

The Reading is from the Letter of the Holy Apostle Paul to Corinthians 4:9-16



For it seems to me that God has put us apostles on display at the end of the procession, like those condemned to die in the arena. The Reading is from the Gospel according to St. Matthew 18:23-35 "Therefore, the kingdom of heaven is like a king who wanted to settle accounts with his servants. As he began the settlement, a man who owed him ten thousand bags of gold was brought to him. Since he was not able to pay, the master ordered that he and his wife and his children and all that he

had be sold to repay the debt. "At this the servant fell on his knees before him. 'Be patient with me,' he begged, 'and I will pay back everything.' The servant's master took pity on him, canceled the debt and let him go. "But when that servant went out, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred silver coins. He grabbed him and began to

choke him. 'Pay back what you owe me!' he demanded. "His fellow servant fell to his knees and begged him, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay it back.' "But he refused. Instead, he went off and had the man thrown into prison until he could pay the debt. When the other servants saw what had happened, they were outraged and went and told their master everything that had happened. "Then the master called the servant in. 'You wicked servant,' he said, 'I canceled all that debt of yours because you begged me to. Shouldn't you have had mercy on your fellow servant just as I had on you?' In anger his master handed him over to the jailers to be tortured, until he should pay back all he owed. "This is how my heavenly Father will treat each of you unless you forgive your brother or sister from your heart."


PARABLE OF THE UNMERCIFUL SERVANT

(Mt 18:21-35)

God's Overwhelming Mercy

When Peter asked Jesus how many times he should forgive—"seven times?"—he thought he was being generous. But Jesus shatters that limit: "Not seven times, but seventy times seven." He then tells this parable about a servant who owed his king an impossible sum—ten thousand talents, a debt so large it could never be repaid in a lifetime.

This is where the parable begins—with an image of **our own relationship to God**. We stand before Him with a debt of sin we could never repay. Yet, when we fall on our knees and cry out for mercy, He does not calculate, He does not hesitate. He cancels the debt completely. Our



God is not a bookkeeper tallying our failures; He is a Father who delights in showing mercy.

The Heart that Refused to Change

But here's the tragedy: the servant who had just been forgiven an impossible debt finds a fellow servant who owes him a tiny sum—barely a day's wages. Instead of passing on the mercy he received, he grabs him by the throat and demands payment. The mercy that touched him never entered his heart. He wanted to be forgiven, but he did not want to become forgiving.

This is where the parable turns into a mirror for us. How often do we accept God's mercy in confession, in prayer, in Holy Communion—and yet refuse to forgive someone who has hurt us? How often do we cling to grudges, replaying them in our minds, while asking God to forgive us our trespasses?

Forgiveness as Freedom

The parable ends with the unmerciful servant thrown into prison, not because the king suddenly became cruel, but because **his own unforgiving heart built the prison walls**. When we refuse to forgive, we lock ourselves into bitterness and resentment. Forgiveness is not about excusing the wrong or forgetting the pain—it is about **releasing ourselves from the chains of hatred**.

Christ is clear: "So will my heavenly Father do to you, if you do not forgive your brother from your heart." Forgiveness is not optional in the Christian life; it is the very proof that we have received God's mercy.

Living the Parable Today

Think of someone in your life right now who has wounded you. Maybe it is a family member, a friend, a neighbor, a co-worker. Their debt against you feels heavy. And yet, compared to what

God has forgiven us, it is small. The invitation of this parable is not to minimize your pain, but to place it in the light of the cross.

On the cross, Jesus bore the full weight of our sins—the weight of every betrayal, every lie, every act of hatred. And even then, He prayed: "Father, forgive them." If the Son of God could forgive from the cross, then surely, with His strength, we can begin to forgive from our wounded hearts.

The parable of the Unmerciful Servant leaves us with a choice: will we be like the servant who received mercy but withheld it, or will we become living vessels of God's forgiveness? Every time we forgive, we are not simply letting go of a debt—we are proclaiming the Gospel. We are showing that God's mercy has changed us.

May we never forget: forgiven people must become forgiving people.





KINDNESS

Kindness is a reflection of God's love at work within us. When we show kindness, we become instruments of His grace, allowing others to experience His presence through our words and actions.

True kindness flows from a heart transformed by prayer and humility—it is not just politeness or good manners, but a spiritual offering that points back to the Source of all goodness.

In Scripture, we are reminded that kindness is a fruit of the Spirit, evidence that God dwells in us. Each act of kindness, no matter how small, becomes a seed of the

Kingdom of Heaven planted in the world, bearing witness to Christ's light. To live kindly is to imitate the mercy of Christ, who embraced the broken, comforted the suffering, and welcomed the stranger, teaching us that love is made visible through kindness.

STATEMENT OF THE COUNCIL OF BISHOPS OF THE UKRAINIAN ORTHODOX CHURCH OF THE USA AND DIASPORA ON THE OCCASION OF THE 34TH ANNIVERSARY OF UKRAINE'S INDEPENDENCE

Beloved in Christ,

With profound gratitude to Almighty God, the Council of Bishops of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the United States of America and the Diaspora extends heartfelt greetings to the clergy and faithful in the United States, South America, Australia, Western Europe, and Ukraine on the 34th Anniversary of Ukraine's Independence.

This day is a sacred occasion of remembrance, thanksgiving, and renewed hope. We glorify God for the divine gift of freedom granted to our ancestral homeland, and we give thanks for the perseverance and spiritual courage of the Ukrainian people - past and present - who have carried the torch of faith and nationhood through trials, persecutions, and wars.

