P: Target radar hums.

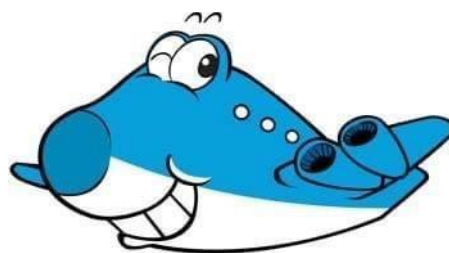
S: Reprogrammed target radar with lyrics.

- Fly /Burger night is scheduled for Thursday August 15th. We usually start flying around 3pm and quit about 6 or 6:30. Then we head to Chuck's on Cass and have some beers and burgers (they have a complete menu). Lots of fun at our June Fly/Burger night.
- John Baderman has lost a pair of blue sunglasses. If found, please contact him.
- Stan Warden mentioned flying at the Green Valley Hill Slope Soaring in Naperville. They are now open on the weekends from 1 hour after sunrise to sunset. Perhaps we can do a group outing. You must have a valid Dupage County Forest permit if you are flying. If not flying it's still a great experience with a terrific view. No gas or glow.

Flying Control Line at the NATS

****Editor's note:** Mark Romanowitz is our Control Line flight instructor. This is a letter he sent while participating at the AMA NATS Control Line Championship in Muncie, Indiana.

Hi Ed,

Well, I'm at the NATS. Tomorrow is day one for qualifying. Three attempts for two flights, best flight of the day counts, and two more flights tomorrow. It's been good to renew old friendships and start new ones. Today there were three "unofficial events". Old time stunt (planes and stunt pattern from the 1940s and early 50s), Classic (1959 to 1969) and Nostalgia (1970s to 1994). About 45 flyers total. I was one of the judges for Classic. The weather has been hot and very humid and the wind kicked up today resulting in four crashed planes, which hurt to see/hear.

Regarding the standard official classes, beginner and intermediate, flew Sunday and were well represented. Advanced (that's the class I'm in), and Open Class start tomorrow. My well enjoyed and hangar rash afflicted Sirius garnered 13 appearance points, which I was pleased with all things considered.

My friends and mentors Bob Hunt's and Kenny Stevens's planes were awarded 18 and 19 points respectively. The weather tomorrow is going to be even hotter with "real feel" estimates over 101 degrees. Then the storms are supposed to start and leave us cooler but with higher winds on Wednesday. I'm not going to risk my plane since I'm not going to win this thing and I want to drive home with an intact airplane. Tell the folks in the club I said hello, and I hope to get some RC flying in before August becomes September.
