






Stewardship begins with gratitude ... gratitude for who we are in Christ, gratitude for the salvation he has won for us on the Cross, and gratitude for who he is and all his gifts to us. As stewards, we recognize that we are completely dependent on God for all we have and need and that, as we offer thanks for God's gifts, we also strive to use them in ways that please him.

Testing your knowledge of Scripture

Can you identify who from Scripture is in the Sycamore tree?



If you said Zacchaeus, you were right. Do you remember how Jesus changed his life and his attitude toward his wealth (Luke 19:1-9)? Prior to meeting Jesus and experiencing Jesus' love and the forgiveness of his sins, he lived for his money. After Jesus changed his heart, Zacchaeus lived to please the Lord. This was demonstrated when he gave away half of what he owned to the poor and four times the amount to those he had cheated. Are you handling your resources in such a way as to reflect a relationship with Jesus?

Does God Need Stewards?

As stewards, we acknowledge God as the creator and owner of all things. What God has entrusted to us, we are to manage for him according to God's purpose. Because we are merely caretakers of God's property, we, through our giving, are simply returning to God what he has already given to us. The Psalmist wrote, "... every animal of the forest is [his] and the cattle on a thousand hills" (Psalm 50:10). With God's vast resources, God does not need our offerings. "I have no need of a bull from your stall or of goats from your pens" (Psalm 50:9).

Neither are we sharing "our" talents. Those, too, are gifts from God. The most eloquent preacher cannot work faith in the heart of the believer (1 Corinthians 12:3). The most skilled doctor cannot heal (Psalm 103:3). Each believer possesses at least one gift to be used serving others, but these gifts "he has received" (1 Peter 4:10) from God's gracious hand.


Does God need our gifts to accomplish his will? Did He need Moses' staff to part the Red Sea or Joshua's army to fell Jericho? Hardly! Does God need the preacher or teacher to impart his Word or the researcher to find a cure for cancer? Not really. *"For the foolishness of God is wiser than man's wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than man's strength"* (1 Corinthians 1:25).

Even time is something over which we have no control. "My times are in your hands" (Psalm 31:15). We cannot choose the time of our births or our deaths (Hebrews 9:27). James tells us that all our plans are boasting and bragging. He wrote, "Instead you ought to say, 'If it is the Lord's will, we will live and do this or that" (James 4:14-16). God is not bound by time. "For a thousand years in your sight are like a day that has just gone by, or like a watch in the night" (Psalm 90:4).

No, God does not need our money, our gifts, or our time. However, we are privileged to be chosen by God to be his stewards. God has called us to give of "our" resources, "our" money, gifts, and time.

He calls us to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, provide hospitality to the stranger, clothe the needy, and care for the prisoner (Matthew 25:38-40). We are to comfort as we have been comforted (Luke 11:4).

Let us, as stewards in this age, humbly consider the privilege God has given us by calling us to serve others with his gifts.



Being Stewards of God's Light

As God changes night into day, so he brings us out of spiritual darkness into his light. "You, O Lord, keep my lamp burning; my God turns my darkness into light" (Psalm 18:28).

As God's redeemed people, we find courage in the words of Psalm 27:1, "The Lord is my light and my salvation - whom shall I fear?" God's light outshines all other light: His light guides us, his light protects us, and his light saves us.

Being a light means more than going to church. It means more than busyness in church work. Being a light means to share Jesus so others will come to know Christ as the way, the truth, and the life.


A Stewardship Illustration

The pig frowned, "Yes," he said, "but you're giving out of surplus; for me, giving is a real sacrifice."



Making a Difference

Do you find it interesting, as I do, that God has made us different in so many ways? Looking around the church I see that some of us are short, others tall; some us wear glasses, others don't, some of us like sports, some of us like to fish and hunt, others like computers. Some of us like and are good at music while others aren't. God has given us different interests, talents, desires, and gifts. God also gives us different careers. God made us carpenters, business people, doctors, plumbers, teachers, etc. We don't look or sound alike, but as Christians we do have much in common. As God's children, we believe that he has created us and loves us so much that he sent his son to die for each of us. We know that God calls and knows us by name, and we are united in our faith.

As God's people, we also have a common task as Ephesians 4:12 states, "that the body of Christ may be built up." God in his infinite wisdom allows us to choose how to serve him best. As we contemplate how best we can serve the Lord, it is good to remember that God will empower us so we can faithfully use our God-given talents for his kingdom. God didn't make us and give us so much without giving us, as well, the ability to make a difference in our church, community, and the world. God will always equip us for the tasks he gives us to do. Think of the account of the tongue-tied Moses whom God equipped to be the leader of a vast nation. Study the life of David, an obscure shepherd boy, whom God prepared to be king. Marvel at God's patience with Gideon who asked for test after test before he was confident enough to undertake the task God entrusted him. We might find new situations and challenges to be a bit risky or uncomfortable, but just as God was with Moses, David, and Gideon, he will be with us all the way. With God's help, we will find ways our time and talents can make a difference.

