During their leadership SIGP overcame the challenges of fundraising amid a pandemic, celebrated a holiday event on Zoom, and kept all members involved by having hybrid meetings in the park once the weather turned warm. Without the resourcefulness of Ellen, Marya, and the board, SIGP might have seen a considerable drop in membership during these past two years of seclusion and uncertainties. Thank you.

The SDGs are global goals, and the targets within them include commitments to eliminate gender-based violence, eradicate human trafficking, ensure access to sexual and reproductive healthcare, expand economic opportunities for women, increase access to water and sanitation, and adopt legislation and policies that promote gender equality. The SDGs are designed to end poverty, hunger, AIDS, and discrimination against women and girls.

For the next two years I would like to focus on Elder Women Equality. Our emphasis will be on the injustice and discriminations senior women face as well as the neglect and abuse endured by them. As we help ease the financial burden for young women and girls with their education, we are providing them a better economic life and by doing so their equality as elder women will hopefully follow.

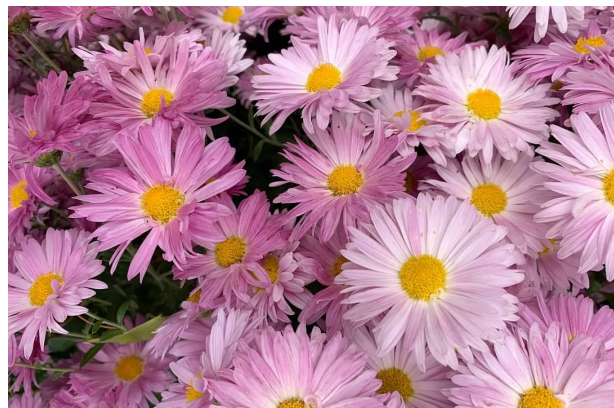

Great news! Our Club has been Approved as a Charity by Rocket Mortgage Classic Birdies!

Soroptimist International of Grosse Pointe (SIGP) has been approved as a charity for the Rocket Mortgage Classic Birdies for Charity PGA event in Detroit this month. This means Soroptimist Grosse Pointe will receive donations from our friends and families. Please consider donating so we can reach our goal of \$15,000.

- 100% of collected donations go back to SIGP.
- There are no online fees for donors since the administrative and processing fees are covered by The Rocket Giving Fund.
- This is a great opportunity to generate contributions through flat-rate donations or make a pledge based on the number of birdies made by PGA TOUR players during the 2022 Rocket Mortgage Classic.

- ♦ A flat rate donation is whatever amount you choose to give.

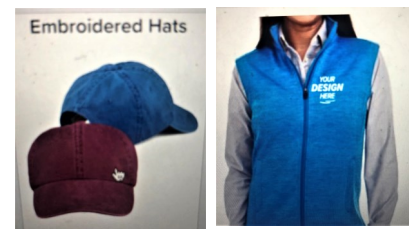

You're cordially invited to help plan "fun"raising!



With a new fiscal year starting, it is time to focus on creating and continuing successful fundraising strategies.

As you all know, we have many ways to support and empower women and girls. Fortunately, we have come up with many creative and fun ways to capture money. I have reviewed many of our club's past, present and some future fundraisers, which are a combination of patterns.

Some revolve around activities or events. These fundraisers were planned as "fun" events for club members and friends that included a "donation" in the cost. Some highlights were a day at Artee Spa, a dinner and tour of the Royal Eagle Church, a night of painting a picture of downtown Detroit, and a lunch and tour of the Yankee Museum.

Some include celebrations or parties. We had a 50th and 60th SIGP Anniversary party which included a dinner, tin can raffle, and of course a silent auction. These were huge events which fortunately netted large profits.

Some fundraisers included sales. We have engaged in many of these—from selling raffle tickets, accessories, entertainment books, popcorn, TCBY yogurt, books, baked goods, garage sale items, ornaments to embroidered clothing. We even participated in a shopping evening with wine at Circare and earned 10% of the sales that evening.

Fortunately, during COVID, a member created a "service" project that has netted us thousands of dollars for the past two years. We have been collecting donated "returnable bottles and cans" and returning them for ten cents each. The members who have volunteered to collect, deliver, and return the cans have raised almost \$9,600 so far.

Then there are ways to solicit donations. We have done that with a letter to members. We have signed up for Amazon Smile, which is an ongoing source of revenue, even if small. We initiated GoFundMe on our website.

We are now participating in Birdies for Charity thanks to Francine's influence.

So, this year we need more than our standard fundraisers. We are continuing our Can and Bottle Drive, our SIGP clothing sales, our Amazon Smile donation program and hopefully, our For the Love of Wine Raffle. We have already added the

Birdies for Charity donation platform. We need more “fun” raisers to continue and increase funds for our awards and other programs. Several members have already approached me with great new ideas. I have one of my own, and I believe many of you have one to share.

Ghana Girls and the Scarcity of Water

As I reflected on life in Ghana this morning my attention was drawn to the TV reports of numerous forest fires sweeping the West of our own country. What devastation! The lack of moisture makes it all so much worse. I am reminded of an incident of long ago while living in Damongo, Ghana, as a Peace Corps volunteer. A friend was helping me water the tomato plants lining the edge of my bungalow. He splashed quite a bit out of the bucket before reaching the plants and I shouted quickly, “Be CAREFUL, Saaka, you’re wasting it like it was water!”

Then I paused, stunned at what I had said.

Water! How priceless! In so many areas of the world it determines life or death. Yet, we take it for granted.

Do any of us in Michigan realize how very special is the ecological niche in which we live, surrounded by one fifth of the planet’s fresh surface water? In Ghana water is always precious and sometimes rare. Clean water, even more so. St. Anne high school, which includes young women our club helps with support of tuition, resides in the north, far from the rainforests of the southern part of the country. Farmers in Damongo suffer when there is lack of rain during the dry season, with the winds drifting down from the Sahara Desert bringing sand and hot air.

Crops shrivel and die. People go hungry. The nearest pond may be miles away and sometimes every drop for daily use means walking a great distance with a bucket. Our girls at St. Anne know this reality. Yes, clean water is available at the school now and they no longer have to walk two miles to the nearest pump. But some of them return to homes in remote areas where their friends and families struggle and where poverty and hardship thrive. The dry season remains particularly painful.

This is the world where we are trying to make a difference with our support. Our students at St. Anne remain truly grateful for the chance to be educated. Perhaps some of them will pursue science and then investigate ways for more families to enjoy clean water and better irrigation of crops. It would mean a better life not just for them as individuals but for their families and communities. Maybe one of our girls will discover a way to improve wells. Or economically convert ocean water into fresh! Now THAT would be an accomplishment worthy of a Nobel prize!

Regardless, their lives and communities will benefit because of our continued help. Go Girls! — SIGP Member Carol Hofer

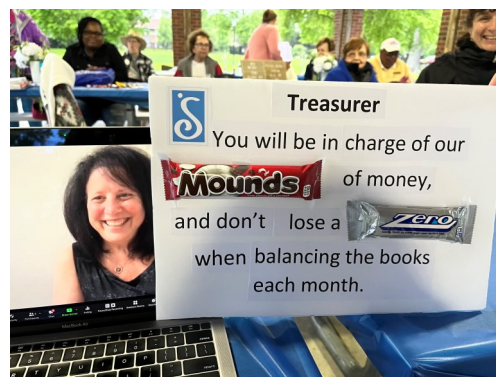

One of the challenges of the Mentoring for Success initiative is to find a time when the mentees can come in person.
