service requirements of the Municipality are as set out in section 2.1(1)(b) of the FCSS Regulation and include:
 - help people to develop independence, strengthen coping skills and become more resistant to crisis;
 - help people to develop an awareness of social needs;
 - help people to develop interpersonal and group skills which enhance constructive relationships among people;
 - help people and communities to assume responsibility for decisions and actions which affect them:
 - provide supports that help sustain people as active participants in the community.
- The Municipality must not include the services set out in section 2.1(2) of the FCSS Regulation. These services include:
 - provide primarily for the recreational needs or leisure time pursuits of individuals,
 - subject to subsection 2.1(3) of the FCSS Regulation, offer direct assistance, including money, food, clothing or shelter, to sustain an individual or family,
 - be primarily rehabilitative in nature, or
 - duplicate services that are ordinarily provided by a government or government agency.

2.4 FCSS Framework

The Municipality shall perform FCSS Services in alignment with the FCSS Framework, in particular:

- the following Provincial Prevention Priorities:
 - Homelessness and housing insecurity
 - Mental health and addictions
 - Employment
 - Family and sexual violence across the lifespan
 - Aging well in community
- the following Provincial Prevention Strategies:
 - Promote and encourage active engagement in the community
 - Foster a sense of belonging



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- Promote social inclusion

- Develop and maintain healthy relationships
 Enhance access to social supports
 Develop and strengthen skills that build resilience

- 2. Annual Reporting In accordance with Clause 9 of this Agreement, the Municipality shall provide the Minister with a detailed annual report which contains the following:
 - i. An audited financial statement for each year of the Term that complies with sections 6, 6.1 and 6.2 of the FCSS Regulation, outlined below, and any requirements as set out in the FCSS Program Policies.

Under the FCSS Regulation, an audited financial statement shall include:

- If the Municipality receives Funding of \$250,000 or less (section 6 of the FCSS Regulation applies):
 - 1. the revenues and expenditures shown in the Schedule to the FCSS Regulation; and,
 - 2. Municipality's certification containing all of the items found in section 6(b) of the FCSS Regulation (review section 6(b) of the FCSS Regulation for further details of the items to be included in the Municipality's certificate).
- If the Municipality receives Funding of more than \$250,000 but less than \$500,000 (section 6.1 of the FCSS Regulation applies):
 - 1. the revenues and expenditures shown in the Schedule to the FCSS Regulation;
 - 2. Municipality's certification containing all of the items found in section 6(b) of the FCSS Regulation; and
 - 3. a review engagement report, prepared in accordance with the standards of the Chartered Professional Accountants of Canada for review engagement reports.
- If a Municipality received Funding of \$500,000 or more (section 6.2 of the FSCC Regulation applies):
 - 1. the revenues and expenditures shown in the Schedule to the FCSS Regulation;
 - 2. Municipality's certification containing all of the items found in section 6(b) of the FCSS Regulation.



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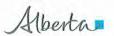
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- 3. an auditor's report, prepared in accordance with the standards of the Chartered Professional Accountants of Canada for auditors' reports.
- ii. Non-identifying data and information as identified by the Minister. Such data shall be relevant to the key performance measures as identified by the Minister in the FCSS Framework and in accordance with any applicable FCSS Program Policies.
 - This information must include the information listed in the Reporting Framework Checklist attached as Appendix 1 to Schedule C.
- 3. The Municipality shall submit all annual reporting using the FCSS Portal: https://goaprod.service-now.com/fcss

Note: The Municipality should review section 11(b) of the FCSS Regulation, which, among other things, allows the Minister to withhold funding under any new agreement in the event that the above audited financial statements are not submitted to the Minister within 120 days of the end of the Municipality's fiscal year.

