Fenestration is a mix of 6/6 windows in the gable and unequal-sash windows in the bay and flanking the door. The hipped front prch is set upon turned columns and sawn balustrades; the entrance is focused under a small gable.				
43. History and Significance The house was built by Henry Trieschman for his son, Henry, Jr., on the event of his wedding. The elder Mr. Trieschman had founded the Trieschman Meat Market (ERI-1563) in 1868, and son, Henry, born on the island in 1872, had grown up in the business. home. The father's house had been built near his meat market and the business district. The son's home was built near the fields where their beef cattle grazed and their slaughter house stood.

These cattle were brought over, 50 head at a time, on the Chippewa or Arrow, and driven up Division St. and over Chapel St. to their pastures on the north side of Woodford. Nearby, too, was the former Monaghan house (ERI-1758, now moved to Harbor Ln.) which the Trieschmans bought to house their slaughter house employees. After the death of his father, Henry, Jr. took over full management of the business, and, in turn, his son and daughter Wesley and Elda, carried on the shop. However, with the improvement of refrigeration it was no longer necessary for the butcher to have an inventory of live stock to provide fresh meat, and the slaughter house was abandoned.
