### → From the Pastor →

"You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit - fruit that will last - and so that whatever you ask in my name the Father will give you. This is my command: Love one another."

John 15:16-17



It is September! It's time for the first crisp days, the beginning of the chill in the air, sweater weather. It is also time for my favorite fruit: apples. There is a cider mill in Castile, NY. It is only open in the fall. It sells homemade sweet cider, cider donuts and apples! It also has a machine that my father designed and built. This machine sorts the

apples so they are uniform size. It washes them so they are clean. They then land at the end of the machine, where they can be gathered into baskets and sold. I wait every year to watch my father's machine at work. Each year, when I get there I ask,"Is it still working?" And the answer is always yes. My father' legacy endures.

What does this have to do with our scripture? Jesus sends his disciples to bear fruit. We have to care for the fruit from its beginning to its harvest. We might plant seeds or saplings, tend to them, prune them as they grown, then harvest the fruit. My father's machine is used at the end of the process. It takes that fruit that has been lovingly tended and prepares it for market. It presents the end product.

But we would not have an end product if we didn't have a beginning. Everything has a beginning, and an ending. The beginning, the planting of the seed, marks the beginning of what Jesus calls us to do. Then there is the tending, the pruning, the harvesting. How do we do these things? Verse 17 above spells it out: we love one another. We love those who are easy to love, and those who are difficult. Jesus didn't differentiate; neither can we. Think about someone you know who may not be easy to love. Maybe it is someone who is very vocal in expressing ideas you don't agree with. Sometimes the most vocal people are the most insecure. They figure if no one is going to love them anyway, they might as well make sure they don't. It is a self-fulfilling prophecy. Maybe instead of walking away (which is what they expect) you stay. When they wonder why you stayed, you just smile. You have planted the seed of love.

That is just one example. There are countless others. The seed of love is the important thing.

May you enjoy the onset of the brisk temperatures, and your first apple. Then, look at the seed inside that apple and think how you could plant it.



Now, the cheating bastard is dead, and both Caldwell wives have a mess to clean up.