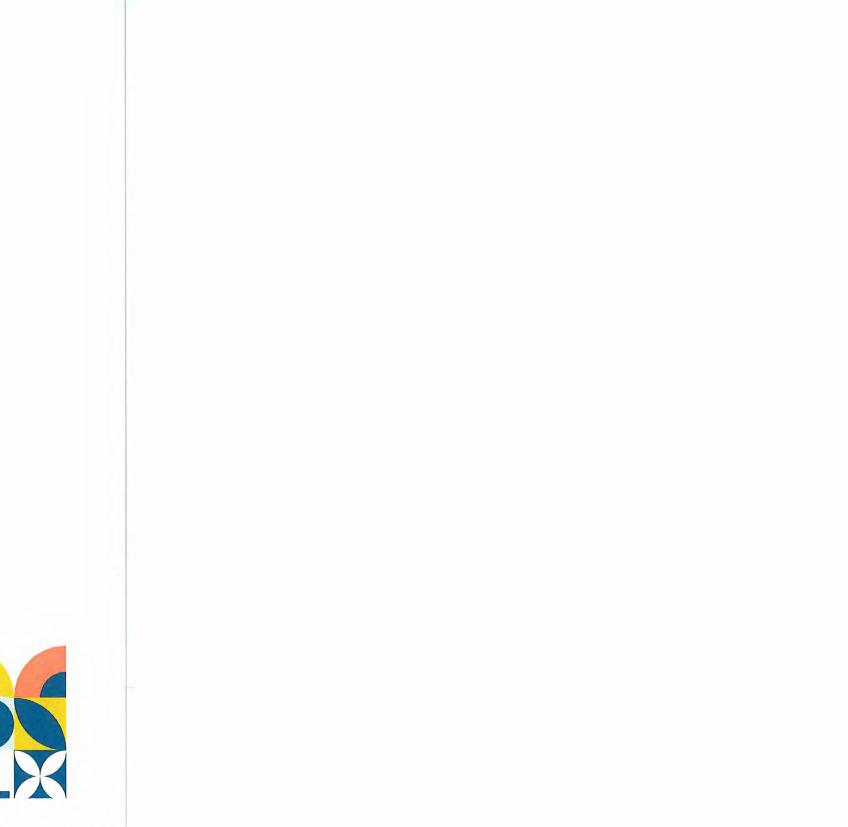

By participating in The FireSmart™ Canada Wildfire Community Preparedness Day Promotion (the "Promotion"), entrants accept and agree to be bound by the following Rules:

- **1. ADMINISTRATOR AND SPONSORS.** This Promotion is administered by the Canadian Interagency Forest Fire Centre Inc. (CIFFC) (the "Administrator"), 1749 Ellice Avenue, Winnipeg, MB R3H 1A6. This Promotion is sponsored by the Co-operators Group Ltd., the Institute for Catastrophic Loss Reduction, and the Provincial and Territorial wildfire agencies (collectively the "Sponsors"), who have contributed funding for the awards.
- 2. THE ODDS OF WINNING AN AWARD DEPENDON THE NUMBER OF ELIGIBLE ENTRIES RECEIVED. NO PURCHASE OR PAYMENT OF ANY KIND IS NECESSARY TO ENTER THIS PROMOTION AND A PURCHASE OR PAYMENT WILL NOT INCREASE YOUR CHANCES OF RECEIVING AN AWARD.
- **3. ELIGIBILITY.** Eligibility for this Promotion is open to all Canadian Citizens, new immigrants or First Nations residents who are of legal age within the Province or Territory within which they reside. Employees, directors and officers of the Administrator, any of the Sponsors, and any of the affiliates, advertising agencies and contest administrators of the Administrator or any of the Sponsors, and their immediate family (spouse, parents, children, siblings, and their respective spouses) and household members are not eligible to enter this Promotion. For award consideration, applicants need to describe how the proposed project supports the reduction of risk of wildfire or the advancement of wildfire preparedness in the entrant's community.
- **4. CONDITIONS OF PARTICIPATION.** By entering this Promotion, each entrant hereby agrees to be bound by these Official Rules, agrees to accept and abide by all decisions of the Administrator with regard to the interpretation and implementation of the Promotion and these Official Rules, and acknowledges and agrees that no entry form submitted by the entrant shall violate any law or the rights of any third party, contain content that is obscene, offensive, profane, pornographic, violent or derogatory; promote alcohol, illegal drugs, tobacco, firearms/weapons (or the use of any of the foregoing), defame, misrepresent or disparage any third party, communicate messages or images inconsistent with the positive image and/or goodwill to which the Administrator and the Sponsors wish to associate, depict unsafe or illegal behavior; all as determined by the Administrator in its sole discretion.
- **5. THE APPLICATION PERIOD.** The application period for this Promotion begins at 8:00AM Mountain Time (MT) on November 1, 2025 and ends 4:00PM MT on January 31, 2026 (the "Application Period").







- **6. HOW TO ENTER.** Eligible persons may enter this Promotion by clicking on the application link found at www.firesmartcanada.ca, creating a profile in the FireSmart Canada Program HUB, fully completing the entry form and agreeing to the Terms and Conditions. **All entry form questions, including the question regarding the type of proposed project the entrant or the entrant's group will undertake and complete between Wildfire Community Preparedness Day on May 2, 2026 and October 31, 2026 to reduce the risk of wildfire or advance preparedness for wildfire in their neighbourhood, must be answered in order for an entrant to be considered for an award. Upon submission, all entries become the property of the Administrator and the Sponsors. The Administrator reserves the right to reject any entry form which, in the sole and absolute discretion of the Administrator, does not meet the criteria set forth in these Official Rules.**
- **7. NUMBER OF ENTRIES.** Only one entry per community is permitted for all FireSmart Canada awards and incentives. Any attempt to access any website associated with this Promotion via a bot script or other brute force attack, through the use of automated entry devices or programs, or through any other unauthorized means is prohibited and will result in the voiding of any associated entries and disqualification from and ineligibility for participation in this Promotion.
- **8. CONDITIONS OF ENTRY.** By completing the entry form an entrant hereby represents and warrants to the Administrator that the entrant has obtained any and all required consents, approvals, licenses or permissions.
- **9. WINNER SELECTION.** The Administrator (who may be assisted by other parties if the Administrator, in its sole discretion, so chooses) shall assess all fully completed entry forms submitted by eligible persons during the Application Period for clarity and ease of understanding in the proposed project's description as well as how the proposed project supports the reduction of risk of wildfire or the advancement of wildfire preparedness in the entrant's community. Specifically, does the proposed project focus on fuel removal from within the community, an education event about FireSmart best practices or a combination of such. Following completion of its assessment, the Administrator (with the aid of the Provincial and Territorial FireSmart Liaisons) will select the winning entries. All winning entries selected by the Administrator shall be subject to verification of identity and eligibility.

