April 18, 2022 7:00pm Online only via Zoom Vulture: The Private Life of an Unloved Bird

Vultures are often overlooked, underappreciated, and unloved, despite the vital roles they play in healthy ecosystems. Worldwide, vultures are primarily scavengers; they can help stop the spread of disease by quickly and efficiently removing dead animals from the landscape. Unfortunately, due to poisoning, direct persecution, habitat loss, and other threats, vultures are more likely to be threatened or endangered than any other group of raptors. But in the Western Hemisphere, Turkey and Black vultures counter this trend and are increasing in number. Based on Katie Fallon's recent book, this fun presentation will explore the life and times of the noble Turkey Vulture, including its feeding, nesting, and roosting habits, migratory behaviors, and common misconceptions. Katie will also discuss what it's like to be up-close-and-personal with Turkey and Black vultures through her work with the Avian Conservation Center of Appalachia.

Katie Fallon is the author of the nonfiction books *Vulture: The Private Life of an Unloved Bird* (2020, 2017) and *Cerulean Blues: A Personal Search for a Vanishing Songbird* (2011), as well as also two books for children. She is a founder of the Avian Conservation Center of Appalachia, and has served as President of the Mountaineer Chapter of the National Audubon Society. A member of the International Association of Avian Trainers and Educators, Katie has worked with birds since 1998; over the last twenty years she has given educational presentations featuring live raptors, vultures, parrots, and corvids. She was also a columnist for Bird Watcher's Digest and has taught writing at West Virginia University, Virginia Tech, and elsewhere. Her first word was "bird." For more: www.katiefallon.com.



Lodging: Lodging is very limited in Portal, AZ so please start making your reservations at either <u>Cave Creek Ranch</u> or <u>Portal Lodge</u>. Lordsburg, NM is also an option for lodging. Camping is another option. Campsites are on a first-come, first-serve basis. Some of the recommended camp sites are Sunny Flat, Stewart, Idlewilde, and Herb Martyr, all <u>Forest Service campgrounds</u> in the Chiricahua Mountains. There are two RV parks in Rodeo, NM (<u>Rusty's RV Ranch</u> and <u>Mountain Valley Lodge & RV</u>).

Food/Supplies: The Portal Lodge Café and store is open daily from 10:00 am - 6:00 pm. They do take credit cards.

Gas: If you are taking HWY 9, Animas is the last place to fuel up. If you are taking I-10, fuel up in Lordsburg. There is no gas station in Portal, AZ.

Meeting: Since reception is very limited out there, Star will create a schedule with meeting times and locations. Saturday's meeting time is 9:00 am at the Chiricahua Desert Museum, along NM 80 just north of Rodeo.

The Feather Lake basin is now 7 months into its latest dry spell. The Sisyphean task of removing trash from within the basin continues.



Her professional work includes providing technical guidance on sensitive urban development and management for the City and County of El Paso, promoting biodiversity, providing educational programs and resources on wildlife, ecology, native plant landscaping, habitat and conservation-related issues, and conducting wildlife research on Burrowing Owls.

Dr. Elizabeth Walsh is a professor in Biological Sciences and Associate Director of the Center for Environmental Resource Management at the University of Texas at El Paso. She received her B.S. in Animal Biology and her Ph.D in Environmental Biology, both from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. Dr. Walsh's lab focuses on the evolution and ecology of freshwater invertebrates, especially of Chihuahuan Desert zooplankton and how species adapt to temporary habitats in arid lands.

We are eagerly awaiting increased water flows and the return of our summer-resident breeding birds. An adult Common Black Hawk on March 20 represented just the 2nd record for the park.
