During January we transition from reading the book of *Bereshit* (Genesis) into the book of *Shemot* (Exodus). Religious Symbols

During the months of January (Tevet - Shevat) and February (Shevat - Adar) 5783 there are no Jewish holidays. I will discuss instead three important symbols of our religion; the tallis (prayer shaul), the Tephillin (two black cubes), and the Mezuzah).

<u>Mezuzah (Oblong Case)</u> Do to its practicality the Mezuzah is observed every day by most Jews. So I will discuss it here first with its relationship to both the Tallis and Tephillin. You see all three are taken from the Torah. As a matter of fact it is taken from the same Torah paragraph as the Tephillin. The last sentence of that paragraph reads; "and you write them upon the doorposts of your house and upon your gates".

<u>Laws of the Torah</u> An enumeration of these words of G-d contains seven elements as follows:

- 1. The belief that there is only one G-d.
- 2. To love G-d with all our heart, and might.
- 3. That these words of G-d be upon our heart.
- 4. That we teach these words to our children.
- 5. That we discuss and speak of these words in our homes, when we are traveling, when we are awake and when we go to bed.
- 6. That we put these words upon our arms and between our eyes.
- 7. That we write these words upon our doorposts and gates

A sofeir "scribe" writes this paragraph, which contains all these laws, on a piece of parchment. He uses the Torah script which is a bit different from the regular Hebrew script. This piece of parchment is rolled up and put in an oblong case. The case is then attached to the doorpost. This fulfills the commandment properly.

Laws of the "Mezuzah"

- 1. It is a commandment to put the "Mezuzah" upon every doorpost of every room except the bathroom. If a room has many doors, each door must have a "Mezuzah"
- 2. If a court, a Jewish city or providence is surrounded by a gate, the gate must have a "Mezuzah".
- 3. The "Mezuzah" is put upon the right side of the entrance on the upper third of the doorpost. When the fixing is completed we recite a special blessing honoring the name of G-d (see sider) who commanded us to do so. The "Mezuzah" should be put closer to the outside of the doorpost and slanted with its top pointing inward.
- 4. Upon moving from our homes, when another Jew moves in do not remove the "Mezuzah". You may leave it as a gift or ask the new tenant to buy it.
- 5. It is a custom to touch the "Mezuzah" and then kiss the hand, when we enter or leave a Jewish house. In this way we are reminded of G-d and remember to follow His ways. Jewish people who follow the "Laws of Mezuzah" properly and with a perfect heart will rarely sin.

The reminder of "Mezuzah" shows them the right way of life. It would certainly be a wonderful world if all people were to follow them. They would be blesses with everlasting "Peace".