NOTE THAT THE SELECTION OF A WINNER DOES NOT IN ANY WAY INDICATEAND SHOULD NOT IN ANY WAY BE ASSUMED TO INDICATE OR BE INTERPRETED AS INDICATING THAT THE ADMINISTRATOR OR ANY OF THE SPONSORS HAVE ANY OPINION WHATSOEVER AS TO THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE PROPOSED PROJECT TO ACHIEVE ITS GOAL OR ANY FIRE SAFETY OR PREPAREDNESS GOAL.

10. AWARDS. Each winner will receive an award of \$500 (in the form of electronic fund transfer, through VoPay), to be used toward implementing the proposed project described in the winner's entry form. Each winner may also receive FireSmart promotional material and information to be used by the winner to support their proposed project. Awards are awarded "as is." All taxes and any costs, associated with the proposed project or otherwise, are the sole responsibility of the winner. Awards may not be transferred or substituted except with the Administrator's written consent, which consent shall be in the Administrator's sole discretion. The Administrator reserves the right to substitute an award of equal or greater value.

II. CLAIMING AN AWARD. The Administrator will notify the winning entrants at the email address provided in the entrant's entry form and via the FireSmart Canada Program HUB. Within the time specified in the notification email, the winner must enter their banking information into VoPay via the link they receive in the FireSmart Canada Program HUB or by email to claim the award. Applicant must also agree to the terms and conditions, when applying for the Award. FAILURE TO CONSENT TO THESE OFFICIAL RULESWILL RESULT IN IMMEDIATE DISQUALIFICATION. In addition, the award will be forfeited if the winner declines to accept the award; the Administrator is unable to contact the winner through the provided email address, or an award notification or award is returned undeliverable. Where an award has been forfeited, the award may, at the Administrator's sole discretion, be awarded to an alternate winner selected from among the remaining eligible entries.

Awards will be sent to verified winners at the Administrator's expense. Winners should allow up to six (6) weeks for verification and shipment of their awards. The Administrator shall not be liable for any delays in issuing the awards.

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14. RELEASE AND LIMITATION OF LIABILITY. By entering this Promotion, each entrant hereby agrees to release, indemnify and hold harmless the Administrator, all Sponsors and all of their respective employees, officers, directors, representatives, agents and affiliates, (collectively, the "released parties") from any claims, actions, causes of action, injuries, losses or damages of any nature or kind whatsoever, including but not limited to, personal injury or death, resulting from participating in this Promotion or from the acceptance, possession, or use or misuse of any award. 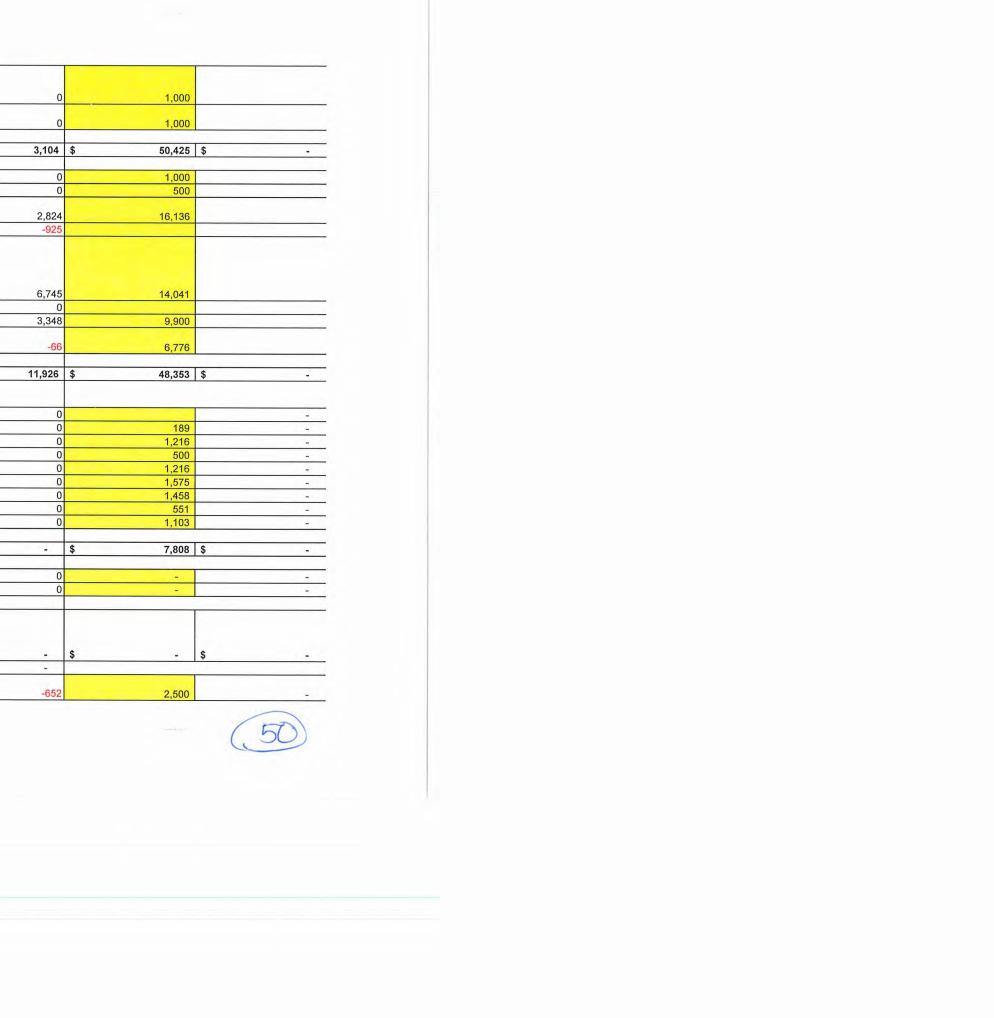