The independence of Ukraine is not merely a political milestone; it is the fruit of centuries of suffering and sacrifice. From the baptism of Kyivan Rus' by Saint Volodymyr the Great in 988, the Ukrainian Christian identity has been rooted in the eternal truth of the Gospel. prayers become a stream of grace flowing into every wounded village, every grieving heart, and every soul longing for hope.

It's strange


Our Priorities

It's strange how \$20 feels like such a large amount when given as an offering in church, but so small when spent at the store.

It's strange how an hour and a half in church can feel so long, yet the same time flies by when watching a good movie.

It's strange how we struggle to find words for prayer, but have no problem chatting endlessly with a friend.

It's strange how reading even one chapter of the Bible can feel difficult and boring, yet reading 100 pages of a novel is easy.



It's strange how we want front-row seats at concerts, but do everything possible to sit in the back row at church.

It's strange how we need two or three weeks' notice to add a church event to our schedule, but can make time for other events at the very last minute.

It's strange how learning God's Word to share with others feels hard, but learning, understanding, spreading, and repeating gossip comes naturally.

It's strange how we believe everything magazines and newspapers say, but doubt the truth of the Bible.

It's strange how everyone wants a place in heaven, but not everyone is willing to do something to get there.

It's strange how we forward jokes on social media instantly, but when it comes to sharing a message about God, we hesitate and think twice.


Reflection:

These "strange" contrasts remind us how easily our priorities can be misplaced. What feels burdensome when it comes to faith often feels effortless when it comes to worldly pleasures. This tension reveals not only the weakness of human nature but also the need for God's grace to reorient our hearts. Perhaps the real question is not why these things feel strange, but what they reveal about where our treasure truly is. When we pause to notice these contradictions, we are invited to realign our lives, placing God at the center so that what once felt heavy may become a joy.

Orthodox Christianity 101

"...A NEW HEAVEN AND A NEW EARTH"

Paradise is not a place, it is rather a state of the soul. Just as Hell is a suffering on account of the impossibility to love, Paradise is bliss that derives from the abundance of love and light. He who has been united to Christ participates completely and integrally in Paradise. The Greek word paradeisos signifies both the garden of Eden, where primordial man was placed, and the age to come, where those people who have been redeemed and saved by Christ taste eternal blessing. It can also be applied to the final stage of human history, when all creation will be transformed, and God will be 'all in all'. The blessing of Paradise is also called in Christian tradition 'the



Kingdom of heaven', 'the life of the age to come', 'the eighth day', 'a new heaven', 'the heavenly Jerusalem'.

There are many descriptions of Paradise in hagiographic and patristic literature, some of them are very picturesque, and include trees, fruit, birds, villages, and so on. Certain Byzantine saints, such as Andrew the Fool and Theodora, were 'caught up to the third heaven' (2 Cor.12:2), and, upon their return, described what they saw there. The authors of their lives, however, emphasize that human words can explain the experience of participation in the divine only to a limited degree. The concept of Paradise, as that of Hell, must be detached from the material images with which it is usually connected. Moreover, the idea of 'many rooms' (cf. John 14:2) ought not to be understood too literally: the 'rooms' are not places, but rather different degrees of closeness to God. As St Basil explains, 'some will be honoured by God with greater privileges, some with lesser, for star differs from star in glory (cf. 1 Cor.15:41). And as there are many rooms with the Father, some people will repose in a more supreme and exalted state, and some in a lower state'. According to St Symeon the New Theologian, all images relating to Paradise, be they 'rooms' or 'mansions', woods or fields, rivers or lakes, birds or flowers, are only different symbols of the blessing whose centre is none other than Christ Himself.

St Gregory of Nyssa advances similar idea of God as the sole and integral delight of the Kingdom of heaven. He himself substitutes all transient delights of mortal life: '...While we carry on our present life in many different ways, there are many things in which we participate, such as time, air, place, food and drink, clothing, sun, lamplight, and many other necessities of life, of which none is God. The blessedness which we await, however, does not need any of these, but the divine Nature will become everything for us and will replace everything, distributing itself appropriately for every need of that life...'

Thus, according to St Gregory and to certain other Fathers of the Church, the final outcome of our history is going to be glorious and magnificent. After the resurrection of all and the Last

Judgment, everything will be centred around God, and nothing will remain outside Him. The whole cosmos will be changed and transformed, transfigured and illumined. God will be 'all in all', and Christ will reign in the souls of the people whom He has redeemed. This is the final victory of good over evil, Christ over Antichrist, light over darkness, Paradise over Hell. This is the final annihilation of death. 'Then shall come to pass the saying that is written: 'Death is swallowed up in victory'. 'O death, where is thy sting? O Hell, where is thy victory?.. But thanks be to God, Who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ' (1 Cor.15:54-57).

Prayer of the Elders of Optina

(Should be read in the Morning)

O Lord, grant that I may meet all that this coming day brings to me with spiritual tranquility. Grant that I may fully surrender myself to Thy holy Will.

At every hour of this day, direct and support me in all things. Whatsoever news may reach me in the course of the day, teach me to accept it with a calm soul and the firm conviction that all is subject to Thy holy Will.

Direct my thoughts and feelings in all my words and actions. In all unexpected occurrences, do not let me forget that all is sent down from Thee.

Grant that I may deal straightforwardly and wisely with every member of my family, neither embarrassing nor saddening anyone.

O Lord, grant me the strength to endure the fatigue of the coming day and all the events that take place during it.

Direct my will and teach me to pray, to believe, to hope, to be patient, to forgive, and to love. Amen.
