## **Barn Update**With Lars Kneller

y life has not slowed down since I retired, but I do see some relief coming mid-October. Much has happened since the last update. We made a trip to North Carolina to meet our new granddaughter. It just so happened the GAA summer auction was going on at the same time, so my son-in-law and I attended two days of it. There did seem to be a lot of bargains, but I made Jaunda happy and came home empty-handed. We also went to Los Angeles in early September to see our two western grandchildren. I went to look at a 1966 Dodge Charger that had piqued my interest while I was there. A cooler head prevailed, as I really don't need any more cars at this point. I also visited fellow CLC member Rob Leonard and met his

12 cars. Quite a feat living in an LA neighborhood! I had planned to visit Alan Clark, but he came down with COVID, so that will be a future visit. My transportation while there was my son-in-law's 2005 BMW M5, which is fun to drive, especially with its stick shift, when LA traffic is light. It was interesting to compare and contrast with my 2005 CTS-V. Our new showroom display at the museum is V cars, including mine, a 2006 XLR-V, a 2019 CT6-V Blackwing, and a 2024 Escalade V. The latter has a great exhaust note! Hopefully, everyone will attend the Fall Festival to see and hear the new display, which will be on display until spring.

The 1977 Eldorado is home, and the exhaust has been replaced. I took it to the

Blueberry Festival in Plymouth over Labor Day weekend, and it had an issue with occasional stalling when coming to a stop or turning a corner at slow speed. I have adjusted the throttle position sensor, and at least during my short test drive, I encountered no issues. I have replaced the voltage regulator with an electronic one in the 1963 Lincoln. All three of my analog ones were bad. We are charging again! The ignition switch has been cantankerous ever since I restored the car, and it was getting worse. I removed the key cylinder and took it to my local locksmith, and he fixed it. Now all my keys work effortlessly. I also fixed the cruise control. It turns out the culprit was the brake switch. It wasn't quite turning off, keeping it from engaging. A





little pull back on the pedal, along with switch adjustment, and I'm good to go. The upper hinge for the driver's door has worn bushings, causing the door to sag a little when opening. I removed the same hinge from the parts sedan, and it is now sandblasted, painted, and ready for installation. I need to borrow one of those gadgets that attaches to the floor jack and holds the door in place from Dick the body man to do the transplant. Speaking of Dick, I have returned the completed dashboard for the 1970 Coronet to him. Next on the list is reassembling the seats. He thinks he has seat covers that he purchased in the past, but so far, he cannot find them.

I have had issues obtaining parts for my 1966 Toronado, and they are expensive when found. There are several things I need, and I noticed a plethora of beater

cars on Facebook Marketplace. So I decided to look for an entire car with the parts I need. I found a rusty but running and drivable, well-optioned one in Chicago. (ABOVE) It was originally a Wisconsin car, and fellow CLC member Glenn Brown informed me of the difference between a Wisconsin car and a Chicago car. They will both be rusty, but the Wisconsin car will have straight bumpers. Now I will be on a mission to have working wipers, cruise control, and a power antenna. Also, I'll look forward to an official Oldsmobile vanity mirror and improved power steering.



my truck, and then had to stop due to a lack of more room. We'll need a future trip to finish the job. His generosity will definitely benefit the museum.

Progress continues on the 1955 Thunderbird. Many parts have been added to the engine, and it is just about complete. (PRE-VIOUS PAGE) The body will be going back to Dick's in the next couple of weeks for final bodywork and then paint. I should have the body back on the frame by spring, but there will still be a lot of work ahead with the interior and reassembling everything. Eventually, I will have to take the hardtop to him for new paint as well.