Purpose

Standards

- Remuneration is intended to compensate for official business conducted on behalf of the Council
 as a whole to benefit the Summer Village of South View.
- 2. Remuneration is not intended to match or replace employment or professional rates that the Councillors or Mayor may expect in their job or profession.
- Remuneration rates will be adjusted from time to time based upon comparisons, inflation rates and any other considerations deemed appropriate in a manner agreed upon by Council.
- Cost of living adjustment will be reviewed by Council on an annual basis and may or may not be applied to Council base pay and/or meeting rates at the discretion of Council.
- 5. Remuneration, travel and meals shall be paid in accordance with the amounts and rates approved at the annual organizational meeting or as amended by Council motion from time to time and as shown in Schedule "A".
- **6.** Other Items actual receipted cost. May include incidentals such as parking, use of public transportation, etc.
- Monthly Incurred Expense Reimbursements shall be provided with a monthly communications
 allowance to cover expenses related to personal communications (telephone, internet, smart
 phone, etc.) as shown in Schedule "A".
- 8. Reimbursement amounts shall be reviewed annually.

Apr 29 25 A mail out for the Darwell Phase A line was sent to Residents April 29 regarding the proposed sewer system and upcoming tank inspections.

Aug 8 25 Darwell Lagoon Commission has completed the tank inspections in the summer village.

East Access Road

- Jun 11 25 EAST ACCESS ROAD numerous emails have been sent to LSAC regarding the East Access Road, with no response. On June 3, Angela had a discussion with Greg Edwards, LSAC, who said that they concerned about the pricing of the quotes that they received for work and are looking to scale back the project to keep it affordable. They are in the process of seeing if they can identify any culverts that may be under the road that could be used to improve drainage. Generally, they are looking to do another temporary fix and have verbally advised administration that we should plan to fix this road every 4 to 5 years. During the discussion, Mr. Edwards said that he would have a follow-up email outlining costs, project scope, and proposed cost share to me by the end of the week (June 6). As of June 11, 2025 no follow-up email has been received. If a response is available at meeting time, it can be added to the agenda.
- MOVED by Deputy Mayor Ward that a letter be sent from Mayor Benford to Lac Ste Anne County Council regarding South View's East Access Road and further that this letter outline the lack of communication from Lac Ste Anne County regarding the road repair as well as requesting information regarding proposed scope of work, timelines, and their proposed cost sharing agreement.
- Jun 20 25 This letter was signed by Mayor Benford and sent to LSAC on June 20, 2025. Confirmation of receipt was received from Interim CAO Court.
- July 18 25 An email was received from Greg Edwards (LSAC) that on Monday July 21, LSAC would be having the culvert replaced under the road to help improve the drainage and there would be a temporary gravel patch over the culvert replacement. No information yet regarding pricing or cost share.
- Aug 12 25 Scope of work, quotes, and a cost share proposal were received from Lac Ste Anne County. This is on the August 19 agenda for a decision.
- MOVED by Mayor Benford that South View agrees to proceed with the repair to the East Access Road and FURTHER that South View proposes a 65/35 cost share with South View paying 65 percent and Lac Ste. Anne County paying 35 percent.
- Sep 11 25 This road has been paved. Administration was not provided notice regarding when the road would be paved and as a result no message was sent to residents. Deputy Mayor Ward has flagged concerns with the repair.
- Sep 16 25 Deputy Mayor Ward has confirmed that the concerns with the repair have been addressed.
- 25 10 30 Confirmation has been received that the cost share has been agreed to. Waiting on final invoice.

