→ From the Pastor →

³⁷Pilate asked him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice." 38 Pilate asked him. "What is truth?"

Jesus Sentenced to Death

After he had said this, he went out to the Jews again and told them, "I find no case against him" John 18:37-38 NRSVue

Truth. It's a hard concept. Here we have Jesus telling Pilate that he was born and came into the world to testify to the truth. Pilate asks him,"What is truth?" Jesus does not reply. Pilate is left to figure it out on his own. We are never sure, from the Biblical accounts that he does. He rather hedges his bets, incase what Jesus said was in fact the truth. He tells the Jesus there is no case against Jesus. He tells the truth. There never was a truthful case against Jesus. All the accusations that were made against him were either fabrications or his own words, twisted by those who wished to see him crucified. His truth was not one many people wanted to embrace. It scared those in power. It scared the religious elite. It scared the scribes and Pharisees, who were absolutely certain they had the corner on the truth.

Each of these groups was threatened by the truth Jesus proclaimed. How dare he heal the blind, make the lame to walk and eat with sinners? Who gave him that authority? The only one who had that kind of power was God himself. And, the only people who were truly spokespeople for God were the Old Testament prophets, like Moses and Elijah. Didn't they, the Pharisees, follow the Law of Moses? Didn't they believe in the truth? Yes, they did...as far as it went. What they were not able to wrap their minds around was that God might have updated the truth. God always loved sinners, had compassion on the blind and the lame, and sought to have his followers do the same. But, the prophets who proclaimed this message were seldom welcomed. They were persecuted, laughed at, and run out of town. Even Moses was questioned by those he led out of slavery.

Then, there was the question of sin and repentance... Because the Pharisees followed the Law of Moses, they did not believe they were sinners. They saw nothing wrong with parading their virtue in the streets, and thanking God for making them high above the sinners. They were convinced this was the truth.

Jesus came to live, die, and rise again for another truth. That truth, which was from the beginning, was that God loves all of us. God does not play favorites. God loves the sinners the same as the saints. God does not have a hierarchy, as the Pharisees believed. We are all equal in God's sight. And, God wants us to spend eternity with him. But, for that to happen, our sins had to be forgiven. The slate had to be wiped clean. So, God sent Jesus to do that. That is God's truth.



the church is not a requirement. For this period, the breakfasts will be on **Monday, March** 4th, and **Monday, April 1st.**


