ENDURO "NIGHT MARES!"

A recent Enduro in Texas (recent like in the 18th of February) has stayed with me. It was the '96 kick-off event for the Black Jack Enduro Circuit, co-sanctioned with the Texas Championship Enduro series.

The reason it has stayed with me is the last two issues we have put out...talk about enduro's, and what to expect. I "think" that information still holds true for almost "any" enduro you might go to in most parts of the country...but not in Texas!

It was a very good event, with good trails, excellent speed averages, and "scary checks." Scary because they surprised me every time I found one! Always situated in some suck hole

thing or around a corner, or down in a "near suck hole," . . . hole. In essence . . . perfect! So what was the big deal? "They" do things different in Texas. I was mentally exhausted by mile 15 just trying to figure out

why there was no mileage! If you remember back an issue or two, you'll recall I stated that "they" have to give you mileage every 3 miles. NOT IN TEXAS! In Texas, it's every 5 miles and by the rarity of mileage markers that I found . . .checks must count as mileage markers too.

Another thing I found to be different was that checks have to be accurate for mileage within two hundreths of a tenth. AMA and almost everyone else requires they be accurate within a tenth. This got me thinking . . .don't ever PUT ON AN ENDURO IN TEXAS! If you only have to give mileage every 5 miles, you have essentially increased the amount of mileage for a rider to be

off in. What's that you say? It's pretty normal in any course for riders to cut a corner by three feet, or slide out in corners by four feet, or get lost slightly in a clearing and make a fifty foot circle adding, or subtracting mileage . . .slightly. Requiring mileage every three miles insures the rider has the opportunity to correct for these innocent "deviations." When you increase the mileage posted requirement to 5 miles . . .that's almost double the area to screw up in! NOW, require the promoter to have his checks accurate to two hundreths of a mile . . . and you have created a narrow margin for the promoter (and the rider) to work in.

The up side to this is . . .it seems to work. Yes, a lot of people burned at least one check. A good percentage burned two, and a few unlucky souls burned several. Yours truly burned one, which later was thrown out due to a poorly marked corner between checks 5 and 6 which put the mileage off 5 hundreths (legal in AMA and nearly every other enduro circuit in the world) but illegal in Texas due to the two hundreths rule.

The other unusual thing about Texas is the trail marking. I had forgotten about this since riding a Lubbock 2-day several years ago. We're used to trees. Lot's of trees. Conveniant trees always ready to hold an arrow. In Texas trees get sparse, sometimes replaced with cactus . . . or a random rock here and there. There's nowhere to staple an arrow. Solution; tie ribbons on almost anything. This means you get used to following arrows in the tight woods test sections, come out into an open area, and get in the "let's circle around this field parade" with about twenty other riders until somebody finds the trail out, and you all go for it! I think this is actually good as it gives riders ample opportunity to brush up on their grass track skills in those open areas as they race frantically around totally brain-dead-lost. I personally won at least two motos in one clearing and maybe would have won more had I not noticed that I was racing against "new," confused riders each lap. As some riders found their way out . . .new ones entered and the improvised grass track test went on . . .at least until I calmed down enough to find my way out . . .and left the race to others. Was the course marked bad? . . .No, it was just different. I'm not used to ribbons hung from tree's and brush instead of arrows.

The bottom line after all my whining is: It was a hoot! The actual trail was great with no face slappers. Mileage was accurate, kind of far apart, but always on the money. I can't wait for next year!

YES ... THAT'S GOOFY!

Snapshots from this enduro included:

Ron Shreve and Max (the motorcycle Dentist) Harkey both live within 30 miles of Springfield Missouri. Both chose to go to Texas. They started a minute apart. Ron caught Max in one of those open clearings, Max went wide, Ron no doubt "ripped" his WR-250 Yamaha thinking he had the inside line . . . and ran over Max. Run over isn't really adequate, when I got there I noticed Ron with two bikes parked standing there looking at this guy lying on the ground in front of him curled up in a fetal position. I asked Ron if he needed help and he answered; "No, he just wants to rest a minute." I didn't know it was Max mainly because I've never seen Max curled up in a "butt-high" fetal position before . . . and left. Later, I found out it was him.

Now I ask you . . . If they just want to run over each other . . . couldn't they just stay in Missouri and do that? I mean really, . . . figure all the gas money and tolls that each of them paid.

"Me" in a 24 mph section (late of course) trying to go as fast as I knew how, sliding around a tight left hander in tight woods only to do a very ungraceful nose-wheely as I got "all over the brakes" in an effort to miss a cow complete with two baby's in a panic, running down the trail about three feet in front of me, hopping and kicking at a dead run (noticably upset) at this intrusion on their peaceful grazing area.

While this may not seem to unusual (we were riding on a ranch preoccupied with raising cattle)..... I have to admit, I stopped long enough to make sure they didn't have ribbon tied onto them anywhere...that would mean I was missing trail!

BEGINNERS OUTLOOK

Les Blizzard sent me a couple of notes on the Texas "Jimmy Jack Enduro," and they seemed worthy of sharing with you because it was his first enduro.

Top Ten ways of knowing your first enduro was "not" an overnight success!

- 1. Following Steve Underwoods family & friends in his motor home on what turned out to be a non-stop trip to the Jimmy Jack Enduro. Come to find out . . .motor homes don't need to stop for gas, food, or BATHROOMS!
- 2. Riding on the same minute as Ron Shreve (an A rider) who gets both of us lost within 100 yards of the start line.
- 3. When you finally reach the last check point, you overhear conversation about night approaching and the need to light lanterns.
- 4. Having Steve Underwood look at your score card when it's over and say; "Well . . .turn it in anyway, you never know!"
- 5. Giving your score card to the lady who has been scoring hundreds in her head only to see her panic when she sees your numbers and spends five minutes looking for a calculator.
- 6. At the first gas stop on the way home, finding out that your legs won't work, and you can't stand up straight once you pry yourself out of the truck.
- 7. Thinking I must have hit my head hard in one of my falls because my brain damaged mind can't wait until the next Enduro!



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

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"NEW WAVE," GRAPHICS? POSSUM HOLLOW I


Yes, really! I have it from a very reliable source . . Steve Leivan has a new style of graphics!

BEAR CREEK ENDURO


Bear Creek Enduro