Lake View Avenue Turnaround

- 088-2025 MOVED Mayor Benford that the Council reports be accepted for information and FURTHER that the turnaround at the end of Lake View Avenue be added to a future meeting agenda.
- Oct 21 25 This will be contemplated for Budget 2026.

Fire hazard & other signs

- MOVED by Mayor Benford that the removal of the current fire hazard signs and the purchase and installation of two new fire level hazard signs be approved FURTHER that the total cost is not to exceed \$6000 and FURTHER that an application be made to utilize capital grant funding for the project.
- Jun 27 25 2 fire signs have been ordered. The plan is to remove the old signs and utilize the existing structures for the new signs. An LGFF grant application has been opened for this project.
- MOVED by Deputy Mayor Ward that an additional, smaller, fire level sign be ordered for Hillside Park, along with various road signs as discussed at meeting time and to a maximum expense of \$7000 and FURTHER that the costs be applied to the grant for fire and road signs.
- Jul 18 25 All three fire signs have been installed.
- Oct 11 25 Confirmation has been received that CCBF funding has been approved for this project. Administration is awaiting further direction from Council regarding signage purchase.

Drainage Plan

- MOVED by Mayor Benford that Jason Madge (Jaymad Contracting) be requested to present to Council options and quotes to do an overlay or otherwise fix part of Lake View Avenue, between 75 Lake View Avenue and 67 Lake View Avenue, to direct the drainage towards the drainage system on the North side of the road and FURTHER that we confirm the location of the road right-of-way and FURTHER that the costs be applied to the drainage grant, if possible.
- Aug 12 25 A request for decision has been included in the August 19, 2025 meeting package.
- MOVED by Deputy Mayor Ward that Lake View Avenue drainage improvements be considered in conjunction with a potential municipal drainage plan.
- 163-2025 MOVED by Deputy Mayor Ward that administration obtain engineering quotes for a municipal drainage plan.

Lake View Avenue Brush Pile

185-2025 MOVED by Deputy Mayor Ward that Mayor Benford follow up with JRC Contracting regarding the burn pile on Lake View Avenue and FURTHER that once WCB and

liability insurance have been confirmed, JRC contracting be requested to push the burn pile as directed by Council.

Oct 21 25 The Pile has been moved and administration has followed up with the fire department who will confirm if the pile is acceptable for the winter burn.

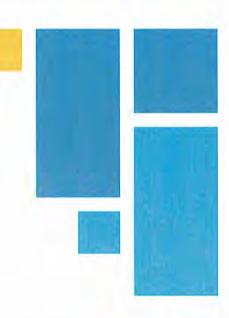

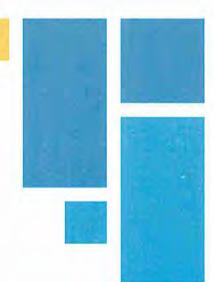

WORKING WELL TOGETHER: A TOOLKIT FOR COUNCIL-CAO -ADMINISTRATION RELATIONSHIPS



A foundational onboarding resource for elected municipal officials in Alberta

ABOUT THIS TOOLKIT

When you are elected to municipal office, one of the most important parts of your success is your working relationship with the Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) and the rest of Administration. This relationship influences everything from how smoothly Council meetings run, to how effectively services are delivered in your community, to how your strategic priorities are implemented.

A positive and respectful relationship between Council and Administration is the foundation for a healthy municipal organization.

This toolkit is designed to help you understand what that relationship is, how to make it work, and what to avoid. It is a practical resource for every member of Council, no matter your background, previous experience, or the size of your municipality. Whether you are serving in your first term or returning with experience, this guide provides essential knowledge and tools to navigate your role with clarity and confidence.

The toolkit is not about creating formality or bureaucracy. Instead, it helps answer key questions that often arise during the early days on Council:

- What is the CAO's role, and what is mine?
- What are the best ways to foster a productive team environment?
- Who do I talk to if I need information?
- How do I bring forward concerns or ideas without crossing the line into operations?

Built around four key themes, this resource draws on the principles of good governance set out in Alberta's *Municipal Government Act (MGA)*, and is informed by insights from interviews with current Mayors, CAOs, and Councillors. It includes both foundational concepts and practical advice, so you can build trust, communicate effectively, and stay focused on delivering value to your community.

Your council term is an opportunity to make a lasting difference. This toolkit is here to help you start strong and stay aligned with your colleagues, with Administration, and with the community you serve.







