Same time, same place, great speakers and remember to invite a guest!




WW 2 Trivia for September & October 2023

Inspired by Ozzie's earlier trivia reports . . .

Eighty Years ago! . . . in September & October 1943 . . .

- ♦ Sept. 1 German army counter attacks at Salerno
- Sept. 9-16 Gen. Mark Clark's Fifth Army began landing south of Salerno for the Allied invasion of mainland Italy. Clark expected to meet Italians (Italy had surrendered), but ran into battletested Germans of the 16th Panzer Division. Every single planning assumption had been wrong
- ♦ Sept. 11 —German Field Marshal Kesselring declared all Italian territory was under German military control.
- ♦ Sept. 12 Mussolini rescued from captivity in the Hotel Imperiale in the Abruzzi Mountains
- ♦ Sept. 15 Mussolini forms a rival fascist government in Italy.
- Sept. 18 Mass deportations of French Jews from Paris to Buchenwald concentration camp and Sept. 20, deportation of Belgium's jews to Auschwitz
- ◆ Sept. 23 Italian Social Republic with capital at Venice was founded as a puppet state of Nazi Germany.
- ♦ Oct. 14 Black Thursday: The Second Schweinfurt Bombing Raid: By the time the Americans returned home, they had lost 60 B-17s, another 17 were no longer airworthy, and an additional 121 received minor damage. That was only the material loss. The number of aircrew killed, wounded, or missing in action was more than 600, totaling almost 20 percent of the men sortied. - Oct. 16 Jewish quarter of Rome surrounded by Nazis, they are sent to Auschwitz
- Oct. 18 In the Solomon Islands, there is a heavy air raid on the Japanese airbase on Bougainville.
- ♦ Oct. 25 Burma railroad completed & opens
- ♦ Oct. 29 Three allied officers escape camp Stalag Luft 3







Atkinson's WWII Trilogy is outstanding. In the second volume (2007), he follows "the American and British armies as they invade Sicily in July 1943, attack mainland Italy two months later, and then fight their way, mile by bloody mile, north toward Rome. The Italian campaign's outcome was never certain . . . But one underway, the commitment to liberate Italy from the Nozis never wavered. . . . Drawing on extensive new material from a wide array of primary sources, written with great drama and flair, this is narrative history of the first rank."

Another excellent writer is Alex Kershaw: His book (2012), *The Liberator*, features a WW2 soldier's 500-day odyssey from Sicily to Dachau. He has other well-known books: *The Longest Winters: The Battle of the Bulge and the Epic Story of WWII"*, "The First Wave: The D-Day Warriors Who Led the Way to Victory in WWII (2020). The D-Day book was also a best seller— "an utterly immersive, adrenaline-driven account of D-Day combat."

Martin Caiden's book on the Schweinfurt Raid (the second) in October 1943, offers insight into the disaster that unfolded with bombing raids





When Jimmy Stewart "left Hollywood in March 1941, [he] was America's boy next door movie star and a recent Academy Award winner. He left all that behind to join the United States Army Air Corps and fulfill his family mission to serve his country—only to face obstacle after obstacle from both Hollywood and Washington. Finally he made his way to the European Theater, where several near-death experiences and the loss of men under his command took away his youthful good looks. The war finally won, he returned home with millions of other veterans to face an uncertain future, suffering what we now know as PTSD." Author Matzen "sifted through thousands of Air Force combat reports and the Stewart personnel files; interviewed surviving aviators who flew with Stewart."
