Last month I attended the annual Fall Staff Meeting for the Department of Michigan of the Marine Corps League at the behest of our detachment commandant. The meeting was conducted via the Zoom application, just like some of our past detachment meetings, which proved to be an effective way to get many department members to attend. Here are some noteworthy points of interest for our detachment members:

- Future meetings are being planned and scheduled.
 - Mid-winter Rally will likely be in Mt. Pleasant.
 - Central Division Conference will be located in Kentucky in March.
 - The Summer Convention for the department will be in Lansing in June.
 - The next National Convention will be held in Indiana.
- The scholarship process needs to be followed through fully.



HISTORIAN'S CORNER

DESPITE THE CONTROVERSY, OUR CORPS ENDURES

Over the decades, the Marine Corps has had to endure threats to its existence, not just from enemies abroad, but within the United States.

Notable Attempts and Ideas

19th-century proposals: Between 1829 and the start of World War II, at least five more attempts were made to eliminate or marginalize the Corps.

1894 Bill: In 1894, a bill was introduced in Congress that would have eventually dissolved the Marine Corps and absorbed its functions into the Army, though it received little attention from the press at the time.

Later Proposals: Discussions about disbanding the Marine Corps have continued, with arguments made about potential benefits in military streamlining and budget efficiency, even as public sentiment supported the Corps' continued existence.

President Truman had a notoriously complex and shifting opinion of the Marine Corps, publicly criticizing the institution while ultimately acknowledging its value and relying on it during a time of war. His animosity stemmed from interservice rivalries and the post-World War II push for military unification, but intense public and congressional backlash forced him to apologize and acknowledge the Corps' importance.

The 1950 "Police Force" controversy

In August 1950, shortly after the outbreak of the Korean War, Truman sparked a firestorm of controversy with a letter to Congressman Gordon L. McDonough. In his letter, Truman referred to the Marine Corps as "the Navy's police force" and stated that "they have a propaganda machine that is almost equal to Stalin's".

While serving as Army Chief of Staff and later as president, Dwight D. Eisenhower was openly hostile toward the Marine Corps, frequently attempting to diminish its size and role. He felt the country could not afford two land armies and worried the Marines were duplicating the Army's mission. He even wrote in private letters that he wanted to abolish the Marine Corps altogether but feared public backlash.

Eisenhower's pre-presidential efforts to limit the Marine Corps

During the post-World War II period, a push for military unification led to a significant interservice rivalry. As Army Chief of Staff, Eisenhower led a campaign to restrict the Marine Corps' mission and size.

- Limiting missions: Eisenhower sought to relegate the Marines to minor naval raids and security details, arguing that the Army had demonstrated its capability for large-scale amphibious assaults during the war.
- Consolidating aviation: He proposed merging Marine aviation into naval aviation or transferring it to the Air Force.
- Cutting personnel: Eisenhower suggested severely limiting the size of the Marine Corps

to between 50,000 and 60,000 men, a fraction of its wartime strength, with no expansion in case of war. This would have also effectively eliminated the Marine Corps Reserve.

Post-WWII Disbandment Efforts

Truman Administration: After World War II,
 President Truman and his Secretary of
 Defense, Louis Johnson, seriously considered
 disbanding the Marine Corps, viewing its
 amphibious role as obsolete and advocating for
 a more streamlined, bomber-focused Air
 Force-centric military structure.

National Security Act of

1947: The Eisenhower-Spaatz proposal, outlined in JC 1478 papers, aimed to reduce the Marine Corps to smaller units, limit its wartime expansion, and confine its missions to guarding naval ships and minor shore operations. This proposal was influential in the discussions around National Security 1947, although it did not result in the Marine Corps' elimination.

Why the Marine Corps Endures

- Public Support: Despite arguments for its disbandment, the American people have consistently supported the Marine Corps, leading to the preservation of the service.
- Distinctive Role: The Marine Corps' unique role as a combined air-ground force with specialized amphibious capabilities continues to be valued.
