From your Town Supervisor

Greetings Wilmington Citizens, here is the news out of the Supervisor's office :

Beach Update

I want to thank our town employees for all their hard work in getting the beach finished for our opening. I think you will agree the beach looks great and next year we hope to replace the Fire Pits and to construct a new handicapped fishing deck. The improvements were paid for from a \$200,000 grant from the Department of State, and several large donations, with our Town employees contributing the in-kind fifty-percent match.

Mark your calendars

The Festival of the Colors will be held on Saturday September 8, at the tee ball field on Springfield Road. Many new activities will be added for this year. The town is happy to partner with the Whiteface Region Visitors' Bureau to make this a great yearly event with FREE children activities.

Roads/Flooding

Lenny Preston Road will be receiving a total overhaul with funds from FEMA as a result of the storms last year. This \$95,000 project is underway and will include new stormwater controls and the resurfacing of the damaged roadbed.

Youth Center

We welcome our new Youth Director, Kate Sears. She is doing a fantastic job with the kids and we welcome her and her new ideas. The Youth Center hours are T-W-T 4-7, F-4-9, and Saturday 12-8, closed Sunday and Monday. If you have bottle returns that you wish to donate to the Youth Center, you can leave them at the Transfer Station or the front steps of the Center. All funds go to youth activities.

Stone Bridge

The very slow process of the replacement of the Route 86 stone bridge in the heart of our community has begun with preliminary survey work. It is still slated for replacement in 2014. There will be public meetings as it gets closer. When the Town has more information we will pass it on to you.

Town Dam

The repairs have been made to the top of the dam and the new flash boards have been installed. The town plans to install a retaining wall to stop erosion on the gate side of the dam this fall. We are still searching for funds to repair the wall on the library side and to install another gate so we can consistently regulate the water level. This step would be the first towards the possible cleaning out of the river of the silt build-up. I have also investigated the possibility of hydro-electricity, and so far I am being told that wholesale prices are too low right now for the project to pay for itself.

Supervisor's Report (cont'd)

Trails Update

As we speak crews are cutting the new snowmobile trail from the Cooper Kiln Trail to the Forestdale Road. When completed this will tie the Wilmington trail system into the outside world, and will be an economic boom for the Town, making this a snowmobile destination. However, this trail is not going to be an easy endeavor as there are several bridges that have to be installed and the remoteness is a challenge. The forester in charge of the project, Rob Daley, is hopeful that it will be open this fall. Now, will we get any snow?

Paddling Program

Well, the much-talked-about Paddling Program started and has been a success! This is a joint venture between the AuSable River Association and the town with canoe and kayak rentals at the beach. There is actually a tour laid out showing different plant life and paddlers can stop and visit the Adirondack Wildlife Refuge and Rehab Center, a truly magical place to see many species of wildlife. This program was funded by donations and a NYS Local Waterfront Grant. The employee is funded through a Essex County Youth Grant, and 50% of all proceeds go to the River Association. Now the town, along with North Pole Campsite, offers this great experience of discovering the AuSable River and Wilmington.

Wilmington/Whiteface

100 Mountain Bike Race

The town hosted our second W/W 100 Mountain Bike Race on Sunday, June 17th. This very prestigious race was a success with 368 people entering the race to qualify for the Leadville 100, the most prestigious mountain bike race in the world. Wilmington is one of only five locations nationwide, and the only location on the East Coast, to hold this qualifying event. The racers travel into Keene, Jay, Lewis and Elizabethtown and back. This course has been dubbed the Leadville of the East, as it is an extremely challenging route.

We have been notified that the organizers wish to renew the contract for another two years, and also add a 50K Course as this event is expected to continue to grow. This event is possible with cooperation of the ORDA Events Department, Whiteface, Centerplate, ROOST, and the Whiteface Mountain Visitors Bureau making the Bikefest weekend a national event. I will point out that roadways will be used to access dirt roads and mountain bike trails, minimizing the impact on the people who live and work here. All roads will remain open to local traffic, as this is a

mountain bike race, not a road race. The Bikefest Committee is looking for volunteers to help organize and run the Saturday afternoon/evening events. If interested please contact the Visitor's Bureau. We thank everyone for their cooperation.



It's a little early, but don't forget to mark your calendar for the Wilmington Christmas Celebration, to be held Sunday November 25th!

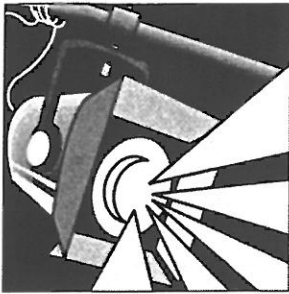

Spotlight on Town Government

I often receive questions or comments in regard to various departments in town and who is in charge of what. I will try to explain how your town government is structured.

The Town Supervisor is an elected position and is responsible for the day-to-day operation of the town. The Water Department, Parks Department, Youth Center, Cemetery Custodian, and the Code Enforcement Officer all report directly to the Town Supervisor and the Town Board.

The Town Clerk is an elected position and reports to no one other than the people. He sets his own schedule of times to be open for business. The Town Supervisor does not oversee this position.

Town Assessors are elected officials and report to no one other than the people. The Town Supervisor does not oversee this position.

Town Justices are elected officials and report to no one other than the people. The Town Supervisor does not oversee this position.

The Town Planning and Zoning Boards are appointed by the Town Board, normally a 5-year term for each member.

