From Our Rector

A few weeks ago, on January 1st, the Peanuts cartoon strip of the day featured Snoopy the dog engaging in his own annual review process. Perched atop his dog house, pen in hand, Snoopy fills out the paperwork he's required to submit each year to the head beagle, answering questions about what he accomplished in 2016: * How many rabbits have you chased? (Snoopy is embarrassed to admit that his number is

"none.") * How many cats have you chased? (Sadly, none, again.) * How many owls did you howl at? (Snoopy is pleased to report that this number is 12, although he only really saw two of them.) * Did you take part in any fox hunts? (Snoopy says he didn't want to risk getting trampled by a stupid horse, which is why he didn't participate.)

The last part of the questionnaire, though, is the most important, and it's the part that Snoopy says makes him uncomfortable, because it asks, as he describes it, very personal questions. Questions that get at the heart of what it means to be a good companion animal: How did you treat your master? Were you friendly with neighborhood children? Did you bite anyone?

Today's annual meeting and Annunciation's annual report are the church's version of Snoopy's paperwork for the head beagle. We make note of our finances and our 1 ministries, the worship services we offered, the outreach projects we initiated, the fellowship activities we planned. We answer a bunch of "how many this" and "how many that" questions. But underlying all of these pages of numbers and

information is a more fundamental question: are we who say we are? Are we being who we believe ourselves to be - a community committed to warmth and welcome, relationship and true hospitality? Are we building on our strengths, and striving to become more and more who it is that God wants us to be?

My hope - and my committed belief - is that the answer to all those questions is and will continue to be (it's one of my favorite words!) a resounding YES!

Because what I saw and experienced when I had my final interview here - exactly four years ago today (1/29) - was a congregation that, when asked to face up to a challenging situation or embrace a new idea says, "well, sure - let's give it a try."



Our "Yes" gives God something to work with. Change and growth and transformation and justice come from saying "yes." "Yes" moves the story forward. "Yes" helps bring God's vision of the world into being. "Yes" is a Kingdom of God word.

Yes.

And with that word in mind, I began to see our annual report in a slightly different way: not as just a description and enumeration of projects and activities that took place this year, but as a celebration of our collective Yeses:

- * Yes, I will take communion to that person at home or those people at Sunrise.
- * Yes, I will feed the homeless.
- * Yes, I will give my money and my time to this church and other causes that I feel strongly about, not because they need my financial support or time commitment (although they do) but because spending and giving away what is most important to us is one of the things that makes us spiritually whole.
- * **Yes**, I will listen to the friend who lost their job or is struggling to take care of an ailing parent.
- * Yes, I will help maintain this building so that lights always turn on and heat always pours out and toilets always flush.
- * Yes, I will take a meal to the family with the new baby or the person recovering from surgery.
- * Yes, I will work to solve that problem instead of saying, "You know, someone really ought to do something about..."
- * Yes, I value the spiritual development of our children, and yes I will help with Children's Chapel or Sunday Night Live. * Yes, I will get out of my pew at the peace, and greet the person I don't know.
- * Yes, I will jump into an open-ended commitment to provide music for worship, after Ron Lemke's retirement, even though I have no idea how long I'll be asked to fill in (thank you Elaine, and Ron, and Betsy).
- * Yes, I will sing my heart out, whether it's an old favorite hymn or something new that Dent is teaching.
- * Yes, I will introduce myself to the newcomer at coffee hour, and try to learn something about them and help them feel at home, because I remember what it was like to be the new person in a foreign land.

Our Annunciation-specific "Yeses" continue the "yeses" we took on at our baptism - to share in the Eucharist, to share the Good News of God, to seek out and serve the Christ that is in every person, to fight for justice and make the world a place of peace where everyone has the opportunity to pursue their "yeses."

