

- 1 This 3-time All-Star and winner of 5 Gold Gloves was a graduate of New Hartford High School.
- 4 In 1854, Clark Mills was the first home of this sport played by a group of Scots and Englishmen.
- 5 This team won the NewYork-Penn League championship in 1983, and later was affiliated with the Phillies, White Sox and Red Sox.
- 8 The House of Good Shepherd property on Genesee St. became this indoor sport spot.
- 12 The Roscoe Conkling Park and the Parkway system in Utica were designed by this famous landscape architect.
- 14 In 1869, a craze created general havoc that led Utica's city fathers to consider banning this cycle from city streets.
- 15 This New York Yankee thrilled the crowd at Utica's K-C Park with a 500-foot home run.
- 16 The Saturday Globe 1895, wrote of this suitable form of clothing for women wishing to bicycle.
- 18 This area was once referred to as the Coney Island of central New York.
- 19 There was a shortage of these workers in 1944, that threatened to shut down bowling alleys.

- 2 National Hall of Fame established in Utica in 1998 honors this sport.
- 3 A Utica outdoor recreational area was named after this Olympic athlete.
- 6 Utica's 15K road race established in 1978.
- 7 This recreational area is on the site of the old Baggs Hotel farm.
- 9 Uticans P.E. Cassidy, confectioner and Gordon Hackett, caterer, both touted one of these that revolutionized drug stores and other businesses.
- 10 On October 19, 2018, this team sold out their 121st consecutive regular season game, establishing a new AHL record.
- 11 Doc Newhall, director of the YMCA, introduced this game to Utica in 1896, and formed the Iroquois League.
- 13 This Proctor High School grad, professional Major League Baseball player and All-Star, batted .300 or better with over 200 hits in both 1974 and 1975.
- 17 This park in Oriskany had an amphitheater, quarter-mile race track, restaurants and a merry-go-round.
