RIDGEWAY - After receiving state certification, Infinity Acres Ranch is ready to open its doors to more clients than ever before.

On Tuesday, the nonprofit ranch - which features a menagerie of animals and offers tours and activities for children and people with special needs-held a ribbon-cutting to celebrate the official grand opening of its flagship ENABLE program.

ENABLE stands for Enriching, Nurturing Animal-Based Learning Experiences. In what began as a volunteer program, ENABLE uses the ranch's animals - including llamas, alpacas and many more - to help children and adults with intellectual and physical disabilities; for example, by strengthening motor skills, balance and coordination.

Now that ENABLE has received state certification. the ranch will be able to bill