KNOW YOUR ROLE & RESPECT THEIRS

Understanding where your job ends and someone else's begins is one of the most effective ways to prevent confusion, conflict, and frustration. In municipal government, the separation between governance and administration is essential for maintaining clarity, accountability, and professionalism.

This division of responsibilities is not just about process. It is a foundational element of effective local leadership. When elected officials focus on setting direction and approving policies, and Administration is empowered to manage operations, the municipality runs more smoothly. This structure helps ensure that services are delivered consistently, decisions are made strategically, and the public can have confidence in their local government.

When roles are unclear, problems arise. Councillors may unintentionally interfere with day-to-day operations, staff may receive conflicting messages, and the organization may struggle to stay aligned with Council's priorities. These situations can erode trust, create inefficiencies, and even expose the municipality to legal or reputational risk. That is why understanding your role and working in partnership with the CAO and Administration is essential for a productive and respectful term in office.

What Council Does

- Sets long-term vision and priorities for the community
- Passes bylaws, adopts policies, and approves the municipal budget
- Represents residents and advocates on their behalf
- Oversees the performance of the CAO
- · Focuses on strategy, not service delivery

What the CAO Does

- Implements Council's direction through programs and services
- Oversees municipal staff and manages day-to-day operations
- Advises Council on policy, legal, financial, and operational matters
- Ensures compliance with legislation and Administration's policy
- · Leads the organization internally

Councillors Do Not Manage Staff

Individual Councillors have no authority to direct or evaluate municipal employees. Municipal staff report to the CAO, not to council, or council members individually. Respecting that reporting structure is not only good governance, it also protects staff from undue pressure and keeps you within your legal responsibilities.



"I always say, I sit on one side of the table and the administration sits on the other... I've definitely seen councillors who think they can just pick up the phone and tell the CAO what to do, and that's not a healthy relationship."

Council is a Team

Council is a governing body that makes decisions as a group and works best when it behaves like a team. Council makes decisions as a group. Once a decision is made by the majority, it becomes the decision of Council, even if you personally voted against it. Individual members cannot act on behalf of Council or issue directives to Administration on their own.

Example

Imagine Council has just voted 4 to 3 to approve a new location for a dog park. You were one of the three who voted against it. You made your concerns clear, you asked thoughtful questions, and you expressed your opposition during the debate. Now that the vote is over, the direction is set. It is no longer your personal position that matters - it is Council's collective decision that must be respected.

This is where things can become difficult.

You might personally disagree with the outcome. You might hear frustration from residents who also opposed the decision. You might even believe that the wrong choice was made. But your role as a member of Council is to uphold the decision of the group, not to continue campaigning against it once the vote has been taken.

Think Like a Board of Directors

You are part of a governing body - you do not manage the municipality. Your role is to:

- · Set direction
- · Monitor progress and risk
- · Represent the public interest
- · Hold the CAO accountable for results

Like a Chief Executive Office of a business, the municipality's CAO leads the implementation and manages staff to achieve Council's objectives.



"We work very much as a team of councillors. That doesn't mean we always agree — we have some very divergent viewpoints and debates can be quite active. But it's really rewarding to see how those different perspectives tease out solutions."

Practical Tips

- 1. If a resident complains about a service (e.g., garbage pickup, snow removal), acknowledge their concern, then refer them to the CAO or municipal intake system. Do not investigate or intervene directly. It might be natural for you to want to help a resident with a problem, but you may not have all the information and it is important to trust the expertise of staff to either resolve the concern or raise it with council as a whole.
- **2.** Avoid visiting municipal offices or job sites unannounced. Staff may feel pressured to treat your presence as direction.
- **3.** Don't copy (CC) or blind copy (BCC) staff on emails to the CAO unless explicitly agreed upon. It creates confusion about who's in charge.

4. Use Council meetings, strategic planning sessions, or set up a meeting with the CAO to raise operational concerns — not private messages or side conversations with staff.

The key thing to remember is that you were elected to a governing body, not a management position. Think about it like being appointed to the board of directors. Focus on the bigger picture of how to move your community forward and trust and respect the expertise of your CAO and their staff to get the job done.







BUILD THE RELATIONSHIP EARLY AND THEN KEEP AT IT

Strong working relationships do not happen automatically. They are built through trust, consistency, and shared understanding over time. In municipal government, the connection between Council and the CAO is one of the most important working relationships you will have. Starting off on the right foot and continuing to invest in the relationship throughout your term is essential to good governance.

Every newly elected Council brings change, and with it, an opportunity to set a new tone. How you engage with the CAO in the first weeks and months can shape how the entire Council works with Administration for the rest of the term. Clear expectations, respectful communication, and time spent building rapport make it much easier to navigate difficult conversations when they arise.

It is also important to remember that relationships are not one-time efforts. They require ongoing attention. Just like any high-functioning leadership team, Council and the CAO need to check in regularly, revisit shared goals, and have space to talk openly about what is working and what is not.