Ephesians 4:16 reads, "From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work." It is important and essential that we do our parts to support the body of Christ. We could easily compare this to a basketball team, which requires the contribution of each player. The guards need to bring the ball down the court, run the offense, make the correct passes and contribute in scoring. The forwards need to rebound and score, along with the center. All of the positions have to contribute on defense. Each team members plays a unique role and is valuable to the team. If one of them fails to contribute, the whole team suffers. We each have a part to contribute on God's team. We can be effective in reaching the unchurched and building up the churched when we all contribute. God gives us talents and gifts so we can use them to his glory in his church. When we let God work through us, we can make a difference.

A Time for Thanksgiving

In Psalm 100:4 the psalmist gives thanks and praise to God. It's Thanksgiving! But how can you keep the focus of the festival on giving thanks? Here are some ways to involve the entire family in getting ready for the feast while counting their blessings.

Making place cards is a way to involve even preschoolers in getting ready for Thanksgiving. Fold in half index cards. (They come in some festive colors). Apply a sticker or two for more color. Older children can write a short message of thanks on each person's card. Messages might say: "Thanks for being Matt's friend" or "You're the greatest, Grandma!" Save some stickers to decorate paper napkins.

Stage a family puppet play. Supply paper bags or old socks, glue, markers, and yarn or fabric scraps to make simple hand puppets. For script ideas, have the puppets tell for whom and what they want to give thanks. If you have access to a video camera, film the puppet play for viewing after the meal. A great way to share Thanksgiving's blessings would be to send a copy of the video to shut-ins or to relatives who live far away.

Say "thank you, God, for the birds" by providing a thanksgiving feast for the birds. String popped corn on thread, or spread peanut butter on a pine cone or spoon it into individual egg carton cups. Sprinkle bird seed over the peanut butter. Attach a yarn loop to each treat and hang them from trees.

Ask each person to show one object and tell how that object reminds them of a gift, skill, or talent for which that person is thankful. Suggested objects include: a pen, baseball, ice skate, sheet music, and so forth. Group these items in the center of the table as a "Thankful Cornucopia" table decoration. (If you are unable to collect objects, ask each person to draw or write something for which they are thankful

on a small piece of writing paper. Discuss what each person identifies.)

Ask each family member to hold up the object or picture they added to the "Thankful Cornucopia" described above. Together, thank God for the blessing that object symbolizes.

Last month we said goodbye to Dr. Andrew Mwanjonde (see below), a gifted Tanzanian doctor who we trained, supported and sent off for further training in pediatrics. Andrew worked with us for nearly 4 years as both intern and then in our department as a medical officer (registrar). He now leaves to begin a formal 3-year pediatric residency program at the University of Nairobi, while his wife and two small children remain behind in Tanzania.

He is hardworking, thoughtful, committed to kids, and eager to learn. He will make an incredible pediatrician for this country. We will miss Andrew, his teamwork, and his care of children in our hospital. And we long to see him return back, knowing he has so much to offer children in Tanzania.





NEONATOLOGY CONFERENCE 2022



This October, we will be leading likely the largest Neonatology training conference ever held in East Africa.

We have nearly 250 doctors and nurses registered for this conference, arriving from 9 countries and 70+ hospitals. A team of 30 neonatologists, pediatricians, and NICU nurses will be arriving from across Tanzania and USA/Canada to help our ALMC team conduct this conference.

This is the 2nd year we are hosting *Tiny Feet, Big Steps-- Advancing Care of Critically Ill and Premature Babies in East Africa*. This year, it is considerably bigger and longer than last year. It is an example of **coming**: Tanzania, Malawi, Rwanda, Burundi, Uganda, Malawi, Somaliland, and Ethiopia. All to learn about caring for hospitalized newborns.

Lastly, In August, we published an article in Frontiers in Pediatrics, Research Topic on Neonatal Health in Low- and Middle- Income Countries (<u>https://doi.org/10.3389/fped.2022.958628</u>).

It is our unique story, and how we achieved a 92% survival rate for the sickest and smallest of babies,

through adopting a decidedly low-tech approach that emphasizes nursing and physician culture.

