Downstairs in the glass meeting room would be ideal because the reference desk is just outside for the proper supervision.

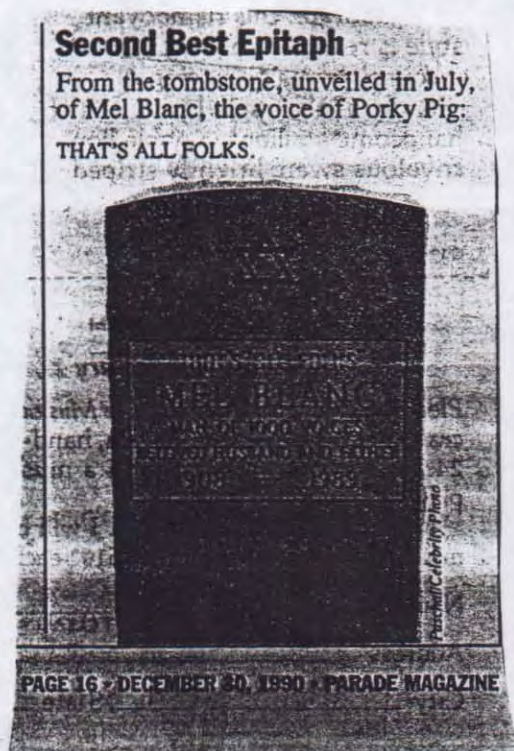
The library would benefit and the society and community would have a permanent genealogical research center for Falmouth.

#### ARTICLES OF INTEREST TO FALMOUTH

Did you know that the Falmouth Inner Harbor was called Deacon's Pond before 1906? Joseph Davis was the Deacon of the Congregational Church in the Falmouth Green and he owned most of the beach front at the harbor. Before him, Abram Bowerman owned that land and it was called Bowerman's Pond.

When construction of the Falmouth Harbor was approved, George Washington Goethals who worked for the Army Corps of Engineers was hired as a consultant. He later gained fame from his work on the Panama Canal.

The Commodore Cottage located on 12 Vernon Avenue was named after E.P. Boggs, Commodore of the Massachusetts Yacht Club. This house was built in the 1880's and Boggs moored his famous steamship, the "Nashewana" nearby. It became the flagship of that club. The house was named after Boggs when he died in 1910. It has a beautiful view of the ocean and Nobska Light.

In 1891, the Falmouth Summer Institute conducted a religious campground at Central Park in Falmouth Heights.

In 1904, Falmouth Heights received town water for the first time. The Falmouth Heights Water Company provided that service before.

In 1909, the Cottage Club was destroyed by fire and was later rebuilt.

The Fitzgerald family of Boston become summer residents of Falmouth Heights. (Look out Cape Cod! Here comes the Kennedy's!)

## ACADIAN'S MARRY WITHOUT A PRIEST!

Yes, this was true! After their banishment from Acadia these poor refugees had no means to marry within their Catholic faith so the church allowed them to unit only if all parties consented and enough witnesses were available.

Case in point:

Ninety-seven Acadians were exiled to Worcester County, Massachusetts in 1755. No priests were allowed to practice in a puritan colony so the church granted permission for a witnessed ceremony to be conducted by those family members.

