They moved the unsightly control box from the flower bed, increased the size of the beds and placed all new plantings plus two beautiful wooden benches. Improved irrigation, new lighting and new beds near the street creates a whole new look.



Scholarship Recipients Announced

Graduation season brings joy to graduates and their families. It marks significant changes in the high school graduate's life and in the lives of their family. In some cases, they will move from the family home and live alone or with "roomies" for the first time. In those instances, significant changes also happen in the lives of others in the home..."Susie" or "Billy" is no longer in the home and will be missed. Maybe a younger sibling gets a new bedroom! The graduate who begins college experiences a VERY different environment whether he or she lives at home or away.

Each year graduating seniors who live in our community may apply for a scholarship from the HOA. They go through an application process including an essay and personal interviews. They tell of their educational accomplishments, community service, and extracurricular activities. Lease Terms Everyone is aware that in our current economic climate housing has become much more expensive. That leads to significant changes in how some people buy or lease housing. Our community has a number of properties that are leased and we are very welcoming to all who come, either as buyers or renters. However, the changing landscape means some landlords or renters would prefer either to engage in short-term leases, perhaps set for days or weeks. It is believed this could adversely affect the "settled" personality of the community.

At the annual meeting a guideline was established to require six months as the minimum time for any lease or rental of property. This pairs well with the already-existing provision that part of a property may not be leased or rented other than to certain relatives of the owner.

Street Concerns

Topics often arise concerning the use of our streets. The two most common are street parking and drivers' speed.

Our streets are owned by Et. Bend County. Therefore, the HOA has no controlling authority. We cannot get our commun.

Our streets are owned by Ft. Bend County. Therefore, the HOA has no controlling authority. We cannot gate our community or install speed bumps or other traffic control devices. We must all depend on the common courtesy of drivers.

We have lots of children in the community so please be mindful of your speed. Even though the official speed limit is 30 MPH as our neighbors requested we have posted an informal limit of 20 MPH. Voluntary adherence to the lower limit would make our neighborhood much safer.

What about cars parked on the streetside? Only asking that your neighbor kindly move their vehicle might get it moved. As long as they are parked parallel to the curb, headed in the right direction and within 18 inches of the curb they are legally parked. They must not block a driveway or be less than 15 feet from a fire hydrant, 20 feet from a corner and 30 feet from a stop sign.

Pool Concerns

Last quarter we introduced Texas Aquatic Enterprises (TAE) as our new pool management company. Unfortunately, there have been some "bumps in the road" as they transitioned into our pool. The previous contractor had not left the pool in the best condition, so TAE had a task to bring it into better operating conditions.

In the first few weeks of the swim season operational shortcomings emerged. Cleanliness and personnel issues came to light, mostly noted in social media with few if any specifics. Thanks to our neighbors who responded to our requests for specific information we were able to bring those issues to light for AES.

HOA has been discussing the problems directly with the highest levels of AES management and improvements have been noted. We shall continue to follow up regularly to see that our residents' expectations are met.

Summer Days Have Returned

Even though we have experienced abnormal heat consistently since mid-May, official summer is only a few weeks old. That means special care needs to be taken to protect each of us and our families (including pets). Some suggestions are:

- Keep your family safe with sunscreen. SPF 50 is usually recommended. Apply liberally and often.
- Watch out for 'skeeters'. Once the drought breaks they will be back with a vengeance.
- Remember protective gear such as helmets, knee pads and Coast Guard approved floatation devices. Assure that your children use them.
- Practice water safety, whether in a pool, lake (not ours, please), river, or other water body. Be certain your children are safe in and around water. Swim lessons save lives.
- Dehydration is a real danger. It can slip up with devastating results. Drink lots of water and avoid alcoholic beverages.
- Be especially careful in your car. Summer is more dangerous on the road due to drivers who are in unfamiliar territory, exhausted or under the influence of alcohol. Also..... when leaving your car check to be sure everyone is out.
- Protect food from exposure to heat and keep your hands clean.
- Your pet needs shade and plenty of water. If it is too hot for you it is too hot for them. Share your a/c with them if possible.
- LAST BUT CERTAINLY NOT LEAST...Know where your children are, who they are with, and what they are doing. Keep them safe.

United States Flags at Entries

In May HOA began searching for a Boy Scout Troop to post flags for our community on days that are normally noted by the display of flags. Unable to locate such a troop we turned to Flags of Hope, who will post a flag at each entry. They will provide the flags and all the associated hardware and post them for each of the following dates. They will then remove and store the flags and hardware. This will assure all flags and hardware are always clean and in good condition.



Flags of Hope donates 10% of the cost to tax exempt organizations that support Veteran's causes.

In short order, Tim located the 5-foot-4-inch gator that weighed about 50 pounds and captured him humanely. After



examination and recording size, weight, etc., Tim relocated him to the alligator preserve located on IH10 near Beaumont. The two-year-old will live out his long life in gator luxury along with lots of other new gator friends, having plenty of good food and free veterinary care if needed. Lake and Park Reminders

While specific regulations exist at the pool for the safety of all swimmers, there are also a few regulations in our other common grounds. They are for the safety of all as well. Lakes and parks are for use only by residents and their guests.

No swimming is allowed in the lakes. There are sometimes alligators there and never any lifeguards.

Fishing is allowed, but only as catch-and-release. This helps keep our fish healthy so they can help balance the ecosystem.

No motorized vehicles are allowed in parks or around lakes. Everyone's safety and healthy maintenance of the facilities are at stake here. Recently a motorbike rider hit an elderly couple walking with two young grandchildren, one in a stroller. One of the grandparents lost control of the stroller. It careened down the embankment and into the water with the one-year-old child in it. Thankfully there were no serious injuries but this could have ended really badly, even in the drowning of the toddler.

Even though lighting is in the parks they are open only from dawn to dusk. Security and safety are top priority so everyone can enjoy the parks.