Plan for Disagreement, Not Just Consensus

Disagreement is a natural and necessary part of governance. Different perspectives, values, and priorities lead to debate and discussion. That is not only expected, it is healthy when managed with respect. Councils that understand how to work through disagreement early in their term are better equipped to make good decisions under pressure later on.

Take time as a new Council to talk about how disagreement and potential conflict will be handled. Discuss your communication preferences, decision-making styles, and how you like to receive feedback. Encourage your CAO to share their approach as well. Having this conversation up front reduces the chance that difficult moments later on will escalate into personal or organizational breakdowns.

What Council Does

- Schedule an initial one-on-one meeting with the CAO after the election
- Ask about their leadership style, communication preferences, and current organizational priorities
- Share how you prefer to receive information and raise questions
- Discuss how concerns should be brought forward and followed up on

Use Structured Tools

- Request your CAO plan a Council orientation session that includes governance training and team-building
- Request your CAO to organize a strategic planning session to align expectations
- Establish an annual CAO performance review process that is collaborative and productive, not punitive
- Use retreats or quarterly check-ins to reflect on how Council and Administration are working together







Practice Humility

- Acknowledge what you do not know and be willing to learn
- Take advantage of formal training opportunities through Rural Municipalities of Alberta, Alberta Municipalities, the Elected Officials Education Program, or your own municipality
- Ask questions early rather than acting on assumptions
- Be open to coaching and advice from peers, your CAO, or experienced Councillors



"Our CAO is actually very good about this. If we've got a challenging debate coming up, she reaches out to us all on a group email and says, 'Okay, this is coming, be prepared, come in with your material.' And we do... we look into stuff."

Check In Regularly

- Schedule a recurring check-in between the Mayor and CAO and between the CAO and Council
- Use informal briefings or coffee chats to continue building relationships with one another
- Share updates and feedback in a consistent and respectful way

Practical Tips

- 1. Participate fully in all orientation sessions. Even experienced Councillors benefit from a shared onboarding experience, and this will be one of your first chances to start building a strong foundation as a team.
- 2. Set a reminder to revisit your working relationship with the CAO and your council colleagues after six months.
- **3.** Respect your CAO's time and capacity. Avoid overwhelming them with multiple individual requests.

- **4.** Assume good intent. If something seems off, clarify it directly rather than letting tension build.
- **5.** Keep personal conflict separate from professional decisions. Focus on solutions, not personalities.







COMMUNICATE CLEARLY, RESPECTFULLY AND COLLECTIVELY

How Council communicates with the CAO and Administration sets the tone for the entire municipality. Communication is not just about the words used, but also about timing, tone, consistency, and process. When communication is clear and respectful, it builds trust, increases efficiency, and reduces misunderstandings. When it is inconsistent, vague, or emotional, it can quickly lead to conflict or confusion.

Municipal staff take their cues from Council. If council is organized, professional, and aligned in its communication, staff are better able to respond confidently and deliver on expectations. It also helps bolster a positive work culture where staff will be efficient and motivated in their actions. But when individual members go directly to staff, share inconsistent messages, or criticize Administration publicly, it puts staff in an impossible position and damages the relationship.

Communication is a shared responsibility. It works best when both Council and the CAO understand the expectations and norms for how to interact. This means agreeing on who communicates what, how decisions are shared, and how questions and concerns are addressed.

Direction Comes from Council as a Whole

- Only Council as a governing body can give direction to the CAO
- Individual Councillors do not have authority to direct staff or make operational requests
- Avoid one-off conversations with staff that may be interpreted as instructions
- Respect the CAO's role in managing internal communication and follow-up

Set Clear Protocols

- Work with the CAO to define how Councillors should request information or raise concerns
- Use Council meetings and briefing memos for formal updates and direction
- · Clarify whether informal check-ins or email summaries will be used for ongoing communication
- · Identify how emerging issues will be escalated or responded to between meetings

Be Professional and Respectful

- · Give constructive feedback to the CAO in private, not in public meetings or through social media
- Express appreciation publicly when staff go above and beyond
- · Avoid using Administration's staff as sources for political messaging or internal strategy - their role is to provide unbiased subject matter expertise and implement Council's official decisions.
- · Maintain confidentiality and avoid gossip or speculation

Focus on Patterns, Not Perfection

- Not every message will land perfectly- that is normal in any working relationship
- Look for overall patterns in tone, consistency, and responsiveness- if something feels off, raise it early and directly rather than letting frustration build
- · Keep communication open even during disagreement or tension









Example

If you receive a resident concern about a sensitive issue, such as a bylaw enforcement complaint or a planning decision, avoid responding publicly or contacting staff for details. Instead, forward the concern to the CAO and ask that it be reviewed and responded to through the proper process. This protects both you and the staff involved. While your role is to represent the public interest, as an elected official you are responsible for learning and using the proper procedures to do so.

