"Nests" contained a cluster of eggs and a handful of Easter sugar cookies. Candy, such as we have today, was not available then in Amana. But some families did have a large, paper-mache' hand-painted Easter Bunny which they got out each Easter and set on the parlor table.

Easter eggs were colored using a traditional Swiss method which involved creating a sticky, glue-based gelatin-like color poured into chipped ironstone coffee mugs or little bowls. This dye was made with dye from the woolen mills. Hot, hard boiled eggs were rolled in this coloring and transformed into bright gold, deep green, red, purple and blue Easter eggs. At the end of the process, the bits and pieces of jellied dye were combined in one cup and an esteemed dozen or so of the multi-colored eggs were created.

Each kitchen made their own Easter bunny cookies. Now much has been said about the best of the Easter bunny recipes but let's just state once and for all that the Zuber Kitchen Easter Bunny recipe is the best. It was given to the Middle Amana Zuber kitchen by friends from South Amana and so in truth it originates in South Amana. But there are perhaps half a dozen sugar cookie recipes that have been used for Easter bunnies. At least one of which calls for brown sugar and another calls for butter rather than shortening or a mix of butter and shortening. The stiff dough is cut into sitting bunny shapes, chicks, horses, hens and fish. Raisins were used for chick and bunny eyes. The cookie cutters were all made by the local tinsmiths, so their imagination and creativity had its impact upon the Easter traditions. The long - almost 10-inch long - running rabbit shape was a popular cookie cutter. However, it used up so much dough that only 1 such large cookie was made for each of the nests.

Once the nests were ready they were hidden by the youngest cooks outdoors in the flower beds, the herb beds and new leafed raspberry patches alongside the kitchen house. If the weather was rainy, they hid nests inside the kitchen house and in the woodshed and washhouse.

At the appointed hour, never on Good Friday, but usually on Thursday evening or Saturday after school, the children, with their little baskets in hand, and their mothers went to the kitchen house and upon the word of the Baas hunted for their nests. Each child had his or her own Easter basket made just for them by the village basket weaver. A child received this basket when still a baby or toddler and kept it all through their childhood, if not their entire lives. The little baskets generally could hold a half dozen eggs and a half dozen sugar cookies which was about the standard nest size.

Henry Schiff who was a baker for many years in Amana remembers when he as a young man delivered the bread by wagon to each one of the 16 kitchen houses in Amana. Using a bit of the charm for which he was known, Henry coaxed each one of the kitchen teams to give him a cookie so by the end of the week he had 16 cookies. I once asked him if he shared the cookies with the other bakers and his reply was a hoot and a laugh, "Heck no!"