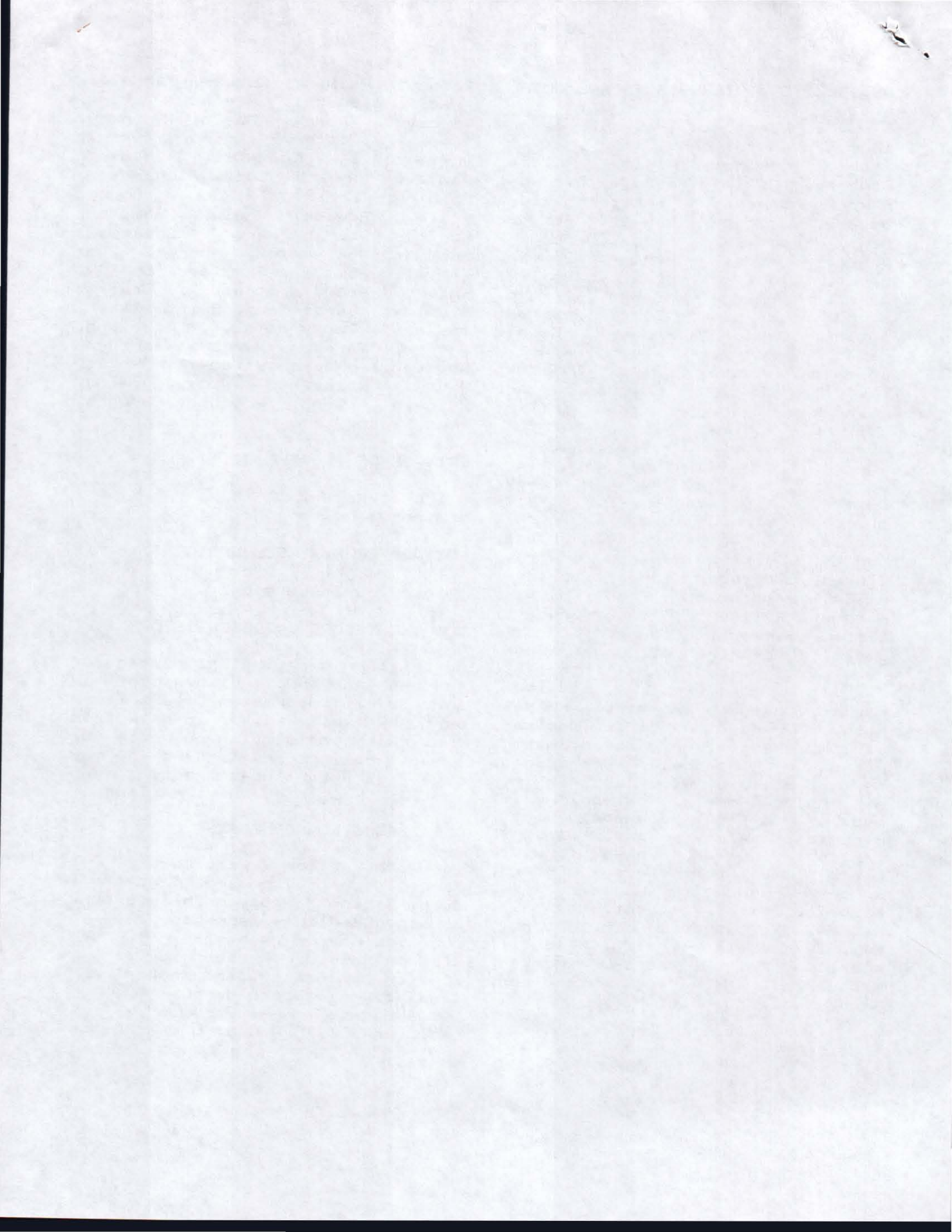

LAST MONTH

It was worth the wait! "Dusting Off The Family Skeletons" the video we all looked forward too did not let us down. It was very informative in many areas as in using personal material! You must get permission to use someones diary, subjects can file suit if your material is too sensitive. Legal or public documents are your safest avenue when concerned with printing genealogies. Caution, but be accurate in your family histories. Once you dig up a skeleton, you could be responsible morally and legally.

Now that I scared the pants off of you, do not be discouraged in this area. There are safe approaches like, having your sensitive relative or subject fill out a questionnaire or furnished that information themselves, in their own words or writing.

Regarding locating distance relations still living in others countries, the purchase of a public telephone directory is one of the best ways to go. An order can be placed through your nearest telephone office.

In regards to adoption records before 1930. These can be gotten, but only by using caution in your wording to the town records clerk. If you say, "adoption records" you will most likely be turned away because of the confidentiality laws protecting them, but these records before 1930 can be accessed legally. Most clerks do not know this.

Hospital records can be a gold mine too. Example the speaker used was: In 1900, Minnesota had 11 mental institutions. The population of the state was only one million. These hospitals had their own cemeteries, in their records they even took pictures of many patients. Contacting a social worker in the public welfare departments or medical institutions will help you gain access to these valuable records. Genetic family history is getting more visibility today and this is one way to get medical histories.

Approximately 28 members attended our meeting and Ted Karlson announced the donation to the Fairmount Library of volume 21 of the New England Historical Genealogical Society Register thanks to all our membership. This worthwhile project will hopefully purchase volumes 18 through 25 which covers 1864 to 1872 completing the library's collection. This will be one of our biggest community support achievements. You should all be congratulated!

Research being performed in the states outside of the New England area are: New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Virginia, Delaware, Ohio, Minnesota, Illinois, North Carolina, Arkansas and Kansas.

The answers given for how many generations of any four related family names indicate that the majority has successfully researched at least one family name for eight (8) generations with a few members reaching 10 and 14 generations. Approximately one third of the members have successfully researched at least one family name for five to seven generations with a few members reporting only two to four generations successfully researched thus far.

These results give the officers of this society a good indication on how they should plan the future activities of the society to best meet the needs and desires of its members.

LAST MONTH

Presented at last months meeting was another fine film by Heritage Quest which is located in Orting, Washington state. Ariene Eakle, Ph.D was again their speaker. Intitiled, "New Immigration Sources".

Over 25 members attended and it was reported that the interest in the film ran high. Dr. Eakle covered the legality of coping with natrualization records at the federal level which is taboo unless you go through the "Freedom of Information Act" process.

It was interesting to find that many Emmigrants filed only a "declaration of intent" to naturalize and never went through the final process. Children did not have to naturalize and a sponsor was usually required before coming to America. These sponsors were usually family members. During the colonial period, settlers were told to take the oath of allegiance to the Crown.