Practical Tips

- 1. Agree as a Council on a shared communication protocol with your CAO. Make sure everyone understands it.
- Use the right channel for the right purpose. For emotionally charged or complex issues, start with a phone call or meeting to build understanding. Then, follow up with a short email to document agreements or next steps.
- **3.** Keep your tone respectful, especially in writing. Assume staff and the public may see any message you send.
- **4.** Do not speak on behalf of Council unless formally designated to do so. When in doubt, clarify your role.
- **5.** If you have feedback for Administration, bring it to the CAO directly. Avoid discussing staff performance publicly or with residents.







STAY FOCUSED ON THE PUBLIC INTEREST

As a member of Council, your role is to represent the whole community, not just the people who voted for you, not just the loudest voices, and not your personal preferences. The most effective Councils are those that stay focused on the long-term public interest and make decisions based on what will serve the entire municipality over time.

Working in the public interest requires discipline, especially when issues are politically sensitive or emotionally charged. It means staying out of day-to-day decisions and trusting Administration to implement Council's direction. It means focusing on policy, strategy, and outcomes, not personalities, blame, or popularity.

Being elected gives you influence, but it also gives you responsibility. Residents expect you to rise above personal conflicts, make informed decisions, and model professionalism. This includes how you speak about and to the CAO and Administration, how you respond to criticism, and how you conduct yourself in meetings and in the community.



"We have some very divergent viewpoints on our council. Debates can be quite active, but we are very respectful... one councillor I often butt heads with has probably been the most influential in making me a better councillor, because she challenges me and makes me think."

Put the Community First

- Ask yourself whether each decision serves the broader public, not just a specific group
- Let go of personal agendas from the campaign once Council direction has been set
- Recognize that not every issue will be popular, but good decisions are rooted in facts and values
- Lead with empathy, especially during periods of uncertainty or change

Avoid Micromanagement

- Stay focused on the "what" and the "why" -Administration handles the "how"
- Trust Administration to determine how best to implement Council's direction
- Refrain from following up on individual work assignments or requesting operational updates unless agreed upon with the CAO











Expect Disagreement and Handle It Constructively

- Disagreement is not dysfunction it is part of democratic governance
- Focus on debating ideas, not individuals
- Once a decision is made by Council, support it publicly and support Administration's implementation efforts
- Avoid undermining decisions in the media or in your community. Try to find areas of commonality or alignment, even when you might disagree on the final decision or how you got there.



"I didn't feel like council was representing the community. There was a lot of fighting — people voting just based on who brought the motion, not on the merits. That's not in the best interest of the community."

- Mayor, Mid-size City

Celebrate Progress Together

- Acknowledge successful projects, strong performance, and positive outcomes
- Recognize the contributions of both Council and administration when milestones are reached
- Find time to reflect on what has gone well not just what needs fixing

Example

Council approves a contentious rezoning application and residents are upset, your role is to listen and acknowledge their concerns. However, it is also your responsibility to explain the decision respectfully, help residents understand the rationale, and avoid blaming staff or other Council members. This helps preserve trust in the municipality, even when people disagree with the outcome.

Practical Tips

- Resist the temptation to revisit a decision just because it becomes politically uncomfortable. Stay grounded in the facts.
- **2.** Support staff in public, even if you have private concerns. Raise issues with the CAO or in closed session discussions, not in front of the media.
- **3.** Take time to review your municipality's strategic plan, participate in future opportunities to set strategic direction, and use it as a guide for future decisions.
- **4.** When you feel frustrated, ask whether the issue is about process or outcome. Not every disagreement needs to become a conflict.
- **5.** Celebrate collective wins. Use your platform to lift up the good work happening in your community and within your organization.

I am writing to inform you that a bill to amend the Water Act was tabled today in the Alberta Legislature.

Bill 7, the Water Amendment Act, follows from the water availability engagement held earlier this year. If passed, the proposed act amendments will:

- streamline regulatory requirements;
- improve water monitoring and transparency;
- allow lower risk inter-basin transfers to be approved by the Minister; and,
- support the use of alternative water sources, including rainwater and wastewater.

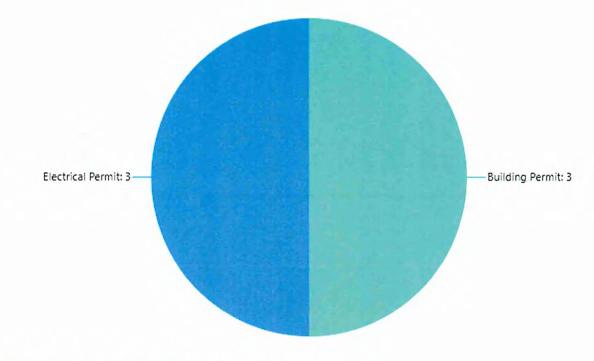
