I organized things on the kitchen shelves, the kitchen pantry and the kitchen drawers. Every time I would finish, I would go back to Doris and say: "Please, give me something else to do, I want to help." Everyone kept complimenting me as I started helping pulling up tiles and then went to go help organize the library but I just wanted to help.

It was just like setting up for the Easter egg hunt. Carol and Rhonda organized school supplies; that was perfect for them. Margaret and Taylor worked in the kitchen (skills Taylor learned from her Mom were used). The lady who was in charge of the kitchen needed Margaret today. She'll tell you about that. Chuck and Dean chipped up tile floor to be replaced. Jenny sorted flip-flops for the clothes room among other things. We came home to a wonder dinner and gifts from our shopping fairy, Joni. (Things we forgot or would be useful donations to the center.)

Carol here. I loved working at the Wade Center. It has such a wonderful vibe there for helping kids and everyone was so friendly there. I wish it was closer to home because I would love to volunteer there on a regular basis. I even called my friend who lives up here and said it is right up her alley and she should check it out to volunteer. I think I might be a little sore tomorrow. I went up and down the stairs A LOT!

This has been the best day! Rain could not dampen our spirits or our energy. The Wade Center offers After School Care and summer programs for children

1st-5th grade, with the hope of extending it to middle and high school.