Many other alike areas were talked about including statistics on the German's. Early colonial Germans were Farmers where latter day Germans were city dwellers. Homestead applications are another good source having peaked in 1913 with the most settling in places like the Dakota's.

Early incoming processing locations (before Ellis Island) was Wards Island, Angel Island, San Fransisco, Delaware etc.. Dr. Eakle explains that occupations gave away were many Emmigrants settled in the USA. Over 88,000 laborers came in 1852, most going to the cities and Mill towns of the North East.

The travel conditions were another area of interests as our forefathers came to this country. The Pilgrims on the Mayflower had only their sleeping quarters which was only the size of one double bed for an entire family to sleep, wash, cook etc..

Also covered was where the Dutch settled in the USA, first in New York, than Minnesota, Oregon and Washington state. After the Neopoleanic wars many Irish did not go back to Ireland, instead settling around Liverpool and Manchester, England. Many Swedes went to Worcester and Lowell Massachusetts, than to Canada.

Dr. Eakle says that the Passenger & Immigration List Index collection of over 6 volumes is the best source to look at first, containing over 2 million passengers. A very good piece of info. on our recent German ancestors is that they were required to list their last three generations during Hitler's rein to prove they were pure German stock.

We should congratulate Marge Gibson for finding this very informative film.

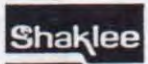

Naturalization records can help you located your German ancestors birthplace. These can be found at the court house where they were naturalized. Don't forget to look for marriage records there too.

There are two major German organizations located in the United States. They are both in California, one in San Diego and the other in Los Angeles.

As stated in the film, German research done by the archives has been reasonable so far. For example:

work done on four generation with 14 documents presented would cost around \$40. Mr. Peters stated that when he had his line traced through the church there, the cost was only \$40 and they furnish his line all the way back to the 1600's.

The Guild Records (Arts & Crafts) go back the farthest for German records. There could be some tax records that take you back pretty far, but the Guild Records are best for pre-1600.

## DID YOU KNOW ?

That Rachel Wall was the only recorded pirate in history to be hanged which occurred in a Massachusetts gallows in 1789. Her crime was for stealing a hat. The exact place in Massachusetts is unknown.

The largest crowd to attend a hanging was for Jason Fairbanks of Dedham, Massachusetts who murdered his sweetheart, Elizabeth Fales who was found stabbed to death on 18 May 1801. On his hanging day, 10 Sept. 1801 over 10,000 people showed up with 711 carriages arriving just from Boston.

Boston's first Irish policeman was Barney McGinniskin who was from County Cork, Ireland. He was appointed to the force by Mayor John Prescott Bigelow in 1851. The Mayor's reason was that he wanted to win the large Irish vote in Boston. McGinniskin served three years before being fired in 1854 (reason unknown) He died in 1868 at the age of sixty-two and is buried at St. Augustines Cemetery in South Boston.

The first police officer of Lynn, Massachusetts was the six foot tall, 225 pound William Waite. He was sworn in on 14 May 1850. He was normally a butcher by trade.

Did you know that Maine was the first state to enact prohibition? It was in 1851, "An act for the Suppression of Drinking Houses and Tippling Shops". This law prohibited manufacture and sales of intoxicating liquors in the entire state.

No matter what the crime, women were spared in most cases when

In 1716, the first female teacher was employed 7 August. Her name was Hannah Sargent. Her position was School Dame and her salary for the first year was twelve pounds and her diet.

Before 1850, one of the oldest industries in Falmouth was a glass works which was located at the end of Shore Street. This plant was very important and cost \$25,000 or more. It had a steam engine and other modern fixtures of its time.

In 1821, The Falmouth Bank was established with nearly \$100,000 and one thousand shares belonging to 83 people.

On 7 Feb. 1664, Isaac Robinson was granted approval to keep an Ordinary (Inn) at Succonesset for the entertainment of strangers. This was considered one of the first, if not the first Inn's for entertainment in Falmouth.

# FAMILY RELATIONSHIPS AND HOW TO DETERMINE THEM

(A) "YOU" are the center and starting point. All relationships shown are directed to "YOU". Always follow the connecting line in moving from one encircled relation to another. Each separate line connecting any two encircled persons indicates that the person at the lower end of the connecting line is the child of the person at the higher end of the same line, whether the line is upright or slanting. Now check (A) with Key.

### EXAMPLES:

1. The connecting line between you and your parents, indicates that you are your parents' child, you being at the lower end of the connecting line.
2. The line connecting your uncles and your grandparents, indicates that your uncles are the children of your grandparents, your uncles being at the lower end of the connecting line.

(B) Move DOWN to locate children, grandchildren, etc., following the connecting lines; to locate any other person, always following the connecting lines, move UP, then OUT and DOWN until the person is located. Check (B) with Key.

### EXAMPLE:

1. To find the relationship of your first cousin's child to you, move UP through your parents, to your grandparents, then OUT through your aunt or uncle to your first cousin, following the connecting line DOWN from your first cousin to your first cousin's child you will find the relationship to be that of a first cousin once removed.
