

## **Wissner, Harold**

Harold N. Wissner, 82, of Sebewaing was taken to his Lord in Heaven on Tuesday morning, April 23, 2002. He died at his home following a brief illness. He was born Feb. 16, 1920, in Sebewaing, son of the late Rudolph and Frieda (Neu) Wissner. He was united in marriage to Nora A. Lindeman on Oct. 18, 1941. She preceded him in death on March 13, 1995, after 53 years of marriage. On Sept. 12, 1998, he was married to Orpha Bauer, who survives him. Harold was co-owner and operator of Sebewaing Concrete Products from 1954 until his retirement in 1974. He was a member of New Salem Lutheran Church and had served on many boards. He served in the U.S. Army during World War II.