As many of you know, this has been an exceptionally difficult year, with so many losses, departures, a rapidly changing hospital and uncertain future. We are grateful for your ongoing support and celebrate the leaving and coming: a talented doctor who begins his pediatric residency in Nairobi, and a conference that will attract learners and teachers from across the continent.



We embrace the leaving and coming, and the blessing of goodbyes and hellos.

Atukuzwe - born 14 weeks premature 26 weeks gestation, weighing only 790 grams (1.7 lbs). In 2016, when she was born we were just learning about the importance of prolonged skin-to-skin (kangaroo care), as a means to help premature babies grow faster. Each day, Atukuzwe spent hours nestled directly against her mother, while connected to her breathing support.



A CHANCE AT SURVIVAL

Led by American pediatricians Dr. Stephen Swanson and Dr. Derrick Matthews, the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) at Arusha Lutheran Medical Centre sends home over 340 premature and critically ill babies every year, many of whom would not have survived otherwise.

With a full range of advanced newborn support and one nurse per 2-4 babies, the NICU is able to achieve a survival rate of >92%, with 90% of preterm babies surviving. Babies born <1500 grams (3 lbs-4 oz) survive through the basics of low-tech respiratory support (bubble CPAP), pulmonary surfactant administration, thermoregulation and proper nutrition. This outcome represents among the highest level of care available in Tanzania, with outcomes rarely seen in East Africa.

Most of this NICU care is provided for free or heavily subsidized rates. No baby is every turned away because of family finances. Arusha Lutheran Medical Centre's NICU annual budget is less than the cost of treating a single baby in an American NICU for three weeks.

At a cost to donors of \$75 per neonate per day, each donation can help the team grow their impact, and give more mothers the joy of taking home a healthy baby.

This year, we will have an **EXCITING PIECE OF HISTORY** on display in the Muhlenberg Center. It is an Antique Quilt on loan from the Historical Society of Montgomery County and according to information posted on the Society's Facebook page, it once belonged to Paul Luther Yount. He was a pastor at Trinity Lutheran Church on DeKalb St. in Norristown in the early 1800s. He was also affiliated with Augustus Lutheran Church in Trappe.



The quilt is signed by many people, with some people signing "Trappe 1842" underneath their name. These types of signature quilts were popular in the 19th century. They were often made for fundraisers or gifts for people who were moving out of the area. It is believed that this quilt was made by locals living in Trappe and who may have been members of Augustus Lutheran Church. This occasion will be a wonderful opportunity to see a piece of Augustus history up close! Please plan to attend.

Also on this day quilts and afghans will be on display that were handcrafted by Augustus' Women of the ELCA Hearts & Hands Committee. The quilts will be given to Lutheran World Relief for distribution to the less fortunate in countries all over the world. The full-sized afghans will be taken to Laurel House, a shelter for abused women and children, in Norristown, and the baby afghans will be taken to the Genesis Pregnancy Care Center in Pottstown. The prayer blankets will be given to either Doylestown Hospital for end of life patients, or to Holy Redeemer Hospital for mothers who lost their babies. Producing Lutheran World Relief Mission Quilts, afghans for Laurel House & Genesis Pregnancy Care Center, and prayer blankets for Doylestown and Holy Redeemer Hospitals is a tangible way to express love to our neighbors in need. Quilts can be used as warm bedding, simple tents or floor coverings while the afghans provide a level of personal comfort and care. Each one reflects God's loving presence in a world with suffering. Many thanks to everyone who have contributed to this ministry over the past year. If you would like to get involved and be connected to this global Christian family, you are always welcome to join the quilters, knitters, and crocheters of Augustus. The Hearts and Hands Quilting Group meets the first Wednesday and the third Tuesday of each month in room 24 from 9:30 AM to 11:30 AM, and the Hearts and Hands Knitting/Crocheting Group meets the second and fourth Monday nights of each month in room 20 from 7:00 PM to 9:00PM. If you prefer to support the Quilting group in the comfort of your own home, we now have quilting packs, each containing 48 squares, available in the Muhlenberg Center: Pick a pack out of the basket on the table, sew the squares into a quilt top, and return the pack to the bin under the table. Each quilt top will then be used to make a quilt for Lutheran World Relief. Each pack has instructions and a contact email address for questions. If you wish to help the Knitting/Crocheting group from the comfort of your own home, 7" x 9" blocks can be either crocheted or knitted and placed in the designated basket in the Muhlenberg Center. They are also collecting full-sized afghans 49" x 56", baby afghans 36" x 36" or 36" x 45" in pastel colors, and prayer blankets 2'-3' wide by 3'-4' long in any color or 60" x 50" in pastel colors.