Now, "Yes" can feel vulnerable, and "Yes" doesn't come with any guarantees. "Yes" carries us out into a dim, unknowable future. But, to

The great and fierce mystic William Blake said, There is no greater act than putting another before you. This speaks to a selfless giving that seems to be at the base of meaningful love. This act of "putting another before you"not only is a gift to those we assist, it is a gift to us. Outreach is like an exercise that strengthens our heart, mind, and spirit. There is something that is given

to us when we reach out to others. It is truly hard to explain ... a joyful spirit comes to mind. For me I don't sweat the small stuff as much, I am less stressful and lower in anxiety. Which allows me to be a spirit of love and kindness more often than not. I have found that the entry for January 30 in "Jesus Calling" says it quite nicely, Whatever occupies your mind the most becomes your god. Worries, if indulged, develop into idols. Anxiety gains a life of its own ... If our intent in this life is to be who God wants us to be by loving and caring for God's people then the "exercise" of Outreach would benefit us all. Annunciation offers a multitude of ways that we can "put others before you" or to at least take steps to start including them in our lives.

- We have PADS the third Friday of every month that allows us to purchase food ... and/or cook the food ... and/or deliver the food ... and/or serve the food to the homeless people who come to St. Marks Lutheran Church on Delaney Road.
- We have a service every Sunday at Sunrise Assisted Living in Gurnee where individuals or a team of people or a family from Annunciation presides at short service for the residents.
- The last Saturday of every month we have reserved the 9am to 11am slot for Feed My Starving Children ... 2 hours of bagging and boxing food to send off to locations where people are starving.
- Three times a week picking up the day old food from Starbucks and delivering them to shelters.
- Every Sunday individuals or teams visit the parishioners who are homebound, in the hospital, or in assisted living.



They then enjoyed a wonderful New Year's Eve lunch at Deacon Linda's home. On New Year's Day, Dent Davidson, our new



Leader of Song, officially joined the congregation for the first time. In the middle of January we were pleased to welcome Reverend Karen King back to our church while she was on leave from Tanzania. Rev. Karen gave stirring sermons and informed many of us at the adult forum about the challenging life in Tanzania and the service was enriched by inspirational hymns in honor of the Martin Luther King holiday. We were pleased to be able to donate over \$800 to assist her in her ministry in Africa. We also welcomed our seminarian, Shay Craig, to Annunciation, and while we hope to offer her experience in a small but thriving parish, we also look forward to benefiting from her considerable experience in congregational development. Our enthusiasm was tempered with the loss of two of our parishioners. 



changed when they encountered Jesus. It's clear this season is designed to help us meet Jesus and open ourselves to transformation as well.

Our liturgy at Annunciation will shift in Lent as well, in order for us to make room for more transformation in our lives personally, and as a congregation. Keep in mind that, while Lent is indeed the only penitential season of the Church Year, when we gather on Sundays we are still celebrating and proclaiming Jesus' Resurrection.

We will begin in silence, with a simple procession from the side. (except for Lent I, when we will chant the Great Litany in procession) By the time we get to Palm Sunday we will be READY for a big parade!

The first music we will sing each week is a glorious Russian Orthodox **Kyrie**. Rich 6 part harmonies give this Kyrie its full meaning, both as a song of penitence (Lord, have mercy upon us) and as a shout of praise (Lord, have mercy!!!)

We will pray the **psalms** in a new way as well. We will start with chanting on a single pitch, learning to listen to one another, and take the words of the psalms into our bodies in new ways. Listen for the sound of the shruti box (literally, *Breath Box...and instrument from India*) which will accompany us as we chant.

We will return to reciting the **Nicene Creed** in unison. And the **Prayers of the People** will have a sung refrain between petitions, with words in Spanish and English. (*Oyenos, Señor* = Hear us, Lord) We will pray the *contemporary* version of the **Lord's Prayer**. You'll find it side by side with the traditional version. This will prepare us for a lovely sung version of the newer translation during the Great Fifty Days of Easter, before we return to the beloved Albert Hay Malotte version in Pentecost and beyond.