The Town Highway Superintendent is an elected position and reports to no one other than the people. He has total control of the Highway Department. He hires employees, and does not fall under the Town Supervisor or Board. The Town Board does, however, control the Highway budget.

The Highway Superintendent is responsible for all town roads, which are easily confused with State and County Roads. NYS Route 86, including the bridges, is a state road for the entire length through Wilmington, along with Whiteface Mountain Highway. The State of New York is in charge of all repairs and maintenance. The Town of Wilmington is paid under contract to plow and salt Whiteface Mountain Highway and Route 86 from the Whiteface Highway to its end in Jay. The town clears the sidewalks along 86.

Haselton Road, Springfield Road, Fox Farm and Bonnieview Roads are County Roads. The Town of Wilmington is paid to plow and sand these roads under contract. The Town only performs maintenance when directed by the Essex County Highway Superintendent.

Quaker, Hardy, Bill Huber, John Bliss, Mountain View, Lenny Preston, Perkins, Deep Woods, Manning, Fox Hollow, Outlook Lane, Park, AuSable Run, and Mulvey Road are all Town Roads and 100% maintained by the Town Highway Department.

DOG CONTROL NEWS -- Shirley Lawrence, Dog Control Officer

There has recently been a confirmed case of rabies in a raccoon in Wilmington. All pet owners are reminded that their pets should be up to date with their rabies vaccines. Anyone seeing a wild animal that is not acting natural should contact DEC with their concerns.

Also a reminder: all dogs over four months old need to be licensed. Licensing may be done at the Town Clerk's Office at the Community Center.

Wilmington E.M. Cooper Library Team Wins Competition

On Saturday, June 30th, eight local children from the AuSable Forks, Jay and Wilmington area represented the Wilmington Library and took part in the "Take a Bite out of Books" competition at the mall in Plattsburgh. 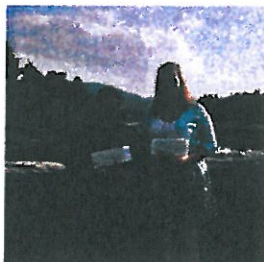

Our office building plays host to area clergy who meet on the second Tuesday of each month to share

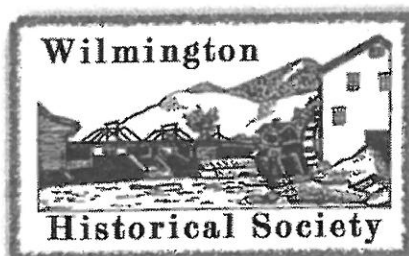
ideas and news. This group is open to suggestions that anyone might have for ecumenical projects.

Festival of Colors

Come to our slide show
 "Wilmington History in Postcards,"
 at the Wilmington Historical

The slide show will run for about twenty minutes, beginning every half hour throughout the day starting at 10:00 am. Come to see Wilmington postcards dating from about 1900 to the present. The historical postcards include photos of Whiteface Mountain, Whiteface Mountain Highway and its construction, and Whiteface skiing from the early trails on the Marble Mountain side to the current ski trails and 1980 Winter Olympics skiing. Wilmington Notch, the AuSable River and High Falls Gorge provide other views of change throughout the 20th century. Santa's Workshop postcards provide yet another arena for rich local history. Early tourism postcards of Wilmington area hotels and cottages offer still more insight into the changes which occurred as tourism and recreation became the cornerstone of our local economy. Discover the rich history of our area—in postcards!

A New Wilmington Photo Book—can you help?

The Wilmington Historical Society has been awarded a contract with Arcadia Publishing in their series, Images of America. We will be creating a photo book entitled Wilmington and the Whiteface Region to be published in 2013. The WHS already has many photos, but we can always use more and we are lean in a few areas. The proposed chapters of the book are: (1) Early Industry & Agriculture (sawmills, forges, other industry, farming), (2) Whiteface Mountain (general history, including science), (3) Whiteface Mountain Veteran's Memorial Highway (history & construction), (4) Whiteface Mountain Ski Center (up to and including the 1980 Winter Olympics), (5) Wilmington Notch, High Falls Gorge, and The Flume, (6) Hotels, Motels, and Tourist Cottages, (7) Santa's Workshop, (8) West Branch AuSable River (bridges, dam, Lake Everest, world class fly-fishing), (9) Wilmington Community (buildings—i.e., post office, churches, town hall), (10) Wilmington People (leaders, entrepreneurs, individuals who made their mark). TRIVIA ANSWERS

1. Wendell Lansing, then former editor of the Essex County Republican. He lived on the Jonathan Thayer place on what is now Springfield Road. In a recorded interview, Marjorie Lansing Porter remarked: "Well, I remember that uh my father's aunt --- Aunt Emma Lansing, her name was--- and she was an old, old lady when I was a little girl, but she had lived here in Wilmington as a little girl and she remembered that at night there would be negroes around their place, here at Wilmington, and in the morning they'd be gone, and she couldn't understand. Then she found out later when she grew up that her da---her father---bid them in the charcoal cart..." (Kilburn, Abram, Interview, 19 Sep. 1952, Marjorie Lansing Porter Folklore Collection, MLP 101-1A, Special Collections, SUNY Plattsburgh).

2. At "Singing Pines" located on Springfield Road on the outskirts of Wilmington, in a sort of chicken coop arrangement given to him by a lifelong friend in 1963. There he still lived much as he did in the wilderness, but nearer to civilization, tending his gardens
