Public spending should be public

Editorial

Too often in recent years, Ohio lawmakers and courts have gone in the wrong direction on open records – giving bureaucrats more justifications to hide how they're spending taxpayer money and making it harder for reporters and citizens to fight back.

State Treasurer Josh Mandel's Open Checkbook initiative is a welcome move back in the right direction, and we're urging the state Senate to take action on it before disbanding Thursday.

Mandel campaigned for re-election in part on the idea that the treasurer's office should be required to make state spending easily accessible. He has pushed the General Assembly to pass such a bill, and the House complied earlier this year but then it stalled in the Senate.

The treasurer's office never needed a new law to put spending data online, and following his November win, the Republican debuted OhioCheckbook.com. It's fairly simple to operate and yet full of data. The information is automatically plotted on consumer-friendly charts and able to be downloaded with the click of a button.

One interesting nugget: Sharonville-based paving contractor John R. Jurgensen Co. has been among the state's 10 highest-paid companies for the past five years.

Mandel still wants the bill passed, as he is concerned that future treasurers might opt to make spending information less accessible. There's certainly precedent for elected officials to remove public information from public view. Outgoing Probate Judge James Cissell was on the leading edge of online data access when, as Hamilton County clerk of courts, he created courtclerk.org. His successors, however, made most court documents password-protected, requiring media and other interested parties to apply for access.

The Senate State Government Oversight and Reform Committee held hearings on Mandel's bill, and not a single opponent spoke. On the other hand, civic and public policy groups across the political spectrum – think Common Cause and the Buckeye Institute – have supported it, along with media across the state.

Still, the committee has let the clock run down on this General Assembly's two-year term, which is expected to wrap up Thursday. If the bill doesn't pass out of committee Wednesday and get a floor vote Thursday, Mandel will have to start from scratch in the next General Assembly.

Cincinnati is opening up its checkbook to the Internet

Ohio Treasurer Josh Mandel and Cincinnaticity leaders announced a partnership today at City Hall to put the city's spending online at OhioCheckbook.com in an effort to increase government transparency.

The city of Cincinnati announced a partnership on Wednesday with the Ohio treasurer's office to put its spending online at OhioCheckbook.com.

The website, created last year by Ohio Treasurer Josh Mandel with the purpose of increasing government transparency, shows more than \$408 billion in spending and 112 million transactions during the past seven years. This partnership makes Cincinnati the sixth city in Ohio to display its spending on the site.

Visitors to OhioCheckbook.com can search the database by keyword, department, category or vendor. The city will display its operating budget and checkbook level data on the site. The Cincinnati Retirement System will also display its pension information.

The service is paid for out of the state treasurer's budget and is free to Cincinnati taxpayers.

Before the creation of OhioCheckbook.com, the state was ranked "in the basement" in terms of government transparency, according to Mandel. Forty-sixth in the country, to be exact. After the website's launch, Ohio shot to first in the country.

Mandel said he hopes the partnership with Cincinnati will put "friendly pressure" on other Ohio cities, school districts and pension funds to sign on as well.

"My ultimate vision is to create an army of citizen watchdogs to hold politicians accountable," Mandel said.

While Mandel mentioned his belief in small government when discussing his motivation for investing in government transparency, he named public officials taking lavish trips with taxpayer money as one example of an accountability issue that this system can remedy.

"It's going to make them think twice before they stay at the Ritz Carlton," he said.

Mandel declined to comment on whether Cincinnati has any issues with irresponsible use of taxpayer money by public officials.

Local governments can also use the site to increase efficiency. They can look at what vendors other public entities are using to buy things like bulletproof vests for police officers or printer cartridges, seeing if they have any vendors in common and arranging to make bulk purchases.

Cincinnati city council member Amy Murray encouraged citizens to get involved and utilize the website.

"Hold us accountable," she said. "Look at the online checkbook. Let us know what you think."

Mandel and Cincinnati city manager Harry Black said this move along with the city's growing focus on big data to measure performance places Cincinnati at the forefront of local government transparency.

"I would challenge any other city in the country to match what we've accomplished here," Black said.

In an age of rapidly changing technology, Mandel stressed the need for local governments to keep up with the times.

"You can either be Blockbuster or you can be Netflix," he said.

- New National Standard: As a result of OhioCheckbook.com, we brought Ohio's fiscal transparency ranking from 46th to first in the nation.
- All 88: Each of Ohio's 88 counties now have local governments who have posted their spending on OhioCheckbook.com.
- Local Governments and Schools: Nearly 1,200 local governments and school districts have joined the movement for statewide government transparency by partnering with my office to post their spending information online. Here in Miami County, there are three local governments participating, including Pleasant Hill, Bethel Township and the Bradford Public Library.
- More Data Available: OhioCheckbook.com now displays over \$598 billion of state spending over the past nine fiscal years, including over 164 million individual checks. This information is

online and at the fingers of anyone with an internet connection — everything from \$2 for a pack of pencils to \$2 million for road expenditures, and everything in between.

- Public Universities: We recently celebrated another significant milestone with the addition of the first public institutes of higher education on OhioCheckbook.com. Bowling Green State University, Central State University and the Central Ohio Technical College paved the way for other universities to follow by posting their finances online. This occasion marked the first time in history taxpayers are able to follow their money at the university level.
- Public Pension Funds: We made history by expanding OhioCheckbook.com to include Ohio's five statewide public pension funds, becoming the first state in the country to have all statewide public pension funds' operating expenditures online.

As Supreme Court Justice Louis D. Brandeis once said, "sunlight is said to be the best of disinfectants." And I agree. By posting government spending online, citizens are able to play an active role in their government and help root out fraud, waste and abuse.

My hope is that more local governments in Miami County will continue to join me in my mission of empowering taxpayers to hold politicians accountable.

WHAT IS OHIOCHECKBOOK.com?

OhioCheckbook.com is a first-of-its-kind government transparency website launched by the Ohio Treasurer's office. By displaying billions of dollars in state and local government checkbook-level spending, OhioCheckbook.com is empowering citizens to see exactly how their tax money is being spent.

HOW MUCH DOES IT COST FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENTS TO PARTICIPATE?

<u>Participation is free!</u> There is no cost to local governments who partner with OhioCheckbook.com. The Ohio Treasurer's office is covering all costs for local governments to post their checkbook-level spending online.

HOW MUCH TIME DOES IT TAKE TO UPLOAD MY DATA TO OHIOCHECKBOOK.com?

In most cases, the upload process takes just minutes and only a few clicks of the mouse.

WHAT ARE THE FEATURES OF OHIOCHECKBOOK.com?

OhioCheckbook.com allows anyone with an internet connection to do "Google-style" searches of state and local spending while displaying interactive charts and graphs in a user-friendly format.

HOW MANY LOCAL GOVERNMENTS & SCHOOLS HAVE COMMITTED TO OHIOCHECKBOOK.com?

To date, **more than 1,100** counties, cities, schools, townships and special districts are committed to posting their spending on OhioCheckbook.com.

WHY SHOULD LOCAL GOVERNMENTS POST THEIR CHECKBOOK ONLINE?

Leaders at every level of government are increasingly leveraging technology to post public financial information online to increase transparency.