The Sanctus and Fraction Anthem are both from recent American tradition known as "Paperless Music." This refers to music that is easily sung by all, because they are "lined out." This is an oral tradition as old as time itself. A line is sung to the congregation, and the congregation echoes each line: simple, and beautiful! As the seasons change here at Annunciation, may our worship call us into deeper relationship with our Lord, with one another, and with the world.

Meet Our Seminarian




Our New Seminarian Shay Craig

Capital Champaign

In April of 2015 - a little more than 2 years ago - we kicked off our capital campaign here at Annunciation. Bishop Lee was with us that evening; he preached and led the evensong service, and then we all went into Strang Hall and enjoyed a fabulous reception. It was the first



time we got to see the architect's renderings of what repairs and improvements we envisioned to help Annunciation continue to be a place of warmth and welcome and hospitality - not because we're

nice, friendly midwesterners - but because warmth and welcome and hospitality are embodiments and reflections of the way God loves us.

That evening, everyone who attended went home with one of these [capital campaign] brochures. Inside the front cover is a statement that captures the theological "why" underpinning our capital campaign, and now, two years into this campaign, I'd like to revisit part of that statement, to re-ground us as to why we're doing what we're doing. The statement is printed on the first page of the capital campaign update in the annual report.

We exercise our faith in community because Christianity is not just about our own

personal spiritual journeys or our relationship with God; it is bigger than that.

We are called to work together, to hold each other accountable, to discern how we can better connect, how we can better serve, how we can better welcome, how we can better see the God in each other, and the God in each person who comes through Annunciation's doors.

That's the "why" we try to keep in mind as we discern and carry out any project, any ministry. Whether we're talking about the HVAC system we replaced, or the new handicap accessible doors we just installed or the communication walls in the narthex and Strang Hall that will be completed in the next two to three months.... those are, on the face of it, just capital building improvements. But, as a friend of mine likes to say, "the thing isn't always the thing." Every project we've undertaken, and every project still on the drawing board, is intended as a means to "better serve, better welcome, better see the God in each other and each person who comes through Annunciation's doors."

But, it costs money to bring these projects to life. And when we launched the capital campaign two years ago, we all came through admirably, pledging just shy of \$500,000. The management of the projects we've implemented has also been superb, with every capital improvement coming through at less (sometimes far less) than originally estimated. People have donated their time to do work themselves (I'm looking especially at Mike Bill and Pat Donegan), and/or come up with more cost-effective means to achieve the results we were seeking.

So, two years later, as we read that statement of purpose again, about seeking to better serve and welcome and see God in one another, we need to ask ourselves: Do we still believe this? Is it still true?

Because if it is, then we need to recommit ourselves.

The reality is that some of us who pledged have died or left our community without fulfilling their pledges.

The reality is that life happens to some of us who have made pledges and we find we cannot complete them.

But the reality also is that our community is on a journey together. Everything we do here, we do together. And we believe that where we are working on God's mission, God will provide.

So ask yourself, if you have made a pledge and fulfilled it, can you make another, in support of those people around you who cannot? If you are new among us, will you join us in our journey together as a community in service of a welcoming, hospitable God?

A word about the phrase, "God will provide." In the Old Testament, the way God provided was more of a hands-on providing: holding back the wall of water so the Israelites could safely escape from the Egyptians, raining down manna on them when they were hungry.

However, when God manifested God's self in the person of Jesus, humanity was invited to *partner* with God, to open ourselves up to allow God's power to work *through* us. So when 5000 folks showed up to hear Jesus preach one day and then got hungry, Jesus could have requested of God an Old Testament-style delivery of manna. But instead, he asked the people to bring forth what they had - the five loaves and two fish - and then called on God to do what God does: magnifying, extending, and transforming peoples' offerings, completing the miracle.

God will provide. God does provide. I invite you to join in partnership with the God, "whose power, working in us, can do infinitely more than we can ask or imagine," so we may, more and more, become the welcoming and hospitable church we are called to be.
