

How to Fix a Fence that Mother Nature Knocked Down

- 1. Evaluate the broken fence. (Do you need to fix more than one post? Do you see any broken fence slates or other damage?)
- 2. Go to your nearest Home Depot and buy the needed supplies.
- 3. Make sure you wear yard working clothes. (Plan to get dirty.)
- 4. Make room to dig up the old post by clearing an obstacles.
- 5. Use a shovel to round the concrete holding the old post. (Make sure the hole is not too big.)
- 6. As you dig down, use a hammer and crow bar to break apart the old concrete and then remove the concrete.
- 7. Once the post can be moved easily in each direction attempt to pull the old post out. (If it does not move inside the hole easily then you may have to dig more and break off more concrete holding it down.)
- 8. Place the new post in the ground and pour the concrete mix and water in the whole a little at a time mixing them together.
- 9. Make sure you are leveling the post to ensure it remains straight.
- 10. Once the concrete is dry, nail the fence panel/s to the post.
- 11. Repair any broken slates.
- 12. Sit back and enjoy your fixed fence!!!

What you need to buy

- 3 bags of fast-setting concrete mix
- ■3 fence slats 5/8" x 3 ½" x 6' (or 8' depending on the height of your fence)
- ■1 lb. box 5d 1-3/4" (4.45 cm) fence nails
- ■1 lb. box 12d 3-1/4" (8.26 cm) exterior galvanized common nails
- 1 8' landscape timber (or 10' timber if you fence is 8' tall)



Total Cost of the supplies you will need to buy

\$15.60 3 Bags of Concrete \$3.56 3 Slats \$3.94 1 box of Fence Nails \$4.24 1 Box of Exterior Galvanized Common Nails \$3.47 8' Timber
